Klamath Ice and
Storage Starting
Daily Deliveries

Andy Collier of the Klamath Ice and Storage company announced Tuesday that ice depots are being established in three central locations in the city for the convenience of patrons of that company. One of the ice depots has already been established and is open for business at Warren's Union service station, Eleventh and Main streets.

Two other stations, one in east addition, either on South Sixth street or some place in MUIs, and another on Oregon avenue, will be established and opened this week, Mr. Collier stated.

This custom is being established in Klamath Falls following a precedent set by southern cities who have found ice depots so convenient and handy during warm summer months. The fact that Klamath Falls ice purchasers will have the benefit of this added service is proof of the Klamath Ice and Storage company's faith in the growth and development of this city.

Ice will be obtainable at the three depots at the same price as at the main plant. Ice will be sold in 25 pound to 100 pound sizes. The company will start regular ice deliveries from house to house this week, and ice routes are now being laid out, Mr. Collier said.

The transfer has been made on the grounds that Judge Duncan is disqualified for hearing the condemnation actions.

The opinion was handed down by Justice Keller, and reversed a previous opinion given by Judge W. M. Duncan of the Klamath circuit court.

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Dramatic Trial
Play Tonight
At City Church

Wednesday evening, April 29, at 8 o'clock, the salient features of the dramatic murder trial, "Who Killed Earl Wright?" will be reproduced at the Presbyterian church, Sixth and Pine, with 25 local people participating in the cast.

The author of this story, George Hammond of Des Moines, Iowa, sat in a criminal court room and witnessed the prosecution and conviction of a young man who had taken the life of another youth, who was his nearest friend. The evidence presented showed that an older man had purchased liquor for a local bootlegger and had persuaded the young man to drink with him. The evidence also revealed that the young defendant, while under the influence of liquor, engaged in a quarrel with his life-long chum over a sixth of a pint of alcohol, and during the controversy, struck his friend, who fell and hit his head against a gate post with such force that his neck was broken. He died instantly. The trial ends in the youth's conviction.

The park crew consisting of 29 uniformed men is preparing for a big tourist season this year.
