STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., April 28. (UP)—Hopes of Stanford for victory over University of Southern California in the annual track meet here Saturday were brighter tonight when the time of the Cardinals' relay team in a practice trial this afternoon was announced.

The teams are so evenly matched that many expect the relay to be a close race. In the practice run, Ben Eastman, Ike Hables, Maynor Shove and Lee Hables covered the mile in three minutes, 13.6 seconds, which is 2.2 seconds faster than the U. S. C. relay team has done in competition this year. Eastman ran his 440-yard lap in 45.1 seconds and the time of Ike Hables was 48.8 seconds.

One of the most common mistakes the average golfer makes is the mistake of getting the body and hands ahead of the club. By doing this you hit the ball while the clubhead is at a distinct angle, causing it to fade to the right.

CUBS, CARDS SHAPE LEAD, BRAVES FALL

Cleveland Rating First Place in American League Race

NEW YORK, April 28. (UP)—Chicago's Cubs and the St. Louis Cardinals, joint favorites to win the 1931 National league pennant, tonight shared the league leadership with seven victories and three defeats each.

The favorites gained the lead today when the Boston Braves fell victim to a ninth-inning rally and lost a 3 to 2 decision to the Philadelphia Phillies. The defeat dropped the Braves from first to third place. St. Louis moved to the top rung by defeating the Pittsburgh Pirates 5 to 2, while the Cubs, although idle, also passed the Braves.

ONE FOR BOOKS

The St. Louis-Pittsburgh game was one for the books. The Cards made only five hits off three Braves pitchers, and committed four fielding errors. Burleigh Grimes allowed the Pirates nine hits, but had the forethought to keep them scattered. It was Grimes' third straight victory of the year.

Brooklyn's ruffled Robins, it seems, just can't win. They dropped a 3 to 2 verdict to the New York Giants today despite the fact that their pitcher, William Watson Clark, allowed but four hits while his mates were rapping Clarence Mitchell for 11.

The Robins now have lost 10 of their first 13 starts. The Chicago-Cincinnati game was postponed out of respect to the memory of Garry Hermann.

INDIANS HOLD LEAD

Cleveland's Indians retained the American league lead, defeating the St. Louis Browns, 10 to 9 in 10 innings. The Browns staged a spectacular eighth-inning rally in the ninth to take the lead, but Cleveland came back to tie the score with three runs in their half and went on to score the winning rally in the tenth.

Pat Caraway pitched the Chicago White Sox to a 6 to 5 victory over the Detroit Tigers. Lorrell and Uhl worked on the Tigers.

The other American league contest played between the New York Yankees and Washington Senators was called at the end of the fourteenth inning with the score tied at 7-all.

ROOKIES ON MANY TEAMS IN MAJORS

Seventeen Seen Regularly in Lineups; Talent Is Found

NEW YORK, April 28. (UP)—Major league box scores present many unfamiliar names this season, with managers of 10 of the 16 teams attempting to strengthen their clubs by the use of promising rookies.

Only three clubs in each league—Philadelphia, Washington and New York in the American, and Chicago, Brooklyn and Pittsburgh in the National—are standing pat on veteran lineups.

17 REGULARS NOW

Of the numerous newcomers who have appeared during the first two weeks of the season, only 17 now are playing regularly and several of these have failed to hit at the clip required to retain their berths.

The Rookie "regulars" are divided among 9 clubs, with 19 playing in the American league and 7 in the National. The Chicago White Sox and Cincinnati Reds have three each; Detroit, the St. Louis Browns, Boston Braves and Boston Red Sox, two each, and Cleveland, the New York Giants and Philadelphia Phillies, one each.

LEADING ROOKIES

Johnny Vergez, New York Giants third baseman, Joe Vosmik, Cleveland infielder and Jim Levey, St. Louis Browns shortstop, are candidates for recognition as the outstanding rookie of the year.

Vergez, Oakland recruit, has "made" the Giants infield and released Fred Lindstrom for outfield duty, thus giving Manager McGraw a club which shapes up as a real pennant contender. He has fielded well and is hitting above the 300 mark.

VOSMIK GOOD HITTER
Vosmik, product of the Cleveland sandlots, has been hitting around the 500 mark and is hailed by Cleveland fans as a worthy successor to Tris Speaker.

Levey's forte is his fielding, and he was not expected to add much power to the attack, but he is hitting over .300 to date and has clinched his position.

Donnie Bush of the White Sox is satisfied with his three young rookies.

Buzz Arlett, veteran coast league slugger, has added a real punch to the Phillies outfield, but Nick Cullip, a terror to American league pitchers, is American league pitcher, is hitting only .240 for Cincinnati.

The Red second rookie outfielder, Crabtree, is under the .175 mark.

J. Kearns Must Show Cause for Alimony Deficit

Five days will be allowed Kearns to answer the court's rule. Mrs. Kearns was granted \$500 a month temporary alimony when she filed for separate maintenance last year, but Kearns failed to meet the payments.

COMMISSION OKAYS HEAVY TITLE BOUT

Carnera - Sharkey Affair Recognized by New York State

NEW YORK, April 28. (UP)—The New York State Boxing commission today gave its formal approval to the proposed 15-round bout between Jack Sharkey and Primo Carnera and thereby took another step in what is generally recognized as its campaign to crown a new world's heavyweight champion.

While the commission said nothing official today, it is expected that the body will declare the bout, scheduled for Ebbets field, Brooklyn, on June 16, to be for the heavyweight title. The commission previously had indicated that titular recognition would go to the winner of a Sharkey-Carnera bout, if such a fight could be arranged.

DETHRONE MAXIE

It was disclosed that the commission had offered the bout to the Madison Square Garden corporation at the time Garden officials were attempting to arrange a match between Max Schmeling

and William Stribling. At the same time the commission tried to force Schmeling to fight Jack Sharkey in accordance with what the New York body claimed was an agreement with the German heavyweight. When the commission's plans fell through, it was decided to dethrone Schmeling.

James Joe Johnston then came into the picture even though the Garden hinted that it would bring legal action to prevent a Carnera-Sharkey bout because Carnera was under contract to the Garden to fight the winner of a Schmeling-Stribling bout.

LITENESS LEAVES SHARKEY
Johnston signed Sharkey and Carnera yesterday. He would have done it sooner but the New York commission kept putting off Carnera's reinstatement until two weeks ago. Carnera was suspended after he took part in an alleged "fake" bout in California.

Just to make everything official, the commission granted a new license to Carnera, reinstated Leon Bee, the Italian's manager and a few minutes later issued See a new license. To wind up the activities for the day the body granted a license to the Dodge Athletic association to stage the Sharkey-Carnera go.
