



POTHIER IS WINNER OVER TEX MILLS

Mandott Decisions Pat McFadden in Semi; Two Kayoes

Pierre Pothier, European champion and also Mexican titleholder, proved victorious over Tex Mills, Amarillo, Texas, in the main event of the city fight card last night at Legion hall before a packed house. Superior condition and expert boxing brought the decision to Pothier after 10 rounds of the cleverest fighting ever seen in a Klamath ring.

Red Mandott and Pat McFadden put up one of the greatest scraps of the fine card in the six-round semi-final with Mandott taking the decision. Red took all that McFadden had to offer and delivered as good if not stiffer blows than he received.

INDIANS WAR
A real Indian war was staged when Modoc Johnny Jackson defeated Battling Leo Burns of Sprague River in the four-round special. After the last of the third it was all Jackson, with Burns nearly out on his feet.

Bulldog Beno kayoed Jerry McKenny after a minute and 55 seconds of fighting in the second round. Howard slipped over a hard one after the bell rang ending the first round and it was the start of McKenny's downfall.

Red Stanton took an easy decision over Lee York by doing all the leading and keeping York on the defensive at all times.

The card, refereed by Eddie Arthur was not marred by the often-seen holding and cheating.

SEMI FIGHTS
The large crowd was in an uproar throughout the semi-windup. The early rounds of the fight were fairly even with each slugger away at the other. In the fifth, McFadden went down under a heavy wallop from Mandott who was loudly cheered by fans. Many thought the semi-windup the best bout on the card. Mandott weighed 157 and McFadden 154.

POTHIER HAS EDGE
Pothier went into the ring at 151 against 139 for Mills. The first bout showed both as fairly tough throughout the 10 rounds—nearly even, with Pothier getting the shade on clean punching. The bout was one of the greatest boxing exhibitions ever witnessed here.

Rushes by Mills were met by Pothier with a strong jab, who was only once off the ropes that Mills had the advantage. Pothier did most of the leading throughout the bout and it was in the seventh, eighth and ninth rounds that the better physical condition of the Frenchman told. Only the fifth round might be clearly credited to Mills.

Before the main event Wildcat Jimmy Owens and Romeo LeMon were introduced from the ring as the feature event on the next card under Matchmaker Jack Walker.

High Schools Track Meeting Shows Surprises

ALTURA. (Modoc Co.) April 15.—The annual high school track meet held at the Altura track last Saturday developed some rather surprising results.

Three track teams competed, Susanville, Alturas and Lakeview. Susanville carried off the honors, three members of their team, Farnell, McDow and Matuschek, each winning three first prizes. The total points won by the Susanville team was 135; Alturas won 100 points and Lakeview, whose team was composed of smaller boys scored only 4.75 competitors took part in 100 and 50 yard dashes, races of 200 yards, one-quarter, one half mile and one mile, relays and hurdles.

McDow of the Susanville team made the 100-yard dash in ten and one-eighth seconds. Glenn Flannery of Lakeview of the Alturas team being only a matter of inches behind when McDow breathed the tape.

SENATORS, CARDS WIN IN SECONDS

Grimes Holds Reds While Washington Knocks Old Earnshaw For Win

NEW YORK, April 15. (UP)—Remarkable pitching performances by Burleigh Grimes of St. Louis Cardinals and Bump Hadley of the Washington Senators featured the major league baseball games today.

Grimes, beginning his 16th season in the major leagues, held the Cincinnati Reds to seven hits as the Cardinals won, 4 to 0. It was the first shut-out of the season and marked the Cardinals' 15th consecutive triumph over Cincinnati. St. Louis won the last 11 games played between the two clubs last season and has taken two straight this year.

KNOCKOUT EARNSHAW
The Senators knocked George Earnshaw out of the box as they defeated the world champion Philadelphia Athletics, 7 to 1. Hadley held the Athletics to four hits.

Three home runs featured the New York Yankees second victory over the Boston Red Sox, 8 to 7. Lou Gehrig hit a homer while Britt and Berry pulled out circuit bloopers for the Red Sox.

The St. Louis Browns made it two in a row over the Detroit Tigers by winning, 6 to 4. Gray allowed the Tigers 14 hits while the Browns got 13 off Waite Hoyt.

In the other American league game, the Chicago White Sox defeated Cleveland, 7 to 6 in 10 innings. A double by Tate, catcher, brought in Watwood with the winning run.

BRAVES BEAT ROBINS
The Atlanta Braves aided by seven Robins defeated Brooklyn again, 9 to 3. Herman was yanked by Manager Robinson because of poor fielding and replaced by Cohen, a rookie, who made two hits in three times at bat and drove out two Boston batters who tried to stretch singles into doubles.

The Chicago Cubs continued their winning ways with a 6 to 5 victory over Pittsburgh. Bob Smith, acquired from the Boston Nationals, allowed the Pirates but seven hits. Manager Hornsby hit a home run.

Chuck Klein got his third home run of the season as the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the New York Giants, 10 to 7. The Phillies scored eight runs in the second inning. Hurst and Arlett also hit home runs for Philadelphia while Leach got one for the Giants.

SCHMELING, STRIBLING TO MEET IN JULY

Bout Announced For Huge Cleveland Stadium On July 3rd

SOUTH BEND, Ind., April 15. (UP)—With a faint hearted attempt at ballyhoo, officials of the Madison Square Garden corporation of Illinois announced officially today that the Max Schmeling-Young Stribling bout for the world's heavyweight championship will be held at Cleveland the night of July 3.

Legislated out of New York and muscled out of Chicago, the bout was welcomed with open arms by Cleveland, according to announcements by Dick Dunn, representative of Madison Square Garden, and Joe Jacobs, manager of Schmeling.

TO GO 15 ROUNDS
The bout will be 15 rounds and will be Schmeling's first defense of his clouded title. He won it from Jack Sharkey last year on a foul, but the New York State Athletic commission has since withdrawn its recognition because the German refused to meet Sharkey in a return bout.

National Boxing association still recognizes Schmeling as champion. The new Cleveland stadium with its seating capacity of 110,000 which will be virtually completed in June, will be the scene of the bout. Prices will range from \$25 to \$42 including tax.

MAX TO VACATION
The announcement was made here today because of Schmeling's presence on one of the last appearance of his exhibition tour. Sheldon Clark, Chicago sportsman, in an official statement, said the fact that Illinois had no legislation for a 15-round bout and the attitude of the Chicago Press prevented the windy city from getting the match.

Schmeling will go to French Lick Springs, Ind., tomorrow for a two weeks' vacation before completing his exhibition tour. He has five more dates to fill and will wind up in Chicago May 8. He will begin training in Cleveland about the middle of May.

Ty Cobb Sued For Divorce, Charge Cruelty
AUGUSTA, Ga., Apr. 15. (UP)—Ty Cobb, retired star, was named defendant in a divorce suit filed here today by Mrs. Charlie Marion Lombard Cobb.

Mrs. Cobb charged extreme cruelty and requested alimony and custody of four children, A fifth son, Tyrus Raymond, Jr., a junior student at Princeton university, is 21 years old and thus not involved.

The petition gave no details regarding the cruelty charge and Mrs. Cobb steadfastly declined to discuss the matter. Hearing on the alimony petition was scheduled for April 25.

The Cobbs were married here August 6, 1908.

Cleveland May Be Scene of Big Grid Game

HANOVER, N. H., April 15. (UP)—Cleveland's new municipal stadium, with a seating capacity of 80,000, tonight was considered a likely site for the Dartmouth-Leland Stanford football game to be played next November 28.

Original plans to stage the intercollegiate grid classic at Harvard stadium were all but cancelled when Mayor James M. Curley of Boston—the city in which the stadium is situated—refused a permit for the game on grounds it would conflict with the Boston college-Holy Cross games played annually on the Harvard grounds.

Following a long distance telephone communication tonight, Henry R. Henegay, Dartmouth supervisor of athletics, indicated that Cleveland officials favored the playing of the East-West game in that city.

Balko Wins In Harford Handicap In Maryland Race

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md., Apr. 15. (UP)—The largest crowd to witness a racing program in Maryland thus far this spring gathered at the racetrack this afternoon and saw Balko, six-year-old son of Omar Khayam, carry the silks of the Saratoga stable to victory in the \$10,000 added Harford Handicap.

Balko ran the three quarters of a mile in 1:11 4-5 under the crushing impact of 126 pounds. Jockey J. Belshak rated Balko in front all the way to pass
