



CANZONERI, BERG FIGHT IS TONIGHT

First International Bout For Lightweight Title In 14 Years

CHICAGO, April 23. (UP)—The first international lightweight championship bout in 14 years will take place at the Chicago stadium tomorrow night when Tony Canzoneri of New York, 135-pound titleholder, meets Jack (Kid) Berg of England over the 10-round route.

Berg gave Canzoneri one of the worst defeats of the latter's career in January, 1926, in a 10-round bout in New York City, and tonight was an 8-5 favorite to repeat his earlier triumph.

Canzoneri, who won the lightweight title by knocking out Al Singer of New York in 46 seconds at fighting November 14, last year, will pin his hopes for victory on a knockout. In his first meeting with the English whirlwind, Canzoneri had Berg groggy in the opening round but couldn't finish him and tired so badly in the closing rounds that Berg easily won the decision.

As Berg holds the junior-welterweight title, two championships will be at stake in the same bout for the first time in pugilistic history. The winner will leave the ring lightweight and junior welterweight champion.

BLUE BOY IN LONG BEACH RACE LEAD

SANTA BARBARA, April 23. (UP)—The Blue Boy, skippered by Carl Goetz, of Long Beach Yacht club, today led 11 powerboats into Santa Barbara harbor, first night's stop on a 371-mile race from Long Beach to San Francisco.

The Blue Boy, winner of last year's race, arrived at 2:24 p. m., bettering its 1930 time by 10 minutes.

The starting cannon was fired at Long Beach at 8:58 a. m., making the Blue Boy's time 5 hours, 25 minutes.

Zoa III, owned by Arthur McCrea, Long Beach Yacht club, was second, finished at 2:39:17.

Leaving Santa Barbara tomorrow, the fleet will proceed to Monterey and from there to San Francisco.

BOSTON, April 23. (UP)—Babe Ruth, baseball's highest salaried player, showed "continued improvement" at the Peter Bent Brigham hospital tonight where he lay with an injured leg.

Ruth collapsed in the sixth inning of yesterday's Red Sox-Yankees game at Fenway park while chasing a fly in left field. Previously in the game he had turned an ankle sliding home from third base. Since having been admitted to the hospital he has improved almost hourly and today he was able to sit up in bed and enjoy an occasional cigar.

It may be at least three days or perhaps a week or more before the Yankees' home run slugger leaves the hospital. Hospital attaches said today that after his release Ruth would have to rest up for a "short period."

Veteran Guest Tightens Hold On U. S. Title

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., April 23. (UP)—Walter Schweitzer, veteran Champaign cyclist, won his fourth straight game and increased his hold on first place in the national amateur three-cushion billiard championship by defeating Anthony N. Cline, of Beaumont, Texas, today, 50-25, in 75 innings.

H. B. Purdy of Atlanta furnished an upset when he defeated Joseph Hall of San Francisco, 19-9, in the first afternoon game, 50-45, in 51 innings.

Robert H. Harper, Denver, defending champion, came from behind tonight to defeat Lewis M. Vogler of Indianapolis, 50 to 47 in 63 innings. Trailing 24 to 23 at the end of the 31st inning, Harper scored 17 points in the next seven innings to take the lead 48 to 45. He ran out four innings later.

The victory pulled Harper into a tie for second place, with three victories and one defeat. In the final night game Frank J. Fleming, Champaign, defeated Harry N. Purdy of Atlanta by 50 to 29 in 59 innings, and remained in a tie with Harper for second honors.

Gough Named Huntington Park Coach

REDLANDS, Calif., April 23. (UP)—John M. Gough, coach at Huntington Park high school, has been selected to succeed Len Trine as head football coach at the University of Redlands. It was announced today.

Gough has accepted. He came to California from Iowa, where he had state championship teams in 1926 and 1927. At Huntington Park last fall, he coached the Spartans to a tie for second place in the Bay league.

Gough will assume his duties September 1. In addition to football, he will coach freshman athletics. Trine, who resigned at the close of last football season, will enter business.

PENN RELAY MEET OPENS

Three Thousand Athletes Will Compete in 95 Events Two Days

PHILADELPHIA, April 23. (UP)—An army of nearly 3,000 college and high school athletes from all parts of the United States was camped in this city today awaiting the running of the 37th annual Penn relays here tomorrow and Saturday.

It was a trifle cold and a bit blustery today and few of the athletes ventured forth from their hotels for warming-up exercises. Fair and warmer is the weather prediction for tomorrow, but hot or cold, wet or dry, the 3,000 will be out in full force to convert Franklin field into something more elaborate than a three-ring circus.

ONE-MAN TEAM

No less than 95 events will be contested during the two-day meet. Stand-out attractions on tomorrow's program are the decathlon, inter-collegiate quarter-mile relay, intercollegiate distance medley relay, intercollegiate spring medley relay, intercollegiate quarter-mile relay, and the intercollegiate 120-yard high hurdles.

Barney Belkner, Pennsylvania's "one man track team," is a decided favorite to win the decathlon title for the third successive year.

New State Game Code Received in Klamath Falls

A copy of the new game code has been received in Klamath Falls. Local fishermen will be particularly interested in regulations for fishing in Diamond Lake, Fish Lake and Lake of the Woods. The new game code reads as follows:

The open season in Diamond Lake shall be from June 1 to November 30, both dates inclusive. Bag limit 15 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed five fish in any one day or 20 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 25 fish in any seven consecutive days.

The open season in Fish Lake, Jackson county, shall be from April 15 to August 15, both dates inclusive. Bag limits 10 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 10 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 20 pounds and one fish but not to exceed 20 fish in any seven consecutive days.

The open season in Lake of the Woods, Klamath county shall be from June 1 to November 30, of each year, both dates inclusive. Bag limit 10 pounds and one fish, but not to exceed 20 fish in any one day or 20 pounds and one fish but not to exceed 40 fish in any seven consecutive days.

COLLEGE ATHLETICS DEFENDED

DES MOINES, Iowa, April 23. (UP)—College athletics and football in particular, were defended in speeches made here tonight at a banquet honoring the tenth anniversary of Ossie Boen as football coach at Drake university.

Major John L. Griffith, commissioner of athletics of the Big Ten, said that football might be killed as a college sport but that it would never die as a game.

The politicians, professional promoters and the newspapers will gladly assume the responsibility of promoting football if the colleges do not wish to administer the game," said Griffith.

"In my judgment college football not only has a firmer place in the hearts of the American people today than ever before but it is being administered honestly. It has been integrated with the other university departments and next fall with unabated interest the great American public will again turn its attention to this game."
