

POOR WIN BY TICKETS IN HORSE RACE

Coffee Shop Owner First, New Yorker Second And Hotel Man Third

LONDON, March 27. (UP)—Work-a-day folk in scattered sections of the earth—London, Buffalo, N. Y., and Capetown, South Africa—were rich beyond their fondest dreams because they held winning tickets in the Irish hospital sweepstakes on the grand national steeplechase run at the Aintree course outside Liverpool today.

The winners of the three major prizes are:

1. Emilio Scala, Italian coffee shop owner, and 29 poor relations, prize \$1,725,032.

2. George P. Dyamond, hotel proprietor, Capetown, prize \$274,259.

3. C. Woods, factory worker, Buffalo, N. Y., prize, \$861,541.

WOMEN FAINT
The Cinderella touch attracted curious thousands to the coffee shop in London where Scala has served workers for a decade. Women fainted. Children were injured.

Traffic was blocked for blocks around. Extra police sought vainly to clear the streets. The cafe was packed with neighbors of Scala seeking to congratulate him.

But Scala had fled. He was said to have gone away with members of his family in a motor car.

NEW YORKER SECOND
Scala shared the prize with Arthur Bendir, head of the turf commission firm of Messrs. Lab-broke, who paid a sum variously reported between \$50,000 and \$60,000 for half the ticket.

Woods, Buffalo, New York, factory worker, who won second prize of \$861,541, held the ticket on Greengrass.

Dyamond, South African hotel man, who won the third prize of \$274,259, offered a share of the ticket on Annandale, an outsider, for \$12,500 on the eve of the race. It is believed there were no takers.

POOR WIN PRIZES
Most of the tales told tonight, after the race was run, indicated that comparatively poor persons won many of the prizes on this greatest of racing sweepstakes. The total prizes were about \$2,600,000.

Two Paisley railway ticket sellers, James Millar and Joseph Darrymple, holders of the ticket on Ballasport, sold shares in it.

Fight Results

SAN FRANCISCO, March 27. (UP)—The assly of Meyer Grace, Chicago welterweight, in dodging punches, was appreciated by Referee Billy Doran here tonight and he called the 10-round bout between Grace and "Battling" Dugger of San Francisco a draw. The fans shouted protests when the verdict was given, some believing that Dugger landed enough blows between the wild swings to entitle him to a shade in eight of the rounds. Dugger weighed 146, Grace 148.

Paul Delaney defeated Jack Connel, substitute, (6); Tony Gora defeated Jack Gilmore, (6); Lou Zimmerman knocked out Teddy Misko, (1); "Kid" Avila-Johnny Jones declared no contest in second round, and Ted Juan drew with Leo Fiver.

HOLLYWOOD, March 27. (UP)—Speedy Dado, Filipino, claimed the Pacific coast flyweight championship tonight as he defeated Chato Laredo, of Mexico, in a 10-round main event at Hollywood Legion stadium.

Dado lived up to his nickname and stopped rings around Laredo to win the decision. Dado weighed 114½ and Laredo 115.

Oral Eubanks took a decision over Johnny Previs in the semi-final bout of six rounds. Previs was down for no-count in the third.

Laredo was unable to get into high gear, so Dado took eight of the 10 rounds. Speedy scored consistently with left and right uppercuts.

Laredo took the fourth round with body punches, but this only stirred up the little Filipino and he shellacked his opponent in the fifth. Laredo made another comeback attempt in closing rounds.

But Dado was too shifty and kept out of range of damaging blows. Although both Dado and Laredo were over the flyweight limit, there is only one other fighter on the coast who is considered in the same class with these two boys, Newsboy Brown, and Brown no longer can make 112 pounds, but fights as a bantamweight.

MINNEAPOLIS, Mar. 27. (UP)—Ernie Schaaf, 198, Boston, defeated Paul Pantaleo, 178½, of Chicago, in 10 rounds.

Walter Wohlwend, 178½, of Chicago, defeated Steve Trojak, 177, Winnipeg, in six rounds.

Art Laskey, 158, Minneapolis, scored a technical knockout in the third round over "Cowboy" Art Maxwell, 152, Omaha.

WEED CONTROL TRIAL PLANNED

Demonstration April 11 At Lyle Merrill Farm Near Klamath

Practical demonstrations of the use of chlorate weed killers will be given in Klamath county on Saturday, April 11, at 1:15 p. m. by the Chipman Chemical Engineering company of Boise, Idaho. It is announced by the county agent's office last night.

The demonstrations will be staged at the Lyle Merrill farm, 15 miles south of Klamath Falls, on the Dallas-California highway, in the Lone Pine district. This meeting is under cooperative agreement with the State Extension service and the Chipman Chemical Engineering company, and will give the correct and most efficient methods of applying chemicals for the destruction of weeds.

CHLORATE NOT NEW
Chlorate weed killers are not entirely new, yet success with this means of disposing of weeds has reached a point where it can be declared efficient. The success has been attained through experimentation in methods of applying the chemical, mixture of the solutions, and other mechanical details. It has been definitely determined that proper mixture, correct adjustment of the equipment and a thorough coverage of the foliage to be treated, will increase the effectiveness of the weed killers as much as 50 per cent.

The Chipman company is in a position to give the benefit of its experimentation to all persons interested in the eradication of weeds, annual losses from which are estimated to be larger than farmers' tax bills in some counties.

GET EQUIPMENT
Complete equipment will be on hand for the demonstrations and a general discussion of the entire weed problem and its solution will be given. A loud speaker will be installed so that all may hear. Experts will be in attendance to answer all questions. Weed mounds will be on display. Persons having experiences with unfamiliar weeds are requested to bring samples to the meeting where they will be identified.

It was desired by the County agent's office to schedule this meeting at a later date, after weeds had started growing, in order to accomplish more practical results, but this was impossible due to the schedule being followed by the Chipman company in Western Oregon and Washington, where the season is much farther advanced than here. This meeting should be particularly worthwhile and will enable all interested people to see the best equipment for weed control in operation; also to find out the proper method of application; use of dusts, and other important information relative to weed control. This is one of a series of meetings conducted by this company in co-operation with the Extension service of the various state colleges in Idaho, Washington and Oregon.
