

OWENS WINS DECISION ON ROMEO LE MON

Mills Gets Nod Over Munroe; Mandott Kayoes Eaton

Matchmaker Jack Walker last night again pleased a large house of fight fans with one of the best cards ever shown in the American Legion arena.

"Wildcat" Jimmie Owens, Oklahoma, won the applause of a majority of the fans and the referee's decision, as he proceeded to give Romeo Le Mon, California high school battler, a good boxing lesson in the 10-round main event. Le Mon had the odds in extra weight by several pounds, but the Oklahoma "Wildcat" did not stand still for the terrible right hand of Le Mon's to get in its work. Owens is one of the smartest boys that has been seen in Klamath.

He fights with a peculiar wabbling and weaving all his own. Le Mon would swing either hand and Owens would beat him to the punch and was able to swing inside of the long left that has made Le Mon a winner in so many of his fights. Owens had the advantage in his fighting, hitting Le Mon with so many gloves that his hands looked like the wings of the new airplane. He was able to hit Le Mon with lefts and rights to the head and then double the big boy up with a fierce attack on the mid-section.

Le Mon proved tough though, as he was on the receiving end of some smashing blows, and he made many friends as he continued to try to find Owens. When he did find him, the Wildcat had to talk to himself for several seconds, for the wallop that Romeo packs makes them all talk to themselves. No one was disappointed, as the fighters had gloves going and coming all the time. Owens used all the blows of the game. The crowd was on its feet all during the fight, and never once did they yell for more action, as they for once had all they could do to keep track of the fight before them. Referee Ed Arthur had no trouble in picking the winning fighter, and several times he came near being hit himself, the fighting was so vicious.

The curtain-raiser between two little Klamath Falls "atom weights" started the going with a great bang and the rest of the crop of fighters were just as good as the main go, as far as gloves were concerned.

Jerry McKinney, a fighting Irish boy, put the sleepers on the person of Young Jack Johnson, colored, in the second round.

Leach Cross put over a fast fight in the third round of his four-rounder with "Rough House" Mackover, and the little rough boy folded up and stayed out until after the allotted time. This was a great fight while it lasted.

The fighting heart of Red Mandott saved him and brought him back from a cleaning in the first two rounds to a great victory, as he put the kayo on the person of Gus Eaton in the fourth round. Gus had a big margin in the first two rounds but he could not stand up under the going when Red came to and started knocking him down in the third round. In the fourth he was knocked down and stayed down.

Some of the fastest footwork and ducking and dodging that the fans have ever seen, almost stealing the show from the main event, came in the second six-round semi-final between Frankie Monroe and Tex Mills. Both boys were cut several times and were bleeding freely, and kept the referee busy. Tex won the decision by a margin, but both boys had plenty of friends. It was a great card and every one of the bouts had the action that pleases the fans.

PROMINENT BASEBALL MAN DIES

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, April 29. (UP)—James McAleer, one of the organizers of the American League and former president of the Boston Red Sox, died at his home here today following a six-month illness.

McAleer, who was 65, became ill after an operation and never fully recovered.

Together with the late Ban Johnson, McAleer was responsible for the formation of the American League. At that time he was manager of the Cleveland Indians.

McAleer also managed the St. Louis Browns before he became president and manager of the Boston club. Under his guidance the Red Sox won the league championship in 1912.

McAleer is the fourth of baseball's "old guard" to die within six weeks.

Honolulu Loses Opportunity To Win Tourney

NEW YORK, April 29. (UP)—Honolulu lost its opportunity to win a national A.A.U. boxing championship tonight when lone representative left in the running, William Sylva, lost a decision to Henry Burns of Boston. Sylva was a favorite to win the 112-pound class title.

Eddy Ceresole, Oakland, defeated Paul Moner, Pittsburgh, (decision).

The bout was one of 40 fights that were held tonight. Thirty-six boxers, from all parts of the United States and Canada, remained in the running. They will meet in the semi-final and final bouts tomorrow night.

In the same class Rudy Ceresole, Oakland, Calif., knocked out Charles Collura, Newark (second round).

Al Gomes, San Francisco, defeated William Hogan, New York, (decision) in the 135-pound class.

WES FERRELL PITCHES NO HIT CONTEST

Indians Retain Lead In League Through Win Over Browns

NEW YORK, April 29. (UP)—Wesley Ferrell, 23-year-old right handed pitcher, joined the ranks of baseball immortals today when he pitched a 9 to 0 no-hit victory over the St. Louis Browns and enabled the Cleveland Indians to retain the American League lead.

Ferrell's great pitching—the first major league no-hit game since May 5, 1929—was aided by Carl Hubbell pitched the New York Giants to an 11 to 0 victory over Pittsburgh—was backed by a strong attack. The Indians pounded two St. Louis pitchers for 13 hits. Ferrell himself contributed a homer and a double to drive in four runs.

BROTHER THREATENS
Rick Ferrell, St. Louis catcher and brother of the young pitcher, was the only batsman to threaten Ferrell's hitless game. Rick hit a boundary to short in the eighth and reached first safely on Hunsfield's high and wide throw. A perfect toss would have beaten the runner easily, another official scored ruled that it was an error by Hunsfield, although the ball had to be thrown a long way and from off-balance.

Three errors and three walks enables six batsmen to reach first, but Rick Ferrell was the only man to pass that point.

UNDER CONTROL

For the balance of the game Ferrell kept the Browns under complete control. He struck out eight men and not a ball was hit hard, the Cleveland fielders having nothing to do but catch lazy flies or scoop up slow rolling grounders.

Tommy Thomas of the Chicago White Sox also turned in a shut-out victory, defeating the Detroit Tigers, 3 to 0. Thomas, who apparently has recovered the form that made him one of the league's leading pitchers in 1929, allowed the Tigers four hits, seven hits and never was in danger. His mates got only five hits off Earl Whitehill, but combined them with walks to score lone runs in the second, third and fourth innings.

SENIOR WIN
The only other American League contest of the day was featured by heavy hitting, Washington's Senators defeating New York, 9 to 5. Brown went the route for the Senators and allowed 11 hits, but settled down after giving the Yanks four runs in the second. The Yankees' four pitchers were nicked for 10 hits, and most of them came when his meat runs.

The victory gave Washington sole possession of second place, previously shared with the Yankees.

The Philadelphia-Boston game was postponed because of rain, as were the National League games between Boston and Philadelphia and between New York and Brooklyn.

CARDS BEAT PIRATES

Big Jesse Haines, world series star, set the pace for National League pitchers when he hurled a four-hit game against Pittsburgh. St. Louis won, 7 to 1, and remained in a tie with the Chicago Cubs for first place.

Ed Baecht, Pacific Coast rookie, pitched the Chicago Cubs to a 3 to 1 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds. Baecht allowed 11 hits, as compared to the seven hits his mates secured off Lucas, but kept them scattered. The Cubs bunched four of their seven hits in the fifth inning to score all of their runs.

Petrolle and M'Larnin Bout Is Postponed

NEW YORK, April 29. (UP)—Illness of Billy Petrolle, South Dakota lightweight who was scheduled for a ten-round rematch with Jimmy McLarnin at Madison Square Garden, May 5, has forced a rearrangement of Garden cards for May.

Matchmaker Tom McCordle is attempting to advance either the Longhran-Campolo bout scheduled for May 15 or the Battalio-Lara Barba bout slated for May 22 to the vacated date. If these efforts fail he will use the fight between Vince Dundee and Ben Jeby, booked for May 27.

The Petrolle-McLarnin contest will be postponed to the original night of the shifted bout.

Petrolle is confined to a Du-luth, Minn., hospital with an attack of influenza.
