At The Vox

The romance of the old west, not yet faded before the sweep of civilization and industrialization, lives again in vivid, thrilling moments of action and adventure as Hoot Gibson's latest and most realistic production, "Clearing the Range" is screened at the New Vox theatre. The western special, dealing with life on the limitless plains, started its local run yesterday.

Thrilling fights, clever comedy and amazing intrigue create high entertainment, but through it all the main character is real, rather than moviegoer. Gibson's famed ability as a horseman is exhibited at every turn, but his impersonation of a dashing Mexican desperado punctuates the dramatic moments with a lightness that is welcome. When he and the Mexican lad who is his pal go forth at night, the latter in the garb of a senorita, laughter vies with thrills in the audience's reactions.

Sally Eilers is pretty and convincing as the scornful girl whose flashing eyes brand the "peaceable" cowboy as a coward. She only knows what she sees—and Hoot, for reasons of his own, doesn't care to be seen in his true light as a reckless, fearless adventurer. Juan, his Mexican partner in nocturnal "banditry" is played by George Mendoza. Robert Homans, Hooper Atchley, Mme. Eva Grippen, Jack Byron and others give sincere performances of other principal characters.

Credit is due the author, Jack Cunningham, and the continuity and dialog writer, John Nafford, for the originality and excellence of the plot, quite different from anything in the western line seen in the past year. Otto Brower's direction is admirable.

In importance to old persons, automobile fatalities.

"FATAL falls among the aged occur, for the most part, in or about the home," the study showed. "About half these fatalities are due to falling down stairs, tripping over rugs or carpets, falling off or over chairs, and falling in bathtubs are of no small importance."

STUDY HOME SAFETY

"Such accidents, when they happen to younger persons, are not likely to end fatally. But in old age, any sort of an injury, including the shocks arising from fractures, dislocations, multiple contusions or even lesser injuries, often hasten death, even if they are not primary causes."

WHAT can be done to check the rising deathrate from falls among elderly persons? Several states are going deeply into the study of home safety.

The majority of these falls, it was discovered, would never occur if a little more care or forethought were exercised. Many fatal falls are traceable to poor illumination, loose, broken or badly spaced treads, or to obstructions left on stairways. The combination of highly polished floors and small rugs is particularly dangerous.

Governor Meier Invites California's Executive To Grants Pass Event

Official pressure was brought to bear today on Governor James Rolph, Jr., to assure his presence at the dedication of the Grants Pass bridge, Saturday, May 23, when a telegraphic message was dispatched to California's chief executive by Governor Julius Meier, of Oregon.

The celebration, which will be a coastwide affair, will be attended by Governor Meier, Governor Roland H. Hartley, of Washington and high officials of Federal Columbia, as well as by federal and state highway officials and civic and commercial leaders from all parts of the Pacific coast.

ARRANGE FOR PLANE

Up to the present time Governor Rolph has been unable to give definite assurance of his presence at the bridge fete, owing to a conflict of engagements.

President Edward Morris, of the Redwood Empire association, which, with the Grants Pass chamber of commerce, the Oregon highway commission, the Josephine County court and the Oregon Cavesmen, Inc. is sponsoring the affair, has arranged for a tri-motored airplane to convey the governor to Grants Pass.

In his telegram Governor Meier urged upon Governor Rolph the importance of the new bridge as a master link in the Pacific coast highway system and one vital to Pacific coast travel, informing him his presence at the dedication will go far toward cementing the ties that bind the states and provinces of the coast.

Civil Service Examination Is Announced

The United States Civil Service commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows:

Associate timber expert, \$3,200 to \$3,800 a year; assistant timber expert, \$2,800 to \$3,200 a year; forest service, department of agriculture.

Chief instrument maker, \$2,300 a year; principal instrument maker, \$2,600 a year; senior instrument maker, \$1,800 a year; instrument maker, \$1,420 a year; Departmental or field service.

All states except Delaware, Iowa, Maine, Maryland, Vermont, Virginia, and the District of Columbia have received less than their share of appointments in the apportioned Departmental Service at Washington, D. C.

Full information may be obtained from R. L. Griffith, secretary of the United States Civil Service board of examiners at the postoffice or customhouse in this city.
