

LEGISLATURE TO MAINTAIN FAST PACE

Major Problems Settled And Others Well On Way to Passage

SACRAMENTO, April 24. (U P)—Plans to maintain the fast pace set by the legislature during the week were being made here tonight by state leaders.

Adjournment today for the week marked the close of the most successful week of the session, with a number of major problems solved and others well on their way to passage.

BOLPH SIGNS BILLS

With the reappointment and budget bills signed by the governor, and \$5,000,000 in special appropriation bills approved by senate and assembly committees to virtually complete the state's financial setup for the biennium, every effort will be made next week to clear the files of the major controversial.

The senate today approved what will probably be the last of a long series of legislative investigations, when Lieutenant Governor Frank F. Merriam appointed a committee of three senators to conduct a probe of the \$110,000 state purchased by the state in Kern county for a new state prison for women.

WATER FIGHT NEXT

Senators Walter H. Duval, Santa Paula; John L. Moran, Corning; and Henry E. Carter, Los Angeles, will leave here May 1 for Bakersfield to determine whether the prison site has an

adequate water supply. Building operations will be held up pending the filing of their report.

Senator Bradford S. Crittenden, Stockton, tonight was prepared to wage a final fight Monday for the passage of his proposed constitutional amendment setting up plans for a coordinated water conservation plan for northern and southern California.

Crittenden expressed the belief the amended bill would prove acceptable and the conservation committee will send the measure to the senate.

TRY FOR ACTION

Every attempt will be made to set favorable action in order to preclude the possibility of a special session of the legislature as threatened by Governor Rolph if the lawmakers failed to offer no means of alleviating the water situation.

Another bitter fight is expected in the senate Tuesday when Senator Will R. Sharkey, Martinez, seeks a final vote on his bills providing partial state control of the oil industry.

The bills provide for the creation of a state oil commission and the proration of oil production as a conservation policy. Many of California's independent oil producers have made a strong fight against the bills, and champions of the two factions are expected to tangle on the floor of the senate.

ANTI-HANGING BILLS

Meetings of the lower house next week will be featured by action on the so-called anti-hanging bills to abolish capital punishment, while the criminal law revision committee of Senator G. Rochester, Los Angeles, will take under consideration the bill to substitute lethal gas for the gallows in state executions.

Proponents of the "home rule" plan for the San Francisco harbor won a victory in the assembly today when a bill taking control of the harbor and giving it to a board appointed by San Francisco city officials was passed by a vote of 44 to 17.

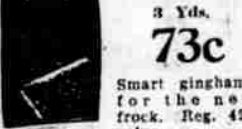

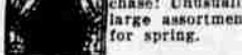
