WEED CONTROL DEMONSTRATION IS SATURDAY

Lyle Merrill Farm Scene For Talk and Display of Apparatus

The spread of the demon weed on farms of the nation has caused many agricultural experts of the country to take active notice of the growing infestations before the weeds take the farms, states C. A. Henderson, county agent.

The most difficult weeds to eradicate are perennials; they come up every year and if nothing is done to stop their growth each year's crop is bigger than the one before. But in this modern age something has been developed that will prevent their growth. Chlorate weed killers applied in the form of a spray or powder will do the trick if applied at the proper time and in the proper manner.

The Chipman Chemical Engineering company of Boise, Idaho, has developed chemicals and apparatus for the effective control and eradication of weeds and a public demonstration of this equipment will be given at the Lyle Merrill farm, 13 miles south of Klamath Falls, on the Dallas-California highway, Saturday, at 1:15 p. m., it is announced by the county agent's office.

The great strength of weeds lies in the root, therefore the first principle to be followed in killing weeds is to kill the root. The chemical to be most effective should be applied to the foliage above the ground and must be applied in such a manner that the leaves and stems will absorb enough to be carried to the roots through the natural pipe or sap lines of the plant structure. The amount of chemical absorbed determines the results.

As the efficient action of the chemical depends on the amount absorbed by the plant, best results are obtained after the weed has come to the bloom stage. If the treatment is given when the growth is small and scanty a high concentration of spray solution is required in order to obtain the same amount of absorption.

The equipment to be demonstrated includes the latest improved nozzles, spray guns and knapsack sprayers and dusters. Sometimes it is advantageous to use the dust instead of the liquid. The methods of application will be fully demonstrated and a detailed discussion of weed control and eradication will be given.

Civil Service Examination Is Announced

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:

Assistant entomologist, \$2,600 to \$3,200 a year, Bureau of Entomology. Associate fisheries economist, \$2,200 to \$2,500 a year; assistant economist, \$2,600 to \$3,200 a year; Bureau of Fisheries. Rotaprint operator, \$1,440 a year, Bureau of Mines.

Principal social worker (physician), \$2,000 a year, Public Health Service. Teacher of home economics, senior high school, \$2,600 a year, teacher of home economics, reservation and junior high school, \$1,860 a year; Indian Service.

LEGISLATIVE TEST TODAY IN SACRAMENTO

Reapportionment Battle Is Near End After Union; Wet, Dry Battle

SACRAMENTO, April 7. (UP)—Preparations for a final test of the recently enacted power of the southern California legislators in the reapportionment fight were being made here tonight.

Encouraged by the refusal of the San Joaquin valley delegation to accept the "trade" offered by Speaker Edgar C. Levey, San Francisco, Assemblyman Walter J. Little, Los Angeles, claimed the balance of power in the lower house tonight.

The first test will be offered tomorrow afternoon when the assembly and congressional redistricting bills of Senator J. W. McKelvey, Los Angeles, come up for final consideration.

With the loyalty of the San Joaquin group assured, it is anticipated that Senator McKelvey will be able to put through his measures over the opposition of the San Francisco delegation.

These bills give Los Angeles eight congressmen and 20 assemblymen. The assembly redistricting plan already has been approved by the senate, the measure coming up tomorrow representing the Craig bill amended to constitute a duplicate of the original McKelvey measure.

Thursday the assembly will vote on McKelvey bills amended to represent the Craig measures originating in the lower house and the combined power of the

southern California-San Joaquin coalition is expected to block passage of the measures and pave the way for acceptance of the McKelvey proposal.

While legislators were preparing to put reapportionment "over the top" others were drawing battle lines for the opening of the prohibition fight before the senate public morals committee tomorrow night.

The list of speakers who will seek approval of Senator Tallant Tubbs' bill to repeal California's prohibition enforcement law includes Peter B. Kyne, author; Mrs. Mary Ashe Miller, San Francisco, state secretary of the women's organization for national prohibition reform, and others.

A final committee hearing on oil conservation bills bitterly opposed by independent producers also is scheduled for tomorrow night in the senate.

An attempt to secure committee approval of a new teachers' retirement plan which would require an initial appropriation of approximately \$7,500,000 was blocked in the senate finance committee because no means were offered to "pay the cost." The hearing will be continued tomorrow morning.

Inquisitorial committee of the senate and assembly tonight opened their investigation of an alleged "book trust" which prompted the award on a \$200,000 book contract to an eastern firm, instead of having the school texts printed in the state plant.
