Klick and Pothier Clash Tonight in 'Red Hot' Rematch

SEMI EVENTS PROMISE REAL FIST FIGHTS

Walker Lines Up Card Like 'The Good Old Days' For Tonight

"There'll be a hot time in the old town tonight," they sang back in '98 when Matchmaker Jack Walker came over to the United States, so to make life something like it used to be in the old days when he faced the best lightweights in the game, Jack rematched Frankie Klick and Pothier for the main event tonight at Legion hall.

It all started down at Merrill a couple of months ago when Klick took a decision—and a close one—over Pothier whom he thought to be a "busher" and did not think would give him any trouble at all.

CONDITIONS THEN

The Frenchman wasn't satisfied. That night he didn't understand the rules and fought both hands free in the clinches according to the American boxing association rules while the referee, speaking in English which Pothier didn't understand, said a good show. That was the end of Klick had the best of the fighting.

Pothier also wasn't used to the American "rough and ready" style of fighting. But since that night all is changed.

CHANGED NOW

First place, Klick is in a lot better shape and knows the Frenchman is plenty tough. Second place, Pothier can understand instructions now and has learned the American technique in the ring.

That's what makes the bout tonight promise to be even better than their former performance which drew a house of nearly 1000 fans who cheered and cheered through the bout. They'll all be there again tonight to see the end of the matter.

MANDOTT VS. SPARKS

That there is the Red Mandott and Speedy Sparks affair which is scheduled for six rounds. They are evenly matched for weight. Red has been learning something of ring generalship and has a strong punch combined with a fighting heart. He can stand punishment. The veteran Sparks still is classy. He can still stand punishment and can box as well as punch. At a packed house in which no decisions were given he proved his class and was quickly put on the card. The fight's a toss up either way.

Ted Kid Evans and Paul Aubertin of France are well matched for weight and will put on a good show. Aubertin lost a decision to O'Dell last winter. He has been working hard since that time, gained strength and like his stablemate, Pothier, has learned the American system. Evans has a packed house in Klamath Falls and will put up a good battle. They are scheduled to go six rounds in the double semi-windup.

SELL OUT SURE

Leach Cross and George Blackman and Young Jack Johnson and Jerry McKinnon will meet in four round events that should open the card in good shape.

Eddie Arthur will referee and Jack Frayne will announce.

Tickets for the card have been selling fast and a packed house is assured for the battle.

How does one execute a pitch shot with backspin?

To put backspin on a ball, it is necessary that the ball be hit a crisp downward blow, taking turf after the ball has been sent on its way. Play the ball a little more off the right foot. For this shot Roland Mackenzie uses a slightly more open stance with the heels just a few inches apart. He pivots very little and keeps his hands close to the body.

ATHLETICS TAKE FIRST PLACE SPOT

Down White Sox; Grove Is Hero; Reds and Boston Divide Two

NEW YORK, May 12. (UP)—Fears that Connie Mack's Athletics had lost their championship punch appear to have been premature, for the Philadelphiaans are back in their old familiar role as American league pace-makers.

The Athletics gained first place today—for the first time this season—when they trounced the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 2. The victory enabled the Philadelphiaans to move .911 percentage points ahead of the New York Yankees who are tied with the A's in games won and lost.

GROVE IS HERO

Lorrey Grove, ace of the Philadelphia mound staff, was the hero of the victory. He allowed only four hits and walked two, the Sox making their only runs on an error, Reynolds' triple and Fothergill's single, after the A's had taken a four run lead.

Jimmy Fox led the A's nine hit attack on Pat Caraway with three singles and Al Simmons turned in a homer and a single.

TIGERS VICTORS

Vic Sorrell pitched Detroit to a 2 to 0 victory over Boston in the only other American league game of the day. The triumph advanced Detroit to within .002 points of a first division berth and was Boston's first defeat during the current inter-sectional competition.

Sorrell allowed the Red Sox nine hits but was able to pinch bunched three of their six hits to score their runs in the fourth. Stone and Owen singled and Hayworth's double drove them in.

REDS AND BOSTON SPLIT

The games between Washington and Cleveland and New York and St. Louis were postponed because of rain, and wet grounds, and the National league contests between St. Louis and Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Brooklyn and Chicago and New York were cancelled because of cold and rainy weather.

The other National league clubs, Cincinnati and Boston divided a doubleheader, with Boston winning the opener nine hits and Cincinnati taking the nightcap, 3 to 2.

BERGER HITS HOMER

Big Ed Brandt turned in his fifth consecutive triumph of the season to give the Braves the first game. He allowed nine hits while his mates collected only seven off Benton and Carroll, but was given a three run lead in the first and coasted to victory. Wallie Berger started his first home run of the year in the first inning with Dreesen on base.

Doubles by Harver Hendrick and Cliff Heathcote, enabled Cincinnati to break a five game losing streak and win the second game. With the score tied at two in the sixth, Hendrick connected for his second double of the game. Heathcote, batting for Ford, doubled and drove in the run.

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PORTLAND OVER TWO GAMES UP

Trounce Angels 10 to 2; Oaks, in Second, Lose To Shieks 7-2

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12 (UP)—The Portland Beavers, leaders of the Pacific Coast league, moved more than two full games ahead of the second place Oakland Acorns by trouncing Los Angeles, 10 to 2, tonight. The result was never in doubt after the Beavers scored five times in the fifth inning.

Hollywood took advantage of four errors by Oakland to beat the Oaks, 7 to 2. Yde was on the mound for the Stars and blanked his opponents after the second inning so that his team might jump into fourth place.

A fast finish gave the San Francisco Seals a 3 to 1 victory over Sacramento and undisturbed hold on third place. Zinn pitched for the Seals and allowed only six hits but the score was tied until the seventh inning.

Seattle's Indians sent Page, their star pitcher, against the Missions, but won by a score of 9 to 7 only after a hard battle in which they needed two relief pitchers. The Missions tied the score, seven-all, with three runs in the last of the seventh but were blanked from then on.

Youngsters To Represent U. S. In Davis Cup Play

NEW YORK, May 12. (UP)—Four youngsters whose average age is something less than 21 years will represent this country in the final round of the North American zone Davis cup play against Canada.

The young men in question—Frank Shields, Sidney B. Wood, Clifford Sutter and Gregory Mangin—were named by the U. S. L. T. A. today and form the most youthful squad ever dispatched in quest of Davis cup honors by any country.

Their appointment, better than anything else, indicated the rapid rise of tennis' younger generation. The group, despite its tender age, includes four of the first ranking players in the nation.

Under the direction of its non-playing captain, Beron S. Prentice, will leave for Montreal Sunday night. The men will practice daily until Thursday, May 21, when the final round play begins.

BLUE LAWS MODIFIED FOR SUNDAY BALL

HARRISBURG, Pa., May 12. (UP)—The first successful attempt since 1794 on the famous Pennsylvania blue laws was made in the house of representatives today on the Sunday baseball question.

At a colorful session, the house passed by 105 to 89 a local option bill permitting cities and towns to decide whether to legalize Sunday baseball between the hours of 2 and 6 p. m.

The house always had been the bulwark against modification of blue laws. This fact had caused a spirited campaign, for and against the baseball bill. Now those who want Sunday baseball are optimistic that the bill will pass the senate and obtain the approval of Governor Gifford Pinchot.

Enactment of the bill would permit legalization of Sunday baseball for 15 professional league teams in 14 places.

Also enactment of the bill would be expected to end plans, now well underway, for the Philadelphia Athletics to move their American league ball park to Camden, N. J., where Sunday baseball is permitted.

Tilden Again Beats Richards

BOSTON, May 12. (UP)—In a well played match that went the full five sets, William T. Tilden of Philadelphia tonight scored his second straight victory over Vincent Richards of New York in their series for the professional tennis championship of the world. The scores were 6-3, 3-6, 6-1, 1-6, 6-3.

NEW YORK, May 12. (UP)—Justo Suarez, Argentine lightweight, arrived in New York from Buenos Aires today. Suarez, who made an impressive showing on his first visit to this country last season, will have several fights in New York this summer against opponents to be selected later.

CURTIS WILL PRESENT CUP AFTER DERBY

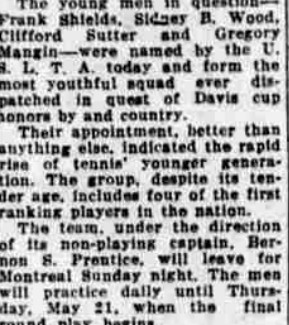

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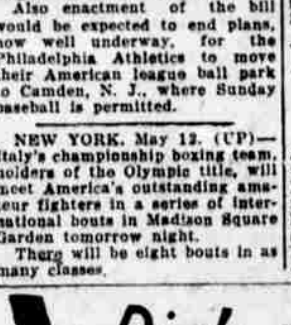
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
