

# STATE SCORES ON CHARGES

## Mrs. Emma Fowler Case Goes to Jury Today After Arguments

BAKER, Ore., March 20 (UP)—The state scored rather heavily in the trial here today of Mrs. Emma Fowler, 50, ex-La Grande city treasurer, charged with embezzling approximately \$112,000 of La Grande city funds, when it showed that her accounts had contained a shortage for some time past.

Conda J. Ham, Portland, accountant, called in rebuttal by the state this afternoon, said that on January 1, 1929, Mrs. Fowler's books were short more than \$45,000.

J. L. Soule, Baker accountant, was recalled to the stand by the defense and testified that errors in his figures, which had been contested, really were errors in Mrs. Fowler's book rather than his own errors.

Soule also testified that although a credit of \$50,115.16 had been placed to Mrs. Fowler's accounts, such action would not affect the balance as of January 1, 1929.

The defense then rested its case, and court was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

Announcements by the state and defense, indicated that the case would be given to the jury some time tomorrow.
