



HEAVYWEIGHT CHAMPION TO BE SELECTED

Elimination Bouts See All Contenders in Three Bouts

NEW YORK, April 17. (UP)—With the six leaders of the heavyweight class under contract for bouts to be staged within the next 90 days, prospects for the establishment of an undisputed world's champion are brighter than at any time since the retirement of Gene Tunney, three years ago.

The bouts scheduled are: Tommy Loughran vs. Vittorio Campolo, at Madison Square Garden, New York, May 15; Jack Sharkey vs. Primo Carnera, at Ebbets Field, Brooklyn, June 1; and Max Baer vs. Young Stribling, at Municipal stadium, Cleveland, July 3.

Participants include all fighters recognized as championship contenders and if the bouts go through as scheduled, the list of titular possibilities will be reduced to three men, with a probability that the Loughran-Campolo and Sharkey-Carnera survivors will be paired to determine the logical contender to meet the winner of the Schmeling-Stribling "championship" battle.

Such a contest would establish an undisputed champion and a holder for the Tunney-Muldoon championship trophy which has been gathering dust in Madison Square Garden's lobby since it was presented by Tunney in January, 1929.

TITLE IN DOUBT
Schmeling won a claim to the championship last June when he defeated Jack Sharkey on a foul in the final of the New York commission's tournament, but he failed to secure general recognition as champion, and has since lost his standing with the New York commission because of his refusal to give Sharkey a return match.

Schmeling will defend his title claim against Stribling and the winner will have the strongest claim to honors, but until other contenders are eliminated the throne will remain in dispute. The New York commission has promised to recognize the Sharkey-Carnera winner as champion, although neither participant has any legitimate claim to the crown. However, many fans considered Sharkey the best of a poor lot and if he scores a decisive victory over the big Italian and then defeats Loughran or Campolo the Schmeling-Stribling survivor will be unable to dodge a bout to decide an undisputed titleholder.

GOLF as the STARS play it

How Does Bobby Jones Control the Famous Calamity Jane on the Greens?

Should one hit putts with the right or the left hand in control of the shot?

Some of the stars use either the left or the right. Here is an illustration of Bobby Jones' putting with his famous Calamity Jane.

You will see that he grips the club with the right hand slightly under the shaft, the little finger of the right hand overlapped by the index finger of the left. This puts the control of the club in the right hand. The wrists working against each other giving him a smooth, rhythmic swing.

Get the feeling of looseness and you will soon acquire what is known as touch.

Portland Defeats Oakland 9 to 6 in 14 Inning Game Friday

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17. (UP)—Portland, Los Angeles and Sacramento, tied for first place of the Pacific Coast league, moved two full games ahead of their closest competitors today, the Beavers staying at the top only after a hard 14-inning game with Oakland.
