



PORTLAND WINS FIRST HOME GAME

Jumps Back in Tie With Sacramento, Angels in Top Place

SAN FRANCISCO, April 21. (UP)—Portland fans saw their first baseball of the two-week old season today and cheered the Beavers in a ninth inning rally that sent them back into a tie with Sacramento and Los Angeles for first place of the Pacific Coast league.

After trailing from the start and being one run behind when they went into the last of the ninth, the Beavers bunched hits to score two runs for a 4 to 3 victory over Hollywood.

SEALS BEAT SACS
Another close game was played by Los Angeles and Oakland with the Angels winning 8 to 7 and staying even with Portland. Los Angeles was seriously threatened by the hitting of Reese, Oakland star, who pounded out homers in the fourth and sixth innings.

Sacramento's Senators lost sole ownership of first place when the San Francisco Seals matched their ninth inning rally to gain an 11 to 10 victory.

SEATTLE FIOPS
The Seals sported ahead in the sixth inning when Oana and Hunt hitting homers, they scored six runs. The Senators scored twice in the first of the ninth, however, and regained the lead. The Seals came back with two runs in the last half to win. Seattle had a miserable opening game in its home park, losing to the Missions by a score of 15 to 5.

PADLOCKING OF CAFES AND HOTELS PLAN

SEATTLE, April 21 (UP)—Hotels and cabarets here today faced threats of padlocking, as the result of a general warning issued by federal prohibition agents against the sale or use of liquor on the premises.

The general warning followed an announcement that the Club Victor, center of the night life here, would be padlocked for a year. The club will be closed as soon as a final decree is prepared by Assistant United States Attorney Cameron Sherwood on an order from the federal judge, George M. Bonaguidi.

It was alleged that the Club Victor provided cracked ice, ginger ale and other accessories for mixing drinks, although it did not provide liquor for its patrons.

Any evidence of violation of the prohibition law will be followed immediately by sweeping raids and padlocking, prohibition authorities declared.

J. Bradburn Faces Stiff Sentence, Fine

John Bradburn, charged with driving while intoxicated, faces a minimum sentence of 6 days in the county jail and a fine of \$100 or a maximum of six months in jail and a fine of \$500 as a result of his pleading guilty to the charge before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes yesterday.

After formerly entering a plea of not guilty the plea was changed to guilty yesterday after the state had presented its case. The state called Dr. Paul Sharp, examining physician, Police Officer Ray Lyons, and J. P. Helm, William McCluskey and Howard Tryon who were in a car which was allegedly struck by Bradburn.

Hardin Blackmer, deputy district attorney, represented the state, while Sam Jettmore was defense attorney. Sentence will be passed at 2 p. m. today.

Chick Hafey To Talk Over Terms

CHICAGO, April 21. (UP)—Chick Hafey, St. Louis Cardinal, holdout, will confer with President Sam Breaden at St. Louis tomorrow. It was learned today before the Cardinals departed for home, Hafey, one of the leading outfielders of the National league, is said to be ready to reduce his salary demands.

GOLF as the STARS play it



Should one reach for the ball at address?

Reaching for the ball causes a tension in the spinal column which must be avoided in the golf swing. One is more apt to slice with this stance due to the flat swing. No doubt you have often noticed how much straighter you can shoot with the shorter stance, due to a round and compact swing. To achieve a nice round swing one must keep the hands close to the body which is impossible by reaching or using the flat swing. Reaching also throws one off balance causing you to fall into the shot which in turn causes you to heel the shot, hit the ground, or miss the ball entirely.

The illustration of Bobby Jones in the proper stance to take at address. Note how he avoids any tension, is loose and keeps his hands close to the body.

ROBINS AND A'S SLOW IN FIRST GAMES

Both Teams Favored To Win Pennants But Occupy Cellular Berths

NEW YORK, April 21 (UP)—Brooklyn's Robins and the Philadelphia Athletics, highly rated in pre-season forecasts, are experiencing difficulty in striking a winning pace.

Both clubs were defeated today and they will make their official home debuts tomorrow as "cellar-champions" of the National and American leagues.

LOSE 6 OF 7
Brooklyn became sole occupant of the National league cellar today, dropping a 7 to 3 decision to the Philadelphia Phillies for the sixth defeat in seven major league starts.

The Robins got away to a one-run lead on Babe Herman's homer in the third, only to have the Phillies rally in the last half and clinch the game with a four-run assault on Lefty Helmsch.

The Athletics took a 12 to 1 drubbing at the hands of the New York Yankees and remained in a triple tie with Detroit and Boston for the tail-end rating in the American league. The Athletics now have lost two successive series, dropping three out of four games at Washington and two out of three at New York.

Herb Pennock led the Yanks to their victory, which enabled them to retain a triple tie with Washington and Cleveland for league leadership. Pennock held the A's to seven hits.

Washington avenged yesterday's drubbing at the hands of the Boston Red Sox, 12 to 2, and kept pace with the Yanks. The Senators pounded four pitchers for 16 hits.

Cleveland remained tied with New York and Washington at five victories and two defeats each, by virtue of a 5 to 4 triumph over Detroit. The Indians scored twice in the first and added a pair in the eighth, but almost lost the game when Brown weakened and allowed four runs in the ninth.

Ferrell checked the Detroit rally and Foushee's single scored Hunnefeld with the winning run in the home half.

The St. Louis Cardinals retained sole possession of first place in the National league, when their scheduled game with the Chicago Cubs was postponed because of cold weather, as was the St. Louis-Chicago American league tilt at St. Louis.

Boston's Braves took second place in the National, by downing the New York Giants, 5 to 1. Big Ed Brandt held the Giants to five hits and pitched shutout ball after the first inning. Boston tied the score at one all in the first, and took the lead by scoring two runs off Douchess in the sixth. An additional pair of scores off the pitcher in the eighth clinched the contest.

The remaining National league teams, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, were not scheduled to play.

Kid Berg Gets Title Belt, To Fight Canzoneri

CHICAGO, April 21. (UP)—Jack (Kid) Berg of England, who meets Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion, in a title bout here Friday night, was presented today with the National Boxing association belt, emblematic of the junior welterweight title, by General John V. Cinnis, president of the N. B. A.

Berg won the 140 pound title from Muehy Callahan at London in February, 1929.

Oakland Shieks Tie Checkers, Win Title Again

OAKLAND, Calif., April 21. (UP)—The Oakland Shieks tonight won the California ice hockey league championship for the third consecutive year.

Entering the fourth game of the title series needing either a victory or a tie to gain the banner, the Shieks held the Oakland Checkers to a deadlock, three-all.

The Shieks had won the regular season by a margin of four points, and the rules specify that if the post season playoff ends in a tie the champion shall be the team that won the regular season. Since the Shieks had won two games and lost one prior to tonight's encounter, the Checkers could have done no better than tie them or the series was declared ended.

Dust Cloud Is Over Portland, Warn Aviators

PORTLAND, April 21. (UP)—A cloud of fine powdery dust swept down upon this city tonight making it appear, when viewed from tops of high buildings or from the crest of surrounding heights, as if portions of the city were temporarily blotted out of existence.

The dust storm, according to reports from the weather bureau, originated somewhere around The Dalles, Arlington or Umatilla, and was swept down the Columbia gorge by a wind that reached a velocity as high as 50 miles an hour.

Aviators were wireless warnings from here, as soon as the storm appeared.

Frank Hawkes on Non-Stop Trip London To Rome

LONDON, April 22. (UP)—Capt. Frank Hawkes, American flier, took off at Heston airfield at 6:25 a. m. (12:25 a. m. E.S.T.) in an attempt to make a record non-stop flight to Rome.

Hawkes planned to reach Rome within five hours and to arrive back in London, after a stop in Paris, by midnight.

Hawkes made a perfect takeoff just as the sun was rising. His mechanic had difficulty in starting the motor and Hawkes climbed out of the cockpit and started it with a single turn of the propeller. Only a few officials and movie cameramen were at the field when he left.

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JUDGE LANDIS IS SUSTAINED BY U. S. COURT

Fred Bennett Free Agent After Browns Violate Baseball Rules

CHICAGO, April 21 (UP)—Kenosaw Mountain Landis' power as the supreme authority of professional baseball was upheld today in federal court when Judge Walter C. Lindley rendered a decision in the Fred Bennett case.

Judge Lindley, in refusing to restrain the high commissioner of baseball from interfering with the transfer of Bennett, an outfielder, from the St. Louis Browns to the Milwaukee Brewers, ruled that Landis had acted clearly within his legal authority when he declared the ball player a free agent.

Three-Cushion Tourney Enters Fifth Contests

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., April 21. (UP)—Lewis N. Vozler of Indianapolis came from behind to defeat H. N. Purdy of Atlanta in the fifth game of the national amateur three-cushion billiard championship here today, 50-45, in 69 innings.

Robert H. Harper, Denver, president champion, defeated Anthony N. Cleet, Beaumont, Texas, in the second afternoon match, 50-27, in 63 innings.

Joseph Hall of San Francisco, coast titleholder, defeated Louis N. Vozler of Indianapolis in the final game of the night by a score of 50 to 20 in 52 innings. It was the best game of the tournament.

Hall made his total in 54 minutes, just two minutes under the record held by J. N. Bozeman of Vallejo, Calif.

Another surprise was added to the record of Walter Schwietzka, of Champaign, when he triumphed over Frank L. Fleming, also of Champaign, in the first game on the evening program, winning by 50 to 41 in 60 innings. Schwietzka defeated Joseph Hall of San Francisco, the 1930 tournament winner, last night.

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Fight Results

BOSTON, April 21. (UP)—Johnny Risko, Cleveland boxer, defeated King Levinsky of Chicago, in a slow 10-round bout at Boston arena tonight.

The Cleveland boxer won virtually every round by a wide margin, scoring almost at will with rights and lefts to the body.

The fight was largely Risko's throughout. The fourth round, however, proved nothing more than a "hugging" match, the two boxers clinching continually and jabbing light, short punches. Risko weighed 192½ pounds; Levinsky, 185.

In the semi-final George Pavlovich, also of Cleveland, won an eight-round decision from Unwin Winston of Waterbury, Conn.

Record Crowd Sees London Throw Russian

CHICAGO, April 21. (UP)—A record-breaking crowd of 17,250 persons paid \$31,419 tonight to see Jim London decisively defeat Kola Kwarant of Russia in the final match of the first wrestling program ever held in Chicago stadium.

London weighed 193. Kwarant, 212. London took the first fall in 59 minutes, 9 seconds, and the second in three minutes, 41 seconds.

Jim McMillan, 215, Chicago, threw Fred Grover, 192, of Iowa, in 21 minutes, 20 seconds.

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
