Marx Dauer Is Laid To Rest by Host of Friends

ALTURAS, (Modoc Co.) Mar. 28.—Immense banks of flowers surrounded the bier of Marx Dauer, pioneer merchant of this place as he was laid to rest here Thursday. Funeral services were under the auspices of the Masonic order of which deceased was a life long member, being one of the charter members of the Royal Arch here.

Hundreds of machine loads of citizens came from all parts of Modoc county to pay their last respects to the deceased merchant who for the past 12 years had been head of the mercantile firm of E. Lauer & Sons, founded by E. Lauer in the early 70's. Marx Dauer's death which occurred Tuesday was the first break in the seven sons and daughters of the founder of the firm.

The deceased merchant's peculiarity was his extreme reticence on the many acts of charity and kindness which it was his habit to perform. Among the crowds of mourners who followed the body to its last resting place were people from all walks of life.

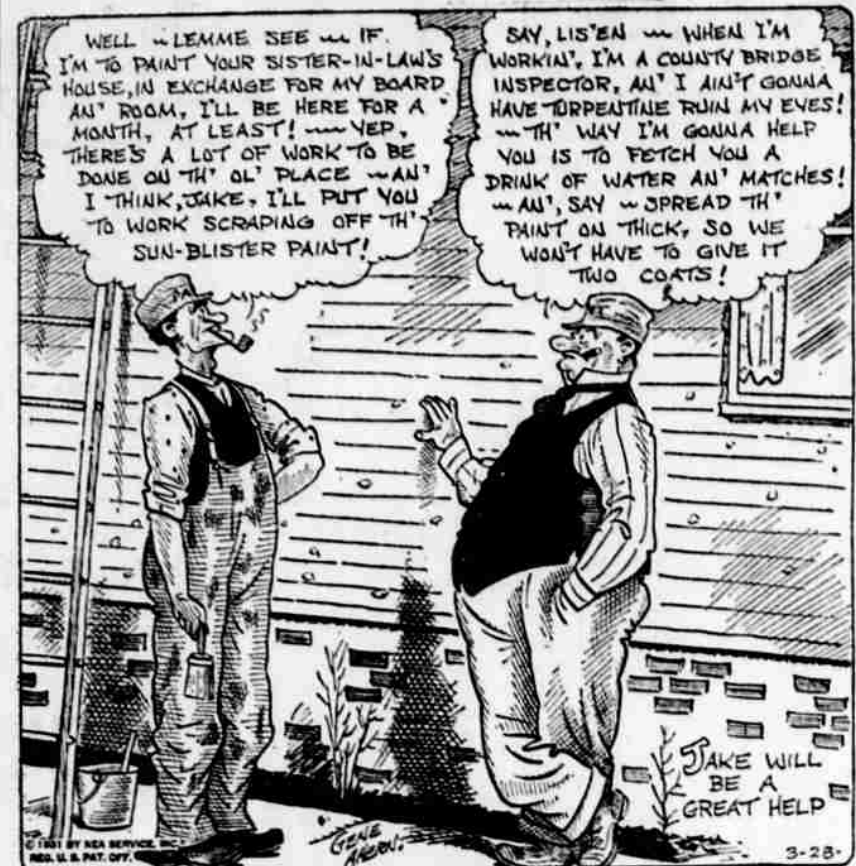
T. R. Clark, 25, driver of the car which struck her, must post \$5,000 property bond, or \$3,000 cash, until the inquest, or go to jail.

Woman Guilty of Killing Husband Is Jury Verdict

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., March 28. (UP).—Ten to twelve years of prison life faced Mrs. Lulu Gene Hilsinger, today because she shot and killed her husband, George W. Hilsinger, army warrant officer, during a quarrel in their home here several months ago.

Mrs. Hilsinger, claimed self defense, and testified that she had been subjected to brutal treatment, and that her husband had threatened her life a moment before she shot him, but a superior court jury found her guilty of second degree murder. She was sentenced today by Judge Robert M. Jones.

Two children by a former marriage, Marilyn and Chester Peters, aged 10 and 16, were left homeless by the verdict and sentence.

Release Craig After Questioned In Brooks Case

SAN DIEGO, March 28. (UP).—After being questioned in connection with the Virginia Brooks, 10, kidnapping and murder case, John Craig, an insurance collector, was released by police today.

The man had been named by a Mexican, Manuel Lopez, as a suspect. Police Lieutenant George Sears announced, however, that he was convinced Craig had no connection with the crime.

Lopez had told Los Angeles police he knew the killer of Virginia Brooks to be an insurance collector, Los Angeles police announced, after holding Lopez for two days, that the Mexican was suffering from hallucination.

The Brooks family received an unsigned threatening letter today but the contents were not made public. Police said the writing did not compare with that of notes signed "The Doctor," "The Gorilla," and "The Fox."

Pit River Suit To Settle Row Over Channel

ALTURAS (Modoc Co.), Mar. 28.—A long drawn out controversy in this city will be finally cleared up by court action, the problem to be settled being the exact channel of Pit river. A. E. Sweeney, mayor of Alturas, Francis E. Sweeney and Mrs. H. C. Watson have brought suit against Dr. E. F. Auble and his wife, Mrs. Bertie Auble.

All parties in the suit have land fronting on the river and the plaintiffs contend that the defendants by disturbing soil on the banks have changed the course of the river where it flows past the property concerned.

Graham & Sons Dig Well For Irrigation Work

DAVIS CREEK, (Modoc County), March 28. — Judge R. J. Graham & Sons of this place fearing a shortage of water on their ranch during the present spring and coming summer were pioneers in sinking a well for water to be used for irrigation purposes.

The well was drilled to a depth of 150 feet and a pump installed by L. P. Cedarholm of Alturas. A representative of the Alturas Plumber was called in to watch and judge the test pumping. The pump was run for 6 1/2 hours steadily, lowering the water in the casing only 15 feet during the time. Water was pumped from the well at the rate of 35,000 gallons per hour in this temporary setting the motive power being an old Fordson tractor.

The water table at this depth seems almost limitless and it is expected that many more farmers will sink wells for the purpose of supplementing their irrigation water supply during dry years.

Washington's New Gas Tax Attacked

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 28. (UP).—Washington's new two-cent gasoline tax, passed by the legislature, was attacked in the

state supreme court today by the Automobile Club of Washington. Counsel for the club obtained an order citing Secretary of State J. Grant Hinkle to appear April 24, and show cause why he should not accept a referendum petition directed at the action of the statute providing for the increase.
