DISTRICT PAYS GOVERNMENT

Drafts Mailed Interior Department Tuesday By Crawford

Deferred operation and maintenance charges for the Klamath Irrigation District to the amount of \$42,271.73 in drafts were mailed to the department of the interior Tuesday by A. L. Crawford, secretary.

E. M. Hammond, president of the board of directors of the district, and Sam P. Dehlinger, one of the directors of the board, were in the city yesterday.

The next payment to the government will be due from the K. I. D. on July 1. The amount due on that date will be reduced by an \$8,000 credit due the district, making a total of \$29,197.01 due.

District taxes are due on May 5, so before the July payment is due there will be funds in the treasury to take care of that amount, as well as sufficient to repay the loan of \$20,000 secured yesterday.

The payment of \$42,271.73 in deferred O. and M. charges inures to the district irrigation water whenever needed from April 1 until July 1.

Ditching With Explosives To Be Demonstrated

A new method of ditching by explosives will be demonstrated Saturday, April 4, at 10 a. m. at Aspen Lake Muskrat Farm, Rocky Point road, it was announced Tuesday. The public is invited and all farmers are especially urged to attend the demonstration.

A. J. Adams, agricultural representative of the Du Pont firm of Wilmington, Delaware, will meet R. E. E. Nathanson of the Northwestern Fur Traders Corp. and La Pine Fur Farms, operators of the Aspen Lake Muskrat Farm, at the Willard hotel Saturday morning. They will then proceed to the Muskrat farms for the demonstration.

Aspen Lake Muskrat Farm is seven miles long and an average of two miles wide. It is the largest controlled muskrat farm in the world. It is the intention of the demonstrators to ditch the muskrat marsh with cross ditches and long running ditches in order to make trapping more convenient.

Farmers interested in ditching are invited to attend the event and will be given advice on all operations by Mr. Mac Adams.

File Complaint On Mortgage

Heavy Travel Expected Over Easter Week-End

PORTLAND, March 31.—With hundreds of Portland residents planning out-of-town trips over the Easter week-end, preparations were under way here today for the entertainment of thousands of others expected to invade the city and nearby points as a result of "dollar day" cent a mile fares announced by Southern Pacific company for April 2 and 4, with return limit of April 5.

Introduced by the company February 20 and 27 in line with its efforts to win back passenger traffic to the railroads, the unprecedented fare reductions are again expected to stimulate a tremendous traffic movement throughout Oregon and six other western states.

Numerous special events here are designed to attract countless visitors to the city, while Portland residents are availing themselves of opportunities for low-priced travel elsewhere. Extension of the return limit on the Easter "dollar day" excursion tickets to midnight of Thursday following date of sale is expected to augment traffic, allowing trips to and from distant points on Southern Pacific's Pacific lines, which extend from Portland to El Paso and from San Francisco to Ogden.

Ability to start trips on two days, Friday and Saturday, instead of on Friday only, as in the case of the February "sales," is an added feature expected to stimulate travel, particularly in view of the Easter week-end, according to J. A. Ormandy, passenger traffic manager for Southern Pacific here.

Round trip fares involved are but three-fifths of the usual one way fare.

Wallace Johnson Former Klamath Falls Resident

Wallace Johnson, Ashland candy maker, who sustained fatal injuries in an auto crash on the Pacific highway Sunday evening, formerly resided in Klamath Falls, it was learned yesterday. Johnson died at 2 o'clock Monday morning following injuries received when his car skidded into the concrete wall of a small bridge south of Ashland. Mr. Piper, passenger in the car escaped uninjured. Johnson and Piper were enroute to Ashland from Yreka, Calif. The car was going 40 miles an hour when Johnson applied his brakes on

the wet pavement and the roadster skidded 100 feet and crashed into another car. It slid into the concrete railing over Neil creek, the car striking on the driver's side of the machine. Johnson has no relatives. He resided in this city several years ago.
