KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 12 (UP)—Two basketball teams from the Pacific coast and two from the Mid-West, won their way into the semi-final round of the National A. U. basketball tournament tonight.

Los Angeles was represented by the Los Angeles Athletic club, which defeated East Central Teachers of Ada, Okla., 43 to 30. San Francisco placed with its Young Men's Institute team. Y. M. I. conquered the Big Four A. A. of Cincinnati, 28 to 21.

The Los Angeles-East Central game was marked by rough play. The westerners, all more than six feet in height, scored almost at will when they worked the ball down the court. They led, 21 to 14, at the half. The Oklahomans, outplayed by the L. A. A. C. passing attack, put up a stubborn defense.

The Y. M. I.-Big Four game was close throughout, with the tall, rangy San Franciscans holding a 14 to 9 lead at the half.

The semi-finals, bringing together four of the country's outstanding basketball quintets, will be held Friday night with the finals Saturday night.

There were two other games tonight. In one of them, Kansas City A. C. kept pace with the Pacific coast teams and went into the semi-finals by defeating Lowe-Campbell, of St. Louis, 25 to 21.

MIAMI, Fla., March 12 (UP)—Willie MacFarlane, Tuckahoe, N. Y., single-potted eight greens in a row and shot a 30, six under par to lead his partner, Winifry Cox, Brooklyn, to an extra final round victory over the favorites, Gene Sarazen and Johnny Farrell in the international four-ball golf championship today.

Sarazen, New York, and Farrell, St. Augustine, Fla., were ousted 3 and 2 by some of the most spectacular golf ever seen in four-ball competition, with MacFarlane carrying all the load for the winning team.

Clarence Gamber and Cyril Walker, 1930 champions, were eliminated in the second round of play.

Two vocal selections, "Face to Face" and "No Night There," were sung by R. E. Patterson, accompanied by Mrs. M. Helene Joyaux.

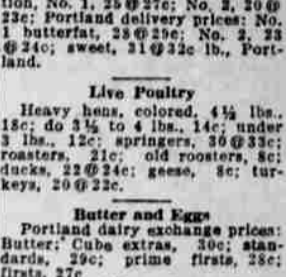

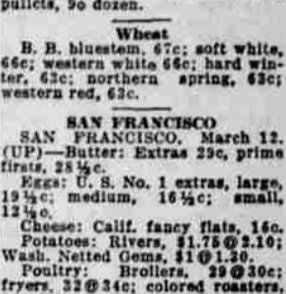

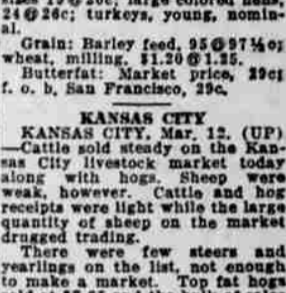
