AVRIT SEES CHANGE FOR GOOD TEAMS

Declares Athletes Will Have to Train or Lose Positions

"It's a wonder to me that Klamath Falls ever lost a football game," stated Leslie B. Avrit, new high school football coach as he talked to Kiwanians yesterday, telling them of the unbounded enthusiasm and fine spirit which he found among the business men of this city.

"There is an excellent spirit dominating among Klamath Falls residents and the high school students. Much interest in athletics is shown by grade school kiddies as well as by older boys," he said addressing the club members, "and I hope to capitalize on that spirit next fall."

Avrit stated that he had no definite plans for coaching the Klamath Falls team next fall. "A coach must mould his form of football training to the team instead of moulding the team to the training," he said.

The new coach also remarked that he had heard rumors as far north as Corvallis on the local boys' habit of breaking training rules. In a talk he gave to high school students yesterday morning he told them in a straight-from-the-shoulder manner that he would expect them to adhere closely to training rules and that if he found any member of the team breaking a rule he would throw in the second string, even for a "big game."

Avrit was selected by the high school board as the best all round athlete to coach the local team after many applicants were carefully considered. He will replace Al Sinclair next fall. At the present time Avrit is coaching the Oregon State college freshman baseball and football teams, and has been assistant coach at that school for three years.

The high school football schedule for this spring has already been prepared and will be announced within a few days.

Lava Bed Roads Improved, Will Mark Places

Expenditure of over \$5,000 in road, trail and cave improvements within the Lava Beds National Monument, is now completed, according to a letter received at the chamber of commerce from Fred P. Cronmiller, forest supervisor. Approximately \$9 new signs on the highway for the marking of caves, roads and interesting spots will be placed during the coming season. Erection of signs directing traffic to the Elsiephylo-ge-Tule Lake Peninsula has been delayed until highway and road conditions should be settled. Mr. Cronmiller now believes that these signs will be erected in the near future and placed early next spring.



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
