



# Klick Arrives In Time For Preview Of Card Today

## INVITE ALL FANS TO SEE WORKOUTS

High Class Battles Will Clash With Results In Doubt

Fighters who will appear on Wednesday's cards will workout today in Legion hall at 1:30 o'clock in a preview of the card to which fans are invited. Matchmaker James Walker announced last night.

The fight fans of Klamath Falls and vicinity will see two champs in battle Wednesday at the Legion hall. Jack Walker has been fortunate enough to get none other than Frankie Klick, Pacific Coast champ and contender for the world's championship, to fight Pierre Pothier, French featherweight titleholder, in the main event of a stellar card.

Much depends on this fight for both boys. Klick already has posted a large forfeit in California to fight either Bat Battalino, present world's champion, or Fidel LaBarba, the Fourth of July for the belt.

Klick has fought Bat Battalino May 22 for the championship in New York. Joe Doran, Klick's congenial manager, says he is bringing the Klamath Falls fans a real champion. Klick is rated to beat LaBarba, according to Claude Varner, who fought Fidel a draw. Klick has recently beaten the best boys on the coast and in the world and will come here during one of his most successful winning streaks.

According to the score sheet he has just murdered Ray Montoya and Bobby Facho at Hollywood and Santiago Zorilla at Sacramento. Montoya has a win over Kid Francis and says that Frankie Klick gave him the worst beating of his career. He had Montoya on the floor three times during the fight.

Pothier is an improved fighter over the time he fought Klick in Merrill and says he can take this potential champ any evening in the week. Pierre has made some wonderful hits in Oregon and at the present time is Portland's favorite, having recently fought Benny Felix off his feet only to get a draw.

Curly Morris has been taken off the card to give one of the smartest and coolest heads in the fight racket a chance to show before the Klamath fight fans. He is none other than Speedy Sparks, gladiator of much fame.

SPARKS ON CARD Sparks has scored 53 knockouts and has fought the best in the world, fighting such men as Jack Malone, Dave Shade, Joe Anderson, and Champion Mickey Walker. Sparks fought Walker twice. On this card he is to fight the hard hitting Red starts in Klamath Falls, and with the exception of tough Pat MacFadden, has knocked out most of his men. He had Pat on the floor.

Paul Aubertin is fighting Kid Evans in the other six-round semi and this should be a good fight. Evans says he can beat the Frenchman and when Evans thinks he can lick a man he fights a real battle. The Frenchman hasn't anything to say but looks like he would have an answer in the ring for Evans.

Three good preliminary fights will finish the card, which has all the earmarks of being an equal of the last card. You will remember the last card that kept the fans on their feet most of the time.

## GOLF as the STARS Play It



Why must tight wrists be avoided in the golf swing?

Tight wrists are disastrous to the golf swing. It is impossible to cock the wrists at the top of the backswing with the club held in a deathlike grip, yet it is well to remember that the club must be held firmly. Without cocking the wrists at the top of the backswing no punch or power can be administered to the ball at impact.

Tight wrists tense the muscles of the right side in the downswing, causing one to lunge at the ball. While on the subject of the wrists, I might say that many golfers uncock their wrists too soon in the downswing, spending the punch and power long before the club is in a position to hit. Study the illustration of young Horton Smith, notice the short distance the clubhead has traveled in comparison with the hands from the top of the backswing. It is here that the uncocking of the wrists takes place, the right hand comes into use whipping the club through.

## CALIFORNIA GIRL WINS BOAT RACE

GARDONE, Riviera, Italy, May 9. (UP)—Miss Loretta Turnbull, 18, Montevia, Cal., girl, won the fascist party cup, opening day feature of the annual Lake Garda motorboat races today.

Miss Turnbull, piloting her Sunkist Kid, led her eight Italian competitors all the way once the 500 meter mark was passed. Her average speed was 55.534 kilometers per hour. On her fastest run down the lake, Miss Turnbull drove her little craft at a speed of 58.702 kilometers per hour.

When the "Sunkist Kid" skipped across the finish line, the California girl was accorded a tremendous ovation by the throngs lining the shores of the lake.

Besides the cup, Miss Turnbull was awarded a cash prize of 500 lire.

The Lake Garda races, under the patronage of Gabriele d'Annunzio, Prince of Montenevoso, will continue until the eighteenth of the month.

Kay Don of England, holder of the world's speed record, will try for a new mark later in the month.

Miss Turnbull won third place in the Garbone town cup race for outboards over a course of 32 kilometers. Her time was 28:11.

This race was won by Mario Speltini, who negotiated the course in 26:14, averaging 71.995 kilometers per hour.

## OREGON GOLF TEAM TAKES BIG TOURNEY

To Play Southern Area Winner This Week For Title

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 9. (UP)—The University of Oregon golf team triumphed over a four-man team from the University of Washington to win the northern championship of the Pacific Coast Conference over the course of the Eugene Country club here. The matches, medal play for 72 holes, were held Friday and Saturday. The Webfoots had a total score of 1,255 as compared to that of 1,307 for the Huskies.

Oregon, by virtue of its victory over Washington, won the right to meet the winner of the southern division for the Pacific Coast title and the matches will be held here next Friday and Saturday.

Washington fell down in Saturday's play, after a good start Friday, when they finished close behind the Webfoots for the first day's play. Montana and Oregon State both entered only two-man teams and they were not eligible for the championship play.

George Will, Oregon No. 1 man, edged out Vincent Dolp, his team mate, for low scoring honors when he shot the 72 holes in 305, two strokes under Dolp's score of 307. Kermit Rosen, Washington No. 1 man, was close behind the leaders with 314, with Harrison Kincaid, another Webfoot, fourth with 319. Bob Finch was low man for Oregon State with 331, while Reuben Lewon was Montana's best with 359.

Oregon, after winning every match from Washington in a dual meet here Thursday, was a heavy favorite to win the sectional title in the playoff matches but Washington came back strong Friday to trail the Webfoots by only 14 strokes at the end of the first 36 holes.

Vincent Dolp was low man for medal honors for the first day when he shot the 36 holes in 149, two under the 151 of Rosen's.

Dolp faltered on the final 36 holes but Will and Kincaid came through in nice fashion with 153 and 155 respectively. Rosen was the best Husky shot in Saturday's play, but he was off his game and required 163 strokes for the 36 holes.

Dave Fitzgerald, Montana, and Bob Hockens, Oregon State, did not finish the afternoon round Saturday when their scores put them out of the running for any honors.

Dolp, who was Pacific Coast intercollegiate champion and runner-up for the Oregon State amateur title last year, was handicapped in his play by a spiked hand, received last week. With another week of rest for the injured member he should be in good playing form and Oregon is expected to make a strong bid for the coast championship.

## BILL TILDEN WINS OVER RICHARDS

Wins First Match in Three Out of Five Contest Play

NEW YORK, May 9. (UP)—Playing with a recklessness that belied his 38 years and made some 12,000 spectators wonder if that really was a bald spot on the top of his head, William T. Tilden, the second, defeated Vincent Richards, 3-7, 6-0, 6-1, 6-3, tonight in the first match of their best three out of five series for the professional tennis championship of the world.

The lanky Philadelphia who first blazed into the tennis heavens in 1920 and has ruled the American scene almost without interruption, never played more sensationally.

**NEARING 40** It was hard to believe, as you watched Bill move effortlessly from side line to side line and dash into the net, that he is fast nearing 40 and has been playing the game long enough to hold the national singles title seven times, participate in 11 Davis cup matches, and hold the No. 1 American ranking 10 times.

In justice to Richards, it must be said that he was not precisely on top of his game; his usually superb volleying was faulty and his service of little use. It is probably just as well, however, for no one save Henri Cochet of France, and maybe not that wizard, could have stemmed Tilden's attack tonight.

**COMPLETE CONTROL** The big man had complete control of all his shots—which means he was in possession of every stroke known to man. His cannonball service, though he rarely used it, was ready when called, and pulled him out of several tight spots.

His forehead, the nearest thing to a machine gun bullet in the business, was entirely too much for Richards to handle, and his back hand was seldom in error.

## YANKS MOVE INTO FIRST PLACE BY WIN

Beat White Sox While Indians Lose To Boston 5-1

NEW YORK, May 9. (UP)—The New York Yankees moved into first place in the American League pennant race today when they defeated the Chicago White Sox, 13 to 9, while the Cleveland Indians lost to Boston, 5 to 1.

As a result of the defeat, the Indians, who have been leading the league practically since the start of the season, fell to third place in the standings. The Philadelphia Athletics, favorites to repeat their pennant winning performances of 1929 and 1930, moved into second place, only 12 percentage points behind the Yankees, when they defeated the St. Louis Browns, 6 to 4.

**CARDS WIN EIGHTH** The other contest scheduled in the American League, between Washington and Detroit, was postponed because of rain.

St. Louis Cardinals extended their victory streak to eight straight by defeating the Pittsburgh Pirates, 4 to 2. Johnson held the Pirates to nine hits, while the Cardinals got the same number of Krehmer, Collins, subbing for Jim Bottomley at first, hit a home run for the

Cardinals, while P. Waner homered for the Pirates.

The New York Giants and Chicago Cubs opened intercollegiate competition in the National League with a battle of home runs, the Giants winning, 5 to 4. Mel Ott's homer in the eighth inning with a man on base brought in the winning tally. The Cubs were off to a four-run lead in the first three innings on home runs by Hornsby, English and Stephenson but only could gather one hit off Rerly and Heving, who followed Hubbell to the mound. Jackson and Hogan hit home runs for the Giants in addition to Ott.

Cincinnati Reds lost another game, this time to the Boston Braves, 4 to 2. Red Lucas held the Braves safe until the sixth inning, when Boston scored all of its runs.

The Brooklyn Robins and Philadelphia Phillies divided a double-header, Brooklyn winning the first contest 5 to 3 and dropping the second, 5 to 1. Glen Wright's timely hitting behind the eight hit pitching of Luque gave the Robins the first game. Bengie held Brooklyn at bat in the second and would have scored a shutout but for Wright's second home run of the day.
