POTHIER TO BE SEEN IN NEW STYLE

Mills Fast Boxer But Is Not Exceptionally Heavy Hitter

Preview of the fighters who will appear on Wednesday night's card at the American Legion hall here will be held at the arena today at 1 o'clock. It was announced last night by Matchmaker Jack Walker, who invites all fans to attend.

Twelve fighters who will appear on the card and a number of others who are in the city will work out this afternoon.

CHANGES STYLE
The style of fighting of Pierre Pothier has been changed to some extent by his past six weeks' workouts and training here. He has become more of the "rough and ready" type. Fans say that he has lost none of his speed.

Tex Mills, billed as the Amarillo, Texas, cowboy, will work out today with Wildcat Jimmy Owens, his stablemate. Mills is said to be as fast as Pothier, although he is more of a boxer than a heavy slugger. Owens claims to have beaten Mushy Calahan when he was world's champion and to have beaten Jackie Florida.

Jack Dempsey and Estelle in "Little Spat"

RENO, Nev., April 11. (UP)—Jack Dempsey, former heavyweight champion admitted here tonight that he "might" be a divorcee from Estelle Taylor, screen actress.

"It's just possible that I might file for a divorce action," he said. "But what I'm really here for is a rest."

Estelle and I have had a little spat, all right. Those things are usually patched up, though, you know.

Dempsey arrived here this morning, stating then that he merely was after a rest prescribed for him by his physician. He denied then that he contemplated filing action against Miss Taylor. Neither had they any disagreement, he said.

Later, however, he admitted a minor dispute with his wife and still later he said it might result in a divorce action.

"It depends mostly on letters I've written to her, I guess," he said. "I want to patch the thing up and I'm sure it can and will be fixed up."

Klamath Gun Club Shoot To Start at 10:30

Beginning at 10:30 Sunday morning and lasting throughout the day, the Klamath Gun club on the Dallas-California highway, will be the scene of much activity and keen competition among trapshooters. FISHERMEN READY TO OPEN SEASON

Equipment in Shape; May Expect Good Catches, Barnes States

Klamath fishermen who have been waiting their lines, sorting out their files, putting new tips on their poles and in other ways preparing for the opening of the fishing season Wednesday are now awaiting the opening day.

Tuesday will find some of the ardent anglers starting for their favorite streams to be ready to fish as soon as the season opens the next morning.

STREAMS CLEAR
And they may expect to catch the limit, Marion Barnes, deputy game warden, stated last night. The streams are clear due to little snow in the mountains and a small run off of surface water to muddy the creeks and rivers.

The egg take has been large this year showing a large number of fish in the stream. Lakes and streams which abound in Klamath will be well populated, according to latest advice from dealers in tackle and rods.

AWAIT NEW LAWS
Klamath river, with little water in it due to the fact that the California Oregon Power company is building a dam below Reno to regulate the river, and because the power company has been leaving the water in Upper Klamath for irrigation purposes, with little running over the dam. All lakes but Diamond Lake; and streams with the exception of Woo driver, Crooked Creek, Sun Creek and Seven Mile creek are open to anglers, unless restricted by game warden Barnes. He expects to receive the latest laws in a few days and they will be published in The News.

MORSEL WINS PRINCE GEORGE

Baltimore Racing Meet Ends; Paul Bunyan Is Second

BALTIMORE, Md., April 11. (UP)—The largest crowd of the meeting turned out at Bowie race track this afternoon to witness the final day of the spring meeting there, with Morsel, a black son of Vulcan from the Lemar stock farm, racing to an easy victory in the Prince George, taking down \$3,450 as the winner's award and returning \$5 for \$2 in the straight mutuels.

Paul Bunyan finished second, two lengths back, while Sister Zoe, three lengths behind him, headed finalist for third money. The time 1:47 1-5, for a mile and a sixteenth, was by far the best mark for the distance hung up during the twelve day session.

Considerable crowding marred the running of this event, with Paul Bunyan almost being thrown. Robertson kept Morsel clear of this and had Paul Bunyan not been buffeted around, the finish might have been closer.

Morsel's effort, however, was a sparkling one. He forced the pace to the final turn, took the lead when Robertson wished and drawing out through the run to the wire, was going handily as he flew home the winner.

Les Canadiens Beat Chicago To Tie Series

MONTREAL, April 11. (UP)—The Montreal Les Canadiens evened the play-off series for the Stanley cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship, tonight by defeating the Chicago Blackhawks, 4 to 2.

Both teams have won two games. The fifth and deciding contest will be played here Thursday night.

Cardinals Win Water Polo Title

PALO ALTO, Calif., April 11. (UP)—Stanford won the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate water polo championship here today, defeating the University of Southern California, 4 to 1.

Southern California then took second place by defeating the University of California at Berkeley, 10 to 2. The University of California at Berkeley placed third by defeating the University of California at Los Angeles, 5 to 0. U. C. L. A. was last.

SET NEW RECORDS IN RACES

Varsity Has Punch After Bear She Men Lose Lead Strength

OAKLAND ESTUARY, April 11. (UP)—Reversing advantage from the varsity, junior varsity and freshmen crews from the University of Washington today made a clean sweep of the California crew in their annual regatta, establishing new meet records in all three events.

The Washington varsity crew skinned over the three-mile course in 14 minutes 53.4 seconds, the fastest time in the history of the dual regatta.

SET MEET RECORDS.
Previously the Washington junior varsity and freshmen crews had won to set new meet records in both events.

The freshmen covered the two-mile course in 9 minutes, 56 seconds to break the record established in 1925, and the jayvees rowed the three-mile course in 15 minutes, 30 seconds, breaking the mark set by the California crew in 1927.

The Washington varsity oarsmen outrowed a smoother, more polished California crew, surprising even themselves when they did not crack under the suicidal pace they set at the half-mile mark to overtake California's slight lead.

HUSKIES IN SPRINT
The California crew passed up the challenge, keeping its smooth, rhythmic gait as the Husky shell edged by; and Bear fans predicted that a California sprint down the last half-mile would leave the spent Washington crew behind.

But when the sprint came Washington had something left, and it was the California crew, instead, that was losing ground at the finish.

Both shells got away fast, California stroking 33 to the minute and Washington 32.

California took a slight lead as they passed to quarter-mile mark. At the half-mile post, the Bears led by approximately five feet.

The Washington crew stepped up its stroke as it passed the half-mile, and California speeded up a moment later.

As they passed the mile mark, Washington was rowing 33, California's 35.

The Washington shell forged ahead as they neared the two-mile mark, and led by five feet as they passed it.

The California gait was increased slightly as they came down the stretch, and the California shell took up a foot or two of the lead.

It was lost a moment later, and the Husky crew led by half a length with half a mile to go. Both crews sprinted and they fought down the last few yards at a 36-stroke gait.

In the last 200 yards, the powerfully stroked Husky shell held ahead to lead by a good length as they swept over the finish line.

Approximately 35,000 persons lined the banks of the estuary to witness the 25th renewal of the annual classic.

The west coast girls were to leave Buffalo for New York where they will compete in the women's national A. A. U. championships to be held April 16-19.

Lott and Coen Win Doubles In Club Tourney

HOUSTON, Tex., April 11. (UP)—George Lott of Philadelphia and Junior Coen of Kansas City won the doubles championship of the River Oaks Country club invitation tournament here this afternoon.

The two stars, who were defeated in upsets in singles play, won from Bruce Barnes and Earl Taylor of Texas University in straight sets, 8-5, 6-1, 6-2.

Barnes meets Ellsworth Vines of Pasadena, Calif., in the singles final tomorrow afternoon.
