

CUBS BREAK REDS 'JINX', WIN 13 TO 1

Giants Defeat Brooklyn as
Braves Trim Phils and
Washington Wins

NEW YORK, May 4. (UP)—
Pennant hopes of the Chicago
Cubs have been strengthened by
the breaking of the Cincinnati
Reds "jinx" which prevented the
Chicagoans from winning the
1930 national league champion-
ship.

Last season the Cubs lost
seven games in the close race
with St. Louis. By failing to do
better than break even in 22
games with Cincinnati—a team
which could win only 4 of 22
starts against the Cards. The
Cincinnati "jinx" was especially
disastrous because the Cubs won
six of their victories in suc-
cession after they had been vir-
tually eliminated from the race.
whereas Cincinnati failed to win a
single game from St. Louis after
June 1.

SECURE REVENGE
The Cubs have been securing
revenge this season and today
mauled the Reds, 13 to 1, for
their third successive victory of
the season over Cincinnati and
their ninth successive triumph in
two years.

Pat Malone pitched for the
Cubs and set the Reds down with
six scattered hits while his mates
pounded four Cincinnati pitchers
for 15 hits, including homers by
Jack Wilson and Les Bell.

GIANTS BEAT ROBINS
Clarence Mitchell, veteran left-
handed spit-ball pitcher, also
turned in a six-hit pitching per-
formance today to give the New
York Giants a 6 to 3 victory
over Brooklyn. Adolfo Luque,
making his first start of the year
for Brooklyn, allowed the Robins
10 hits and six runs in eight in-
nings.

Ed Brandt of the Boston
Braves was the low hit pitcher
of the day, allowing only three
safeties and defeating the Phila-
delphia Phillies, 4 to 3. The
Phillies' hits included a homer by
Whitney and a triple by Bartell,
and these blows, with two Boston
errors and four walks, kept
Philadelphia in the running.

SENATORS WIN
St. Louis' league leading Cardinals
and the Pittsburgh Pirates had
an open date. Pittsburgh re-
mained idle while St. Louis trav-
eled to Springfield, Mo., to
score an exhibition victory over
the Springfield Western associa-
tion club.

Second division teams made a
clean sweep in the American
league, the tall-end St. Louis
Brown's defeating Cleveland's
league leaders, 3 to 1; Washing-
ton trouncing the New York
Yankees, 7 to 3; Boston beating
Philadelphia, 4 to 2; and De-
troit drubbing Chicago, 9 to 3.

GOOD PITCHING
St. Louis securing only five
hits off Willis Hudlin, while Ste-
wart allowed the Browns nine,
but four of them were for extra
bases. Kress' triple and Goslin's
homer accounted for the first
two runs and doubles by Ferrell
and Levey added the final score
in the eighth.

Washington lost a two run
lead gained over New York in
the first inning, but batted
around in the sixth to score five
runs and clinch the game. Sad
Sam Jones kept the Yanks' ele-
ven safeties scattered and was
effective in the pinches.

RED SOX TRAIN
Home runs by Rothrock and
Pickering, second and third base-
men for Boston, gave the Red
Sox their winning margin over
Philadelphia. The two teams
made a total of 25 hits, with
the Athletics using four pictures
and Boston two.

Four Chicago errors played a
big part in the White Sox's 9 to
3 defeat by Detroit. McKain had
the better of Hoyt as far as
total hits were concerned, but
the Tigers benefited by Chicago
misplay. The White Sox now
have made 24 errors in eight
games this season.

Which hand—the right or left—
does the actual hitting in the
golf swing?

I believe that the golf stroke is
a forehanded hit with the right
hand. This can be reasoned easily
by swinging the stick first with
the right hand and then with the
left. Not how much faster the
clubhead travels at the lowest arc
of the right hand swing.
It is true the right hand is
kept out of control until the
proper hitting region is reached.
It is then that the left hand re-
linquishes command and the right
hand takes control, whipping the
clubhead through and along the
line of flight. I repeat that the
golf swing is a one-handed fore-
hand blow and is used by such
stars as Bobby Jones, Abe Mit-
chell, Clarence Gamber and Bob
McDonald, who are exceptionally
long hitters.

Enter Amateur Golf
Tournament

LONDON, May 4. (UP)—Fif-
teen Americans, headed by Geo.
Volght and Douglas Fairbanks,
will compete in the British am-
ateur golf championship, May 18-
23, at the North Devon Golf
club, Westward Ho, it was an-
nounced today.

The draw for the championship
in which the name of last year's
winner, Bobby Jones, is missing,
was issued today and showed 191
fewer entries than in the 1930
matches.

Volght is entered from the
Winged Foot club, New York,
while Fairbanks, who is in En-
gland on his way back to the
United States after a leisurely
trip around the world, is regis-
tered from the Lakeside club.

Four former champions—C. J.
H. Tolley, Roger Wethered, Rob
Harris and Sir Ernest Holder-
ness—are entered in the tourna-
ment.

are Frank Sweeney of Sunning-
dale, E. H. Chambers of Bea-
confield, six of Riverside club,
Portland, Ore.; Paul Ashill of
Sunningdale, a New Yorker liv-
ing in England; Douglas Grant,
