

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATIVE GROUPS SPAR

Reapportionment Fight Will be Up Again Monday at Sacramento

SACRAMENTO, Mar. 20. (UP)—With the California state legislature shattered by the reapportionment fight, opposing factions tonight were attempting to pick up the pieces in time for the reopening of the battle Monday.

Southern California senators who rallied in support of the reapportionment bill of Senator J. W. McKinley, Los Angeles, secured a temporary victory today when, in the face of opposition, Senator Tallant Tubbs, San Francisco, withdrew his move to reconsider the vote by which the measure passed Thursday.

In the assembly, however, a move to block reconsideration of the two Craig bills on assembly and congressional reapportionment succeeded only after proponents were able to get an adjournment until Monday.

The two Craig measures have gone to the committee early next week, while the McKinley bill will follow a similar course in the lower house.

The two Craig measures provide for the reapportionment of both congressional and assembly districts. As passed by the assembly, the first provides for 31 assemblies for Los Angeles, 19 for San Francisco, eight for Alameda.

McKinley's assembly bill differs in that it would give Los Angeles 20 assemblies and Orange county, two; San Francisco, nine, and Alameda, seven. McKinley's bill also provides greater representation for the San Joaquin valley.

The Craig congressional bill would give Los Angeles seven national representatives; San Francisco, with San Mateo county, three, and Alameda, two. This is based on the so-called "10-10" plan.

McKinley's congressional plan, not yet out of the senate reapportionment committee, constitutes a "11-9" plan in favor of southern California, giving Los Angeles eight congressmen, San Francisco, two, and Alameda and Contra Costa combined, two.

Both proposals, if the two houses remained unchanged, are doomed to failure.

Such a failure would require the election "at large" of the nine new congressmen, and the work of a special committee to decide the legislative reapportionment.

Two important labor measures were reported favorably to the senate today. One would require the payment of the highest prevailing wage scale of the district on all public works contracts, the other would prohibit the employment of aliens on similar projects.

With the approval by committee of a bill requiring the printing of district school budgets in a newspaper annually, and the discussion of a measure to require the submission of such budgets to county supervisors for possible downward revision, a campaign for lower educational costs appeared certain during the present session of the legislature.

Through their representative, Nat Wolff, Liberman-Rosenkrantz, one of the largest sales factories of San Francisco, Friday announced the purchase of the stock of Connolly Brothers sporting goods store, as well as the stock of the New York Bargain House.

These stocks will be combined, and sold in a whirlwind sale beginning Tuesday at the Connolly store. "Merchandise will be priced to move fast," Mr. Wolff declared, "and no outside merchandise will be shipped in for the sale. Mr. Wolff will be in charge of the sale, and expects that stocks of both stores will be disposed of in about 10 days.

up leaves and blooms of dandelion, treated with specially prepared strychnine, will be the bait scattered over the fields.
