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Oregon Forest Service Maps Now Available

A new road and information map of Oregon has just been issued by the U. S. Forest Service.

This three-color map shows by appropriate symbols the paved, oiled and gravel roads of the state, also trunk highways, other auto and secondary roads. The

fourteen national forests of Oregon are shown in light green, paved, oiled and gravel roads in red and other features in black. Some 20 of the principal recreation and resort areas of the national forest region are shown on the map with descriptions on the back of the folder, which carries 12 illustrations of Oregon forest scenes. This is the fifth edition of this map folder issued by the U. S. forest service since 1920.

Free copies are obtainable from the regional office in Portland, and from any of the 14 forest supervisors' offices in the state.

At the same time regional forester C. J. Buck announces a new edition of a map folder or "ranger map" for the back of the central Oregon. New features this year of these forest map folders are that they show the location of all improved forest camps, as well as airplane landing fields and game refuges. Copies of these forest folders may be had from the regional office, Portland, or from forest officers of the Ochocho national forest, Prineville, Oregon.
