Greyhound Lines Announce Reduced Round Trip Rates

The first of May will see drastically reduced round trip rates over the Pacific Greyhound lines, according to Kent Walker, local representative.

Tickets with a 15-day return limit will be on sale to all points on the Pacific Greyhound lines at one and one-third the one way fare. As this company operates most of the lines from Portland via Los Angeles to El Paso, Texas, and as far east as Salt Lake City on the northern route, the traveling public of this section is offered a real opportunity of reduced rate travel.

Walker calls attention to the extended return limit of 15 days as compared to the usual excursion of from three to seven days. He also explained that if a passenger should desire to stay longer than the 15 days, he may do so by merely paying the difference between this 15-day round trip

Treatment Of Paralysis Must Be Soon

SALEM, April 27. (UP)—Delayed treatment more than any other factor is responsible for permanent paralysis and deaths.

While serum treatment has reduced fatality of meningitis from 90 to 40 per cent, Federal health officials pointed out that the serum must be administered early and daily until the disease was proved not to be infectious by examination of the spinal fluids.

"Preventive measures are difficult to outline," officials declared. "But the main factor in cure is early discovery, especially in children suffering from apparent colds and fever."

"The patient should be put to bed immediately, and a physician called. Both from the standpoint of cure and end results, parents should take no chances on possibility of their child where suspicious symptoms arise."

ALTURA, April 27. —At a recent meeting of the directors of the Yellowstone Cut-Off association held at Burns, Ore., it was decided to hold the annual meeting of the association at this place on May 8 and 9. Earl Lee Keller, state highway commissioner, is expected to be present together with at least 50 delegates from different sections of California, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.
