SAN MATEO, Calif., April 22 (UP)—Felix Roberts, 16, of Wimpag, an apprentice jockey, died tonight from injuries received when thrown from a horse during the last race at Tanforan track near here this afternoon.

Roberts was up on Laumala, a temperamental four-year-old gelding. But as the horse reared a gate, Laumala abruptly shied. The jockey went out of the saddle and over the side of the track. He landed on a sprinkling wagon. His neck was broken.

After throwing Roberts, the horse hurdled the fence.

Roberts had a reputation for winning the first race in which he competed a short time ago.

What causes hitting the ground behind the ball?

Hitting the ground may be a case of improper pivoting. Instead of turning at the hips, a player may be dropping the left shoulder on the backswing. The result is the dropping of the left shoulder on the downswing. The dropping of the left shoulder is caused by keeping too much of the weight on the left leg during the backswing. Instead of shifting it over against a stiffened right leg.

Chick Evans, amateur champion in 1916 and 1920, says, "A player in his haste to hit the ball causes the path it followed in going up. The clubhead thus hurried down dips into the ground just back of the ball. This happens because the right shoulder drops, with the pressing on the club."

YANKS TAKE FIRST PLACE IN AMERICAN

Cards Maintain Position At Top of Nationals; A's Trim Senators

NEW YORK, April 22 (UP)—The St. Louis Cardinals maintained their place at the top of the National League standings today and the New York Yankees swept past Cleveland and Washington to take undisputed possession of the top rung in the American league.

The Yankees' 7 to 5 victory over the Boston Red Sox while Washington and Cleveland were losing eased the New Yorkers into first place. The triumph was a costly one, however, for Babe Ruth, sparking off the Yankee offense and defense, was carried from the field into an ambulance. The Babe pulled a tendon while chasing a fly in the sixth inning and was rushed to the hospital.

AS BEST SOLONS Ruth is expected to be out a week or 10 days. His absence will not only slow down the Yankees but will put a serious crimp in his home run ambitions.

Behind the strong pitching of Lefty Grove, the world champion Athletics rallied to whip Washington, 5 to 1. The defeat dropped the Senators into a tie with the Cleveland Indians for second place. The Indians were able to get but eight hits off Pat Caraway and were defeated 10 to 2 by the Chicago White Sox.

The other scheduled American league game between the St. Louis Browns and Detroit Tigers was rained out.

CARDS WHIP REDS The Cardinals stayed on top by virtue of a 2 to 2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds. Trailing 1 to 2 when they went to bat in the seventh, the Cards picked up a run to tie the score and added the winning tally in the eighth. St. Johnson and Lindsey held the Reds to four hits while St. Louis blasted Kolp and Frey for 13.

Same 22,000 hopeful Brooklyn fans were on hand to see their beloved Robins make their official 1931 home debut, by losing, 4 to 6 to the Boston Braves. Ancient Tom Zachary held the alleged Robin sluggers to four unimpressive hits. Phelps pitched eight innings for Brooklyn and gave but six hits. His mates, however, continued their sloppy work, turning in four errors.

In the ninth inning Manager Robinson showed his disgust with the weak hitting of his famous sluggers by sending in Finn to pinch-hit for Herman and Bressler to bat for O'Doul.

The New York Giants took another one from the Phillies, this time by the score of 5 to 4. Clarence Mitchell, venerable spitballer, was the winning pitcher. The Phillies used their usual three hurlers. Critz, giant second baseman, hit a home run.

Chicago and Pittsburgh were rained out.

LEADERS LOSE, STAY IN TIE

Oaks Take Angels; Seals Troupe Sacs And Stars Win 5-2

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22 (UP)—Leaders of the Pacific Coast league suffered setbacks today. Oakland beat Los Angeles, 5 to 4, in 11 innings. The San Francisco Seals trounced Sacramento, 12 to 2, and Hollywood rallied to beat Portland, 5 to 2. The three losers remained in a tie for first place, however, as their closest rival, the San Francisco Mission, was being beaten by Seattle, 12 to 7.

The closest game was at Los Angeles. Oakland took a three-run lead off Herrmann, who started for the Angels, in the first inning. Jacob's homer in the fourth started the Angels on their way, and by the end of the sixth the teams were tied, four all. The Oaks broke the deadlock with one run in the first of the seventh.

A home run by Johnson in the sixth inning gave the Beavers a one run lead but Hollywood scored four times in the next inning, when Severid homed.

Two home runs by Holland helped Seattle to its fifth victory since the season opened. The Seals led Sacramento from the start.

SEATTLE, April 22 (UP)—Freddie Steele, Tacoma junior welterweight, kayoed Teddy Palacio, Los Angeles, after fifteen seconds of fighting in the first round of their ten-round main event here tonight.

It was a fast six-round semi-final. Jimmy Britt, Tacoma welterweight, fought to a draw with Joe Cortez, Boise, Idaho.

A large, well-leashed crowd witnessed the fights.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., April 22 (UP)—Joseph Hall of San Francisco defeated Anthony N. Ciosi of Beaumont, Tex., in the eighth game of the national amateur three-cushion billiard championship today, 50-45, in 117 innings, setting a new long-running record. The game lasted 150 hours.

Frank I. Fleming of Champaign moved into a triple tie for second place when he defeated Robert H. Harper, Denver, Colo., defending title holder, 50 to 47 in 75 innings.

Walter S. Schwietzka of Champaign, won his third straight victory and took undisputed possession of first place when he defeated Harry N. Purdy, of Atlanta, southeastern champion, 50 to 41, in 88 innings.

Lewis M. Vogler, Indianapolis, three times a runner-up for the national crown, advanced into a four way tie for second place honors tonight by turning back Ciosi 50 to 22 in 69 innings.
