



ROBINS WIN THIRD GAME OVER PHILS

People of Brooklyn Glad,
Especially Over Way;
Yanks Trim A's

NEW YORK, April 30. (UP)—The good burghers of Brooklyn were hard put to contain themselves tonight as the news went around that the beloved Robins had defeated the Philadelphia Phillies 5 to 1, thereby scoring their third victory of the 1931 National league season.

Not only were the good burghers delighted by the triumph; the manner in which it was accomplished was a source of much joy. Babe Phelps pitched a strong game; there were no traffic jams on the base paths; no errors afield. Babe Herman turned in two sparkling catches besides hitting two doubles, and Johnny Frederick blasted a home run with two men on.

CLARENCE BEAT BRAVES
Freddie Fitzsimmons, veteran right-hander, allowed but two hits as the New York Giants whipped the Boston Braves 2 to 1, and moved into third place in the National league. Tom Zachary worked for the Braves and yielded 10 scattered hits. The Braves made their lone score in the fourth inning without a base hit, a walk to Maranville, Terry's error and Berger's long fly producing the tally.

Pittsburgh took undisciplined possession of fifth place by defeating Cincinnati 8 to 3. Mickey Heath, Cincinnati's promising rookie first baseman, sustained a broken arm in a collision with Tommy Tharner, Pittsburgh shortstop. Heath will be lost to the Reds for at least six weeks.

Chicago and St. Louis were rained out.
YANKS BEAT A'S
In the American league, New York's Yankees snapped their losing streak by defeating the world champion Philadelphia Athletics, 7 to 3. Henry Johnson, always a Philadelphia fan, pitched for the Yankees and allowed but six hits, striking out six batters. Walberg and McDonald pitched for the A's.

Waite Hoyt limited the Cleveland Indians to seven hits as the Detroit Tigers won 4 to 1. The Tigers jumped on Hindin for four runs in the first inning and never were headed.

The Chicago White Sox scored one run in the 11th inning to defeat the St. Louis Browns, 10 to 5. The White Sox scored twice in the seventh to tie the score at 9-9. Washington and Boston did not play because of cold weather.

Incidentally, you may recall that the Open last year was played in one of those good old-fashioned but spelt. But getting back to business, this shows how serious the stars take their practice shots, a department neglected by 50 per cent of the duffers.

The practice tee is the place to iron out your shots and loosen your muscles for play. It won't hurt any player to hit at least five shots with each club in his bag before stepping up to the first tee. Think back on some of your recent rounds and you probably can see a few spots where five or ten minutes of practice would have saved you that miserable 7 or 8.

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ANGELS TAKE GAME LEAD OF LEAGUE

Portland in Second Spot
After Mission Loss
By 8 to 7

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30. (UP)—Oakland climbed into third place of the Pacific Coast league here tonight by trouncing the San Francisco Seals, 11 to 8. The Seals barely kept out of the cellar, holding seventh place by a margin of less than half a game.

The Oaks piled up nine runs in the first three innings and Pearson, their pitcher, coasted until the ninth, when the Seals threatened and he was relieved by Tubbs.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30. (UP)—For the first time since the Pacific Coast league season opened nearly four weeks ago, a team in first place held an advantage of more than a full game over its closest competitor tonight.

The league leading Los Angeles Angels gained an edge of almost two full games over Portland by beating the Sacramento Senators today, 6 to 5, while the Missions were defeating the Beavers 8 to 7.

A home run by Baker of Los Angeles in the last of the seventh inning tied the score and Schulte's homer in the next inning provided the winning run for the Angels. The Beavers tried hard to overtake the Missions after the latter took a six-run lead in the fourth inning, but fell one run short.

EASTERN BOYS WIN TOURNEY

New York, Cleveland Win
Honors in National
A.A.U. Boxing

NEW YORK, April 30. (UP)—New York and Cleveland shared honors in the National Amateur Athletic Union's boxing championships, fought tonight before a crowd of 8,000 spectators. Cleveland won two championships—the heavyweight and the 112-pound—while New York boxers triumphed in the 126 and 160-pound classes.

The other titles were divided among four cities, Boston, New Orleans, San Francisco and Reno, Nevada.

TWO KNOCKOUTS

The championship round was featured by two knockouts. Jack Pallet of Cleveland, only defending champion, knocked out Earl Sather of Minneapolis to retain his heavyweight title and Antone Poloni of Reno, Nev., stopped Joe Melham of Kansas City in the third round of the 175-pound final.

New York won team championship honors for the tourney with 15 points and Cleveland took second place with 13 points.

Babe Triscaro of Cleveland was the first champion to be crowned, winning a three-round decision over Eddy Ceresole of Oakland, Calif., in the 112-pound class.

FAVORITE LOSES

Joseph Ferrante, Boston school boy, defeated Mike Belloise of New York, in a fast three-round bout to take the 118-pound title. Belloise was the favorite in the class, but was outboxed and out-
punched by the rugged little Bostonian.

Anthony Scarpatti, New York, won the 126-pound title when he was awarded a decision over Don Gonzalez of Cleveland, on a foul in the second round.

Al Gomez, sturdy California,

decisively defeated Steve Salek of Boston, in the three-round final for the 135-pound championship. Salek had the advantage of fighting only once tonight, finishing his semi-final bout by default, but he tired badly and took a severe drubbing.

Ohio Relays To Be Run Today and Tomorrow

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 30. (UP)—A colorful assemblage of track and field athletes gathered here tonight to participate in the last of the middle west's big relay meets for 1931—the eighth annual Ohio relays at Ohio State university which begins tomorrow.

The main events of the two-day carnival are not to be run off until Saturday. Sixteen events for Ohio colleges, high schools and preparatory schools were scheduled for today.

On Saturday several hundred of the country's leading university and college trackmen will compete for the major honors. Western conference schools were expected to dominate the meet as in the past. There were representatives from nearly two score other collegiate institutions to dispute the claims of the Big Ten schools.
