

PIEDMONT TO OPEN COURSE EARLY FRIDAY

Public Invited; Prizes To First To Make Par And Bogey Announced

Piedmont Golf and Country club is making plans for its grand opening of the new nine-hole golf course on Friday, beginning at daylight.

The course is declared to be one of the most fascinating and difficult in this section of the country with opportunities for many varieties of shots and tests of ability. The clubhouse will be open from 4 a. m. to 9 p. m. to serve breakfast, 11 a. m. to 2 p. m. to serve lunch and from 5:30 to 9 p. m. to serve diners.

The caddy house will have a supply of balls, tees and other golfing equipment on hand at all times.

Prizes of \$10 for the first to make par 36 on the course and \$10 to the first lady to make bogey 40 on the course will be given. It is announced by Jack Downing, manager.

A full time, experienced professional will be employed by the club in the near future to aid golfers and to teach lessons. The course will be open to the public at all times.

Members of Piedmont Golf and Country club will be able to play on their sized membership cards which may be obtained at the clubhouse at the course, it is stated. Green fees at the popular price of 50 cents will be charged to the public.

Cowgill was instructed to submit a complete outline of the organization necessary for his department, at the commission's next meeting.

POSTPONE MOVE
During its session today, the commission also decided to defer action on the proposed moving of its offices from the Oregon building here, to Salem.

A committee representing the Portland chamber of commerce called on the commission and said that it sympathized with the commission's desire to economize, but that it believed the public's convenience, one-third which is located in Portland, should also be considered.

After hearing the committee's views on the question, the commission voted to defer action on the proposed removal of the offices until its next regular meeting on the second Monday in June.

REDUCE SALARIES
An investigation was ordered after Maynard Cole, of the Multnomah Hunter and Angler's club complained that game wardens were not receiving full cooperation from the sheriff of Clackamas county and other officials in the case of poachers.

All hatchery and game farm employees, who recently were required to hand in their resignations, were re-employed by the commission today, but all of their salaries, with the exception of the laborers, were cut 10 per cent. Wages of game farm laborers will continue to be \$3.50 a day.

AT THE PELICAN

Anchordoguy Is Moving Sheep To Modoc Ranges

LOOKOUT, Calif., May 12.—Raymond Anchordoguy of Red Bluff is putting his sheep on summer range north of this place this week. The bulk of his stock, consisting of ewes and lambs are being shipped over the Southern Pacific lines, dry bands being trailed in.

With the advent of the standard gauge railroad through this section, Anchordoguy can move his sheep from the Sacramento valley to their summer range in less than 24 hours, whereas it formerly took three weeks to make the trip. Anchordoguy runs about 7,000 ewes with their lambs in this section, where he has a heavy investment in ranch and range property.

Chris H. Hansen Gets Fine Flow In Artesian Well

CEDARVILLE, (Modoc Co.), May 12.—One of the largest artesian wells in Surprise Valley was brought into existence in the artesian belt south of this place last week with the advent of a new well on the ranch of Chris H. Hansen.

The new well flows over 29,000 gallons of water per hour and without capping shoots nine feet above the surface of the ground. The water from this well will be used for irrigating a large area on the Hansen ranch.

Barkeley Given Three Year Term In Federal Jail

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12. (UP)—William Barkeley, 50, Modoc Indian, and prominent farmer of the Klamath reservation, who was captured near Bend last week after a thrilling auto chase, was sentenced by Judge Fee today to serve three years in McNeil Island federal penitentiary.

Barkeley had been on parole and the parole was revoked last week when he threatened members of his family with a rifle during a drinking bout. He fled and his capture ensued.

Pilots Cautioned About Beaches

SALEM, Ore., May 12 (UP)—Airplane pilots were cautioned by state and federal department of commerce authorities to use extreme care in beach landings. "Failure of airmen landing on public beaches to take precautionary measures for the benefit of the public, constitutes violation of federal air commerce regulations," it was pointed out. Coming of hot weather when persons swarm to the beaches, prompted the warning.

Seize Justice Court Records Over Election

BELLINGHAM, May 12, (UP)—Books and records of the Marietta township justice court were seized today by Sheriff T. C. Fraser, on an order by Judge E. D. Hardin. They were placed in the custody of the county auditor until the election dispute between Herbert H. James and W. H. Heumel is settled.

Heumel, Marietta justice until defeated in a recent election for the office by James, faces a charge of contempt of court because he refused to surrender the books and records, despite a court order that he do so.
