

BREAK MARKS AT NATIONAL SWIM MEET

New York First in 3:34.9
For 400-Yard Relay And
Hollywood Second

CHICAGO, April 2. (UP)—New York A. C. opened the second session of the National A. C. swimming meet tonight by breaking the world's record in the 400-yard relay. The blue clad men swam the distance in 3:34.9, breaking the meet record set last year by the Chicago A. C. Hollywood A. C. trailed by two seconds with the Lakeshore club third.

Summaries:
400-yard free style relay: Won by New York A. C. (John Howland, Ogden Dalrymple, George Fissler, Walter Spencer); Hollywood A. C. second; Lakeshore A. C. third. Time 3:34.9 (New world's record, American record) Yale university 3:38.8 set in 1929.

Dalrymple turned in a 53.5 second lap and Fissler a 54.2 lap. Walter Spencer anchored the team with a 53.2 second hundred but was pushed all the way by Manuella Kallil of Hollywood, who set a terrific pace cutting down Spencer's lead from 2-3 of a lap to a bare yard. Johnny Howland swam anchor on the Yale team that held the old record.

220-yard breast stroke—Won by Leonard Spence, New York A. C.; Walter Spencer, New York A. C., second; John Schmeier, University of Michigan, third. Time 2:14.4 (New world's record; old record 2:15 in 200 meters held by Sarouha, Japan).

Leonard Spence of the New A. C. continued the record breaking performances by taking the 220 yard breast stroke in 2 minutes 44.5 seconds to break the world's record of 2 minutes 45 seconds set by Sarouha of Japan in the 200 meters. A shorter race, Spence led his brother, Walter to the tape by a bare 2 yards. Jack Schmeier, Michigan sophomore, passed the Spencer's most of the way but was nosed out by Walter in the last lap. Ted Blankenberg, Hollywood A. C. defending champion was a poor last.

The lowboard fancy diving contest was another brother affair with Mickey Riley beating his older brother, John for first place. Wallie Colbath, former Northwestern star and representing the Lakeshore A. C. was third. Mickey repeated his championship efforts of last week when he took first place in the intercollegiate championships. Dutch Smith, defending champion did not place.

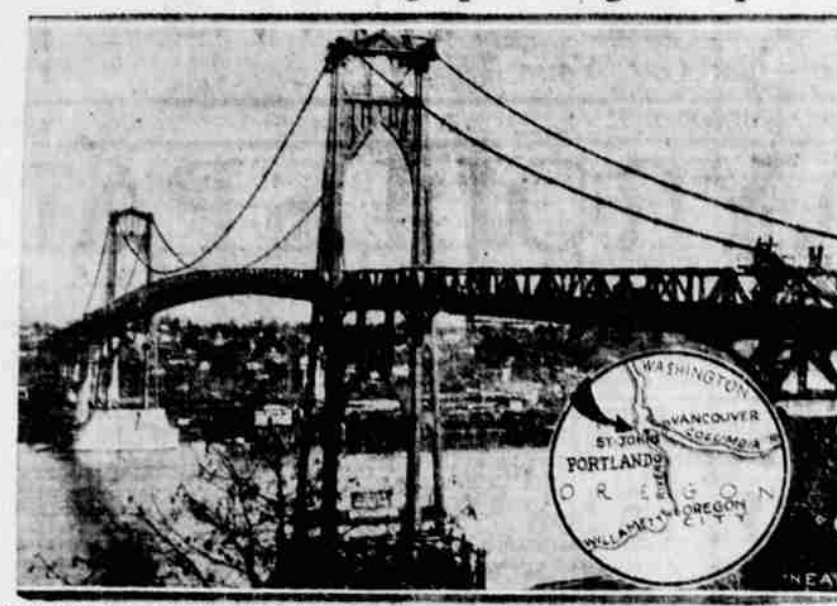
Federals Find Pint of Whiskey In Capone Safe

BOY-GIANT ORDERED TO SUBMIT TO GLAND TREATMENT BY COURT

LOS ANGELES, April 2. (UP)—In a court decision enforcing the Biblical injunction that children must honor their parents, 14-year-old Adolphus Roome, Jr., was ordered today to put aside his protests and submit to gland treatment designed to prevent him from becoming a veritable giant.

The ruling by Superior Judge Lester Roth, one of California's youngest jurists, was a victory for the father, Dr. Adolphus Roome, Sr. Dr. Roome said he did not want the boy to become a freak.

MOTHER PROTESTED
The boy, already six feet tall, weighing 299 pounds, 42 inches around the chest and wearing No. 11 shoes, opposed the treatments in the recent hearing. He said a test shot had made him ill and he feared that further treatment would make him an imbecile. The mother, Mrs. Helen Roome, a trained nurse, who has had custody of Adolphus, Jr., since her divorce, supported his protest.

In his ruling Judge Roth said: "In view of the evidence by medical experts, the court is forced to decide that no permanent harm can result from a reasonable amount of treatment administered with reasonable skill, and that there is a strong possibility that such treatment may produce a beneficial result. The father, a reputable physician himself, has the fullest amount of paternal love and interest for the son. The mother's attitude, as reflected by the evidence, is neutral, although there is an undercurrent of opposition apparent."
