LINE UP FIVE SIX-ROUND MAIN EVENTS

Bouts Will Draw Lots For Place on Card; Will Feature Weight

Five six-round events, featuring heavy boys, are billed for the Merrill fight program Tuesday night. Matchmaker Joe Bickerstaff announced last night. The bouts will be put on in the order that their numbers come out of the hat the night of the card.

Included in the five events are a group of knockout artists of no mean ability.

HEAVYWEIGHTS
Jess Holloway, 6 feet and 3 inches and weight 200, age 21, will meet Tully McCumber, 6 feet and 6 inches and weight 202, age 24 years. Both have won many battles by knockouts. Holloway, former University of Oregon student, is from The Dalles. In his two years of fighting Holloway has become popular in The Dalles and last Tuesday he kayoed Earl Beebe, Portland, in less than two rounds.

Mr. Elmer Huston, The Dalles meat market owner, who is building a meat packing plant here, gives Holloway a fine send-off. McCumber recently disposed of his opponent, Chuck Marville in less than two rounds.

LIGHT-HEAVIES
Another The Dalles popular fighter, Cliff Sparr, comes here well recommended with five straight one-round knockouts. He is also a former University of Oregon student and according to fight critics has the makings of a fine fighter. Beautifully built, this athlete tips the beam at 170 pounds of solid beef. He meets a veteran in Jess DeMott, the Merrill spud grower.

Johnny Jackson, Modoc Point Indian, and Tuffy Hansen, The Dalles butcher boy, may steal the show, for they are the same type of aggressive fighters and both hit hard. "Tuffy" has eight knockouts to his credit in his last 15 fights in The Dalles. They are lightweights.

REMATCH MADE
Frankie Munroe, Lakeriew, and Jack Kirk, colored, Klamath Falls, by popular demand in a six-round return match. In the Lakeview card they fought hard for the entire six rounds.

Jack Tanner and Battling Leo Burns are the fifth pair, Tanner is a recent arrival from the east and is living in Dorris. He hopes to get over Burns and work his way up to a regular main event here, his position when he left the east.

The boys from The Dalles will arrive Monday by motor.

The Klamath fighters are working out regularly here.

LE MON'S EYE CUT

The place of the fight card takes the place of the boat originally set for last night between Ray McQuillan and Romeo LeMon. Matchmaker Bickerstaff cancelled the bout to allow Romeo LeMon to meet George Dixon in Portland. Dixon won by a technical knockout in the seventh round when LeMon's eye was so badly cut that the fight was stopped by Referee Tom Louthin. Manager Jack Walker says LeMon's eye is healing rapidly, although it has not fully healed yet as the rash extended nearly the length of his eyebrow. A suitable opponent could not be found for McQuillan.

AGUA CALIENTE HANDICAP SET FOR SUNDAY

Sun Beau Favorite With Lady Broadcast in Close Second

AGUA CALIENTE, Mex., Mar. 20. (UP)—Nine horses will participate in the second renewal of the Agua Caliente \$100,000 handicap here Sunday, it was indicated tonight at Sun Beau, owned by W. S. Kilmer, continued to rule as favorite.

Odd of 4 to 5 were posted that the big horse would outdistance the field in the mile and one-quarter to bring his owner the largest purse in American turf competition. With added money the total winnings may reach \$149,000.

Lady Broadcast turned on the steam in an impressive workout Thursday which placed her in second position in the betting with a quotation of 4 to 1.

The other seven runners almost sure to start are Mike Hall, 6 to 1; Pigeon Hole, 6 to 1; The Choclaw, 6 to 1; Plucky Play, 10 to 1; Alexander Pantages, 15 to 1; Sandy Ford, 20 to 1, and Caruso, 20 to 1.

MED HORSE RACE
De Swasey, a 3 to 1 shot owned by J. W. Marchbank, and Vanity, 20 to 1, owned by W. R. Cole, have not definitely been eliminated, but chances were that their owners will post the heavy fee necessary to start.

Schomer, a talented med runner, being held in reserve while the owner, J. T. Atkin, scanned the skies for signs of rain. It appeared that chances for a muddy track were extremely remote and official weather observers predicted that Atkin will not be able to enter his 46 to 1 shot.

One of the last minute scratches was Ervatt, owned by Baron Long, one of the big three of Agua Caliente. Long decided to have been so enthused over a sensational workout of the horse that he wagered enough in the future book to bring her odds tumbling to 4 to 1.

RUN CLOSE TESTS
Sun Beau galloped the one and one-quarter mile course in 2:06 in Thursday's trial, while Lady Broadcast took the same distance in 2:06-3/5. Neither horse was extended.

Hundreds of race fans already were at the track awaiting the big event. The Agua Caliente hotel reported a full capacity and many persons were staying at San Diego hotels, commuting across the border daily to watch the races.

BOROTRA AND BELL MEET IN FINALS

NEW YORK, March 20. (UP)—Berkeley Bell of Austin, Tex., whose mission in life, it would seem, is the upsetting of the mighty, will meet Jean Borotra of France, in the final round of the national indoor tennis singles championships here tomorrow.

Bell earned the right to contest the bounding basque for the title by defeating Frank Shields of New York, 9-11, 6-4, 12-10, 6-4, in the most bitterly fought indoors match in years.

To say that Bell's victory came as a surprise is putting it mildly indeed. Better say it matched his first-round defeat of Borotra in the nationals at Forest Hills last year.

The match had not gone long before it was apparent that for today, at least, Bell was Shields' equal and the New Yorker held an advantage in strength only.

The doubles final results surprised no one. Borotra and his countryman, Christian Bussac, defeating Clifford Sutter of New Orleans and Pierre Landry of France, 7-5, 6-4, 5-7, 6-4. The issue never was in doubt, the two B's excelling their opponents in all departments of play.

Gar Wood Sets Three Records In Speedboat

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., March 20. (UP)—Gar Wood, noted Detroit speedboat racer, three times today established new records for watercraft, each time exceeding 100 miles an hour for the first time in motorboat history.

Late today he drove his Miss America IX, a 2,200-horsepower creation over the long nautical mile (6,085 feet) in the official speed of 102.254 miles an hour. Earlier in the day he broke the statute mile record of the late Sir Henry Segrave of England, in 100.60 m. p. h. and 101.54 m. p. h. respectively.

The Segrave record for the state mile (5,280 feet) was 98.76 miles an hour.

CHICAGO, March 20. (UP)—Jack Sharkey of Boston has agreed to meet the winner of Friday night's heavyweight bout between Tommy Loughran, of Philadelphia and Tuffy Griffiths of Chicago, Matchmaker Nate Lewis announced today.

Sharkey and his manager, Johnny Buckley, will arrive here Tuesday to sign for the match which the stadium plans to hold outdoors early in June. Sharkey will be guaranteed \$75,000.

BEN JEBY WINS NOD ON HARVEY

Britisher's Manager Will Send Harvey Back For More Lessons

NEW YORK, Mar. 20. (UP)—Ben Jeby, Hebrew boxer, of New York's east side, won over Len Harvey, England's premier middleweight boxer, in a 12 round bout at Madison Square Garden tonight.

The decision of the two judges and the referee was unanimous and found no echo of dispute among a relatively small crowd of 8,000. Jeby weighed 157½, Harvey 155.

Jebly had been a short ender in the betting. The first odds posted quoted Harvey as a 7 to 1 favorite, but they dropped to something like 8 to 5 at fight time.

Jebly won on his aggressiveness. He was not the better boxer but he was the more willing worker and his apparently superior fighting instinct brought him the victory. The United Press score sheet credited Jeby with winning six rounds, Harvey five, and one even.

There was an inordinate amount of clinching and for this, Harvey was mostly to blame. Time and time again the pasty-complexioned British boxer wrapped both of his long arms about the New Yorker and hugged for dear life.

Immediately after the bout, James "Joy" Johnston, boxing "boy bandit," American manager for Harvey, announced that he was going to send his charges back to England "for a couple of bouts and then I'll bring him here and he will be a winner."

Cecil Payne, Louisville, Ky., 156, won over Marty Goldman, Brooklyn, 155, in a 10-round bout.

Andy Callahan Beats Battalino In Ten-Rounder

BOSTON, March 20. (UP)—In a tame bout, marked by considerable holding, Andy Callahan, Lawrence lightweight, defeated Battalino of Hartford, Conn. Featherweight champion of the world, in 10 rounds at Boston garden tonight.

Battalino, who came in weighing 122½ pounds to Callahan's 135, was clearly outclassed all through the slow fight. The featherweight boss won only one round, the second; Callahan had a margin in the others.

Results of preliminaries: Jake Zeransky, 138, Lynn, outpointed Lud Abella, 139, Philadelphia (7); Tommy King, 140½, Fall River, outpointed Frank Herlihy, 141, Lynn (5).
