Chamber Will Support Road Built by U. S.

Support to the Klamath county court in the maintenance of the Diamond Lake road was pledged Tuesday by directors of Klamath chamber of commerce in regular session.

Contracts for work on the new road to Diamond Lake from The Dalles-California highway are ready to let, according to the United States Bureau of Public Roads, and are only waiting signatures from the county court agreeing to take this road over and maintain it according to specifications five years hence.

The Diamond Lake building program of the government will require three years, after which maintenance work will be carried on for two years longer. After that the county must agree to take over the maintenance at a yearly cost of \$250 per mile. The section in question is 15 miles in length.

The directors voted also to send Earl C. Reynolds, executive secretary of the chamber, to represent the organization at a meeting of the state highway commission in Portland May 14 and present requests for early completion of the Merrill-Malin-State Line section of The Dalles-California Highway.

A. Kalins, of Malin, will also attend the meeting, and present testimony from Malin favoring the road.

Plans for the booster meeting honoring the important California highway delegation arriving in Klamath Falls May 15, were discussed by the executive board.

'Heptad' Off Press, Given To Students

The first issue of "Heptad," published by the students of seven high schools of Klamath county outside of Klamath Falls, has been delivered to the pupils, teachers and business men throughout Klamath county.

The year book was published for the first time this year by the combined student bodies of Merrill, Bonanza, Fort Klamath, Henley, Keno, Malin and Chiloquin. Public Service Commissioner Holds Hearing

Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner; Herbert Hauser, secretary to the commission; Roy A. Kline, State highway engineer; J. H. Scott, state market road engineer, and J. M. Devers, assistant attorney general for the state of Oregon, assigned to the state highway commission, were in Klamath Falls Tuesday for hearing on applications of the Great Northern railroad for 20 crossings and overhead crossings on its extension south to Keddie, Calif.

The hearing was held in the Klamath county court house in the presence of the county court and an interested audience.

The matter of the state highway's new section of road from the city limits of Klamath Falls to a point beyond Pelican City, crossing the Southern Pacific railroad in the vicinity of Mt. Calvary cemetery, was also discussed.

Immediately after noon Commissioner Thomas and the state highway men made a tour of the points in question at the hearing.

Yeggs Blast Safe at Modoc, Loot Taken

Using nitroglycerin to blow open the safe at the Modoc Point postoffice, thieves succeeded in stealing \$187 in cash sometime Monday night.

Entrance was effected by cutting a hole in the door and unhooking it from the inside. Nitroglycerin used to blow the safe was made, presumably, from explosives stolen last week from the W. D. Miller Construction company. Two men entered the building and accomplished the "job."

The Modoc Point postoffice is located in the Lamm Lumber company store, but nothing was taken from the store except four packages of cigarettes.

Sheriff Low was informed of the robbery early yesterday and proceeded at once to Modoc Point. He spent the day at that place and in the immediate vicinity checking up on suspects and clues. Sheriff Low was aided in his search for the robbers by Tim Warren, special detective of the Southern Pacific railroad. Officers hope to have definite trace of the thieves soon.
