GOLF as the STARS play it



Explain the proper pivot for the golf swing.

The pivot usually takes care of itself. In taking back the club-head, the left shoulder should be turned without permitting it to drop. While this goes on, the weight gradually is shifted from the left to the right foot without swaying and without turning the head. The natural result of this is a slight bend in the left knee and the raising of the left heel.

The golfer may ask how to keep from swaying. My answer to this is to put the weight against a firm right leg and concentrate on keeping the head still.

As the club comes down in the downswing, the opposite action takes place—the body turns to the left, the weight is shifted to the left foot and the ball is hit.

Helene Madison Adds Another Record to List

DETROIT, April 25. (UP)—Miss Helene Madison, record-smashing swimmer from Seattle, added another world mark to her collection tonight when she swam the 500 meters distance in 7 minutes, 12 seconds.

After getting away to a slow start, Miss Madison went ahead to clip six seconds from the world mark of 7:18, set in Belgium in 1926 by Barie Braun. It marked the thirteenth world record she has established. The old American record was 7:19.6. Miss Madison swam in a special exhibition at the Detroit Yacht club.

In a 200-yard relay race the women's team from the Washington A. C., Seattle, tied the American record of 1:57.6 and came within two seconds of the world record. The west coast quartet swam against a picked team of Michigan aquatic stars.

At the start of the final lap, which Miss Madison covered, the teams were on even terms, but Miss Madison quickly drew away to finish first by a wide margin.

Other members of the Seattle team were Edna McKibbin, Dawn Gilson and Lucy Schacht.

AL YOUNG PLANS OPEN AIR BATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 25. (UP)—Al Young, San Francisco promoter, today obtained permission from the California Boying commission to hold an open air show July 4 involving the appearance of Young Jack Thompson, welterweight champion.

The commission reinstated Tim McGrath, manager of Leon "Bomber" Chevalier, negro heavyweight. McGrath had been suspended nearly a year, following the "episode of the dirty towel" in the Carnera-Chevalier "fight" in Oakland.

Benny Cello, San Francisco lightweight, was refused an application for status as state lightweight champion and advised instead to fight Tod Morgan, former junior lightweight champion.

Tommy La Salle, Los Angeles boxer who was suspended when a young girl was found dead after a party La Salle attended, was reinstated, in view of a coroner's exonerations.

Charlie Wiener, manager of Battling Dozier, negro welter, asked the commission to force Young Corbett III, to fight Dozier. Dr. Harry Martin, southern California member of the commission, replied that the commission was not forcing "any particular matches."

The Thompson application, however, was later partially disposed of when the commission agreed in the attitude that Thompson must fight Corbett for his title when and if Thompson fights in California.

The application of Max Baer for reinstatement was denied without comment.

Winston Fuller Wins Collegiate Championship

LOS ANGELES, April 25. (UP)—The intercollegiate golf championship tournament was won today by Winston Fuller, U. S. C. L. A., five and four in the 36-hole final.

Kent kept abreast of Columbia's yearlings for half the 15-16 miles distance of the race, but the New Yorkers drew away in the closing half to win by three lengths.

Hundreds of spectators lined the course of the race.

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RACES THRILL DURING PENN RELAY MEET

One Mile Relay Record Of 17 Years' Standing Tied by Penn

FRANKLIN FIELD, Philadelphia, April 25. (UP)—Defying a cold and drenching rain, some 30,000 spectators and 2,500 college and high school athletes gathered today for the second and closing day of the 37th annual Penn relay carnival.

The afternoon was climaxed by Pennsylvania's mighty efforts in the one-mile and four-mile college relay for the championship of America. In the one-mile event a Penn team of Bill Carr, Jack Edwards, Horace Steele and Jimmy Healey traveled the distance in 3 minutes, 18 seconds, to tie the 16-year-old mark established in 1915.

The boys' performance is made all the more remarkable when it is remembered that the immortal Ted Meredith ran on the 1915 outfit.

Penn failed to break the four-mile mark but added and abetted by Cornell and Harvard, the Red and Blue staged the most thrilling race on Franklin Field in the last decade.

Coan, Martin and Cobb, anchor men for the three schools in the order named, turned into the home-stretch on the last mile less than six yards apart. As they hit the home chute, Coan, who ran a 4:13 indoors mile last winter, unleashed his "kick." But he failed to move ahead, for Cobb of Harvard answered and they ran shoulder to shoulder to within 20 yards of the tape.

At this point, Martin, an unknown, cut loose with a drive that drove him past Cobb six feet from the rear and within a breath of Coan. They finished in that order, with Penn's winning time being 13 minutes 2 4-10 seconds.

A high, smooth-stepping Yale trio cracked the 480-yard shuttle record with a time of 1 minute, 3 4-10 seconds. The old mark of 1-10th of a second slower was established in 1929 by Army.

Another record went by the boards when husky Clarence Munn, Minnesota, finished with the 14-pound shot. Munn's throw

of 45 feet 7 5-8 inches topped the previous best toss by more than five inches.

The last record to fall came in the javelin throw when George Williams of Hampton spun the shaft 187 feet 1 1-2 inches.

Another race decided by inches came in the 100-yard dash when Morton Lamb of Lehigh streaked his way down the soggy track in 10 seconds flat. His time, while slow when compared to the best, was highly creditable on such a treacherous footing.

Ohio State, victor in two important relays yesterday, gained further laurels today by running first in the two-mile college relay. The Scarlet team of Dille, Blier and Beetham, negotiated the distance in 7 minutes 52 2-10 seconds.

Army broke into the winning column in the half-mile college relay, the Soldiers winning in the nice time of 1 minute, 29 3-10 seconds.

The Philadelphia Athletics continued their sensational play and made it three straight over the Washington Senators, 3 to 2. Walberg held Washington to six hits while Brown allowed Philadelphia but five, one of them a home run by Simmons. The victory enabled the Athletics to climb into a tie with Washington and Detroit for third place.

Detroit made it three in a row by whipping St. Louis, 3 to 1. Hoyt held the Browns to five hits while Coffman yielded six.

The clash of the Atlanta Braves and the Chicago White Sox was postponed because of rain.

Although idle because of rain, the St. Louis Cardinals maintained their national League leadership.

The Boston Braves advanced to within striking distance of first place by whipping Brooklyn, 5 to 4. Brandt held the Robins to seven hits, one of them Babe Herman's fourth home run.

Chicago's Cubs scored six runs in the ninth inning to win from Pittsburgh, 8 to 5. Malone and May held the Pirates to seven hits while the Cubs pounded Kremer, Spencer and Grant for 12.

Arlett's home run in the tenth inning gave the Philadelphia Phillies a 4 to 3 victory over the New York Giants. Dudley allowed the Giants only seven hits but two of them were home runs by Verges and Leslie.

SOX DEFEAT YANKS 5-4; A'S VICTORS
