TROJANS WIN BY TWO POINTS

Los Angeles A. C. Beaten In Track and Field Meet Saturday

LOS ANGELES, April 18. (UP)—By a margin of only two points University of Southern California today defeated Los Angeles Amateur Athletic club in their annual track and field meet 65 1/2 to 64 1/2, here this afternoon.

Two records fell by the wayside and one was tied in the closest meet that has been witnessed here for a good many years.

All events went off the pole vault had been completed and there still was no indication of which team would win. This event was the deciding one and had there not been a tie for first place the score would have probably favored the A. A. C.

As it was Dr. J. A. C. and Jefferson of L. A. C. tied for first place in the pole vault with 13 feet six inches. Although the second place was tied between two L. A. C. men, U. S. C. garnered first sufficient points from the first place slip to give them the meet.

The entire meet was replete with tied positions. In one event alone, the high jump, there was a four-way tie for second place. Williams, of U. S. C., set a new national record in the 440-yard dash. He won the event in 48 3/10 seconds, clipping 2-10 of a second off the previous record set by himself earlier this year.

In the mile relay U. S. C. again lowered its own record by doing the distance in 3 minutes 15 8/10 seconds. Its former record was 3 minutes 17 6/10 seconds.

Together the Van Ryns then won the mixed doubles title, defeating Miss Rice and Sutter, 6-3, 8-6, 8-6.

Then Van Ryn paired with F. X. Shields of the University of California to capture the men's doubles championship, from Dr. Jack Wright and Marcel Rainville, Canadian Davis cup team, 6-3, 9-7, 7-5.

GRANT HIGH WINS CARNIVAL

College Stars Appear To Show Preppers Best Track Form

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 18. (UP)—Flipping its spikes to a field of Washington's and Oregon's best, Grant High school of Portland dashed away with major honors in the sixth annual Vancouver High school relay carnival, held here today under perfect weather conditions and before a large crowd of spectators.

The generals swept the field in the relay races for both seniors and juniors.

One record went off the boards. Grant's spring medley quartet of Cannady, Miller, Dowling and White covered a half mile in one minute, 29 4/5 seconds. The old mark was set at 1:49 3/5 by Frank Miller last year. Cannady, Miller each ran 110 yards, Dowling sprinted 220 yards and White stepped off the 440.

Russell, Miller, Cannady and Dowling set a record of 45 seconds in the 440-yard relay. Plumb and Waco covered 100 yards in 19 1/10 seconds to win the century over a field that included Russell of Grant, Grayson of Jefferson and Pamie of Washington.

STARS APPEAR
Jackson of Vancouver narrowly missed a record in the pole vault when he brushed the bar with his arm when it was set at 11 feet eight inches. Two inches higher than the existing mark. He vaulted 11 feet three inches to win the event.

College trackmen performed in exhibitions for the benefit of more than 500 preppers assembled for the competition. Ed Genung, national intercollegiate half-mile champion of the University of Washington, set a new record in the 440-yard dash, clipping 2-10 of a second off the previous record set by himself earlier this year.

Physical Work Declared Aid To Intellectual

EUGENE, Ore., April 18. (UP)—Physical education is a prominent factor in the development of intellectual faculties in addition to the development of skill, Dr. P. Bovard, dean of the school of physical education at the University of Oregon, said here today in a main address at a meeting of the Oregon State Physical Education association.

Physical education must establish itself as part of the general educational program, Dr. Bovard said. He said it must develop research along definite lines and use scientific methods to evaluate physical education.

Other speakers included Ruth Robinson, director of physical education for women at Oregon State college; E. R. Knollin, associate professor at the University of Oregon; Jack W. Heston, swimming instructor at Oregon; and Robert Krohn, Portland, president of the state association.

GOLF as the STARS play it

What are the fundamentals of the cocked wrists.

A cocked wrist gives a player the feeling of punch and power. If the wrists are not cocked you are putting the control of the swing into the body.

The power behind the carpenter's hammer comes from the cocking of the wrist and not the muscle of the body. Try swinging a hammer with an uncocked wrist and you will note the lack of power.

Remember the wrists are the hinges of your golf swing connecting the hands with the body. If they are stiff and not working freely they act the same as a rusty hinge on a door.

A cocked wrist gives you that needed distance. I know of many golfers who can outdrive players whose their size and strength through their ability to use the wrists properly.

3,000 Athletes From 300 Colleges Will Compete In Annual Pennsylvania Relay

NEW YORK, April 18. (UP)—Approximately 3,000 athletes representing 300 colleges and high schools in all parts of the United States have been nominated to compete in the annual University of Pennsylvania relay carnival next Friday and Saturday.

On the same day almost an equal number of track and field stars will participate in the Drake relays at Des Moines.

PLAN 95 EVENTS

The program for the thirty-seventh renewal of the Pennsylvania relay carnival, an indoor intercollegiate championship, most of them for college entrants. The 12 special events include the 100-yard and the 400-yard dash.

Three special event winners of last year will defend their titles. The 100-yard dash winner, J. C. Hatfield of Indiana, winner of the 120-yard high hurdles and William O'Connor of Columbia, high jump champion.

CORVALLIS, April 18. (UP)—Irene Ekstrom, student at Franklin high school, Portland, won highest honors today in the ninth annual state high school typing contest at Oregon State college. She won the accuracy and novice decision gold medals.

Myrtle Point won team honors and Medford was a close second. Medford captured second place for the third year, winning permanent possession of the second place cup. Dallas, last year's champion, was third, and Klamath Falls fourth.

Mary Ellen Harley, Myrtle point, broke the amateur division record with a speed of 77.13 words a minute. Grant high school, Portland, won the cup for the greatest team accuracy with a record of 55.52 words a minute.

Kloise Crowley, Myrtle Point, was second in the novice class and Margaret Childers, Medford, was third.

Forty-three teams competed for awards.

SWIFT EQUALS HUNDRED MARK

Washington State Sprinter Takes Kansas Relay 100 in 9.5 Flat

LAWRENCE, Kas., April 18. (UP)—Equaling the world's record for the 100-yard dash, Paul Swift, of Washington State, today furnished the outstanding performance of the ninth annual Kansas relays, which saw two intercollegiate and six Kansas relays marks eclipsed by the brilliant performance of track and field stars.

The relays were run off under perfect weather conditions before a crowd of more than 7,000.

Swift, stepping the 100-yard distance in 9.5 seconds, triumphed by several feet over Peyton Glass, highly touted Oklahoma A. & M. sprint star, and equalled the great time of Eddie Tolan, Michigan's "midnight express," who holds the world's record for the event.

An intercollegiate record fell as Coach Brutus Hamilton's University of Kansas half-mile relay team rans up a time of 1 minute 26.5 seconds, one-tenth of a second faster than the old mark.

The Kansas runners, Coffman, Sichel, Gridley, and Klancr, started fast, took the lead, and held it to the end.

To the University of Illinois four-mile relay team went the honor of lowering an intercollegiate mark. The Illinois runners, stepped off the distance, 49.2 seconds.

James A. Bauch, former University of Kansas all-around star who now wears the colors of the Kansas city athletic club, eclipsed the American mark to win the special deration event at the relays, which was run off yesterday and this morning.

At first officials believed the defending champion Wilson, (Husker) Charles, Haskell, Ind., star, had repeated, but a check-up of the time of the 1,500 meter run showed an error of more than 20 seconds against Bauch, and he received enough additional points to give him the victory by a comfortable margin.

The final score was, Bauch, 7,814.2295, and Charles, 7,714.1265.

This score set a new Kansas relay mark, and surpassed the American record of 7,784.680, established by Kenneth Doherty of the college of the city of Detroit.

Oregon Staters Beat Willamette

CORVALLIS, April 18. (UP)—Three-run rally tied the seventh and four runs in the eighth gave Oregon State college a 10 to 7 victory over the Willamette university baseball team here today.

Woodward, Oregon State pitcher, held Willamette in check until the ninth when the Beavers scored four runs. Buck Grayson, Oregon State captain, hit safely three times. Gretsch was touched for 11 hits.

One national intercollegiate record was broken as California's only golfer, who Ken Churchill threw the javelin 220 feet nine inches.

The Stanford relay team set the first new Stanford-California record when Shove, Hables, Howell and Eastman ran the mile in the fast time of three minutes 17.5 seconds. The other best record was set by Captain "Pudge" Smith of Stanford when he ran the 220-yard low hurdles in 23.5 seconds.

Nisbet of Stanford defeated Captain Smith in the 120-yard high hurdles in 15.2 seconds to tie the meet record and "Hec" Dyer, Stanford flier, ran the 220-yard dash in 21.4 seconds, as fast as it has been run in the dual meet.

COLUMBIA BEATS NAVY

First Eastern Regatta Witnessed by 50,000 Along Harlem

NEW YORK, April 18. (UP)—Columbia's light blue crew speeded to easy victory over the navy in the first eastern regatta of the 1931 season today. The race was held over a course of one and one-half miles on the Harlem river. Columbia won by 1 1/2 lengths in 6 minutes, 4.8 seconds. Navy's time was 6:11.

The race was rowed under nearly ideal weather conditions. A crowd estimated at more than 50,000 lined the sidewalk with a naive disregard for pedestrians and for perambulators containing squalling babies. Only when a lamp post was reached, did the truck driver give in and move over into the road.

Navy was the second crew all the way from the start. Columbia began with a stroke of nearly 26 to the minute, and Navy was at 32. Columbia held its lead of 36 until the body of the race was reached and then dropped back to a steady 35, staying at that beat until the finish line was crossed.
