



TOM LOUGHRAN WINS EASILY FROM CAMPOLO

Displays Boxing Skill And Has Power Behind His Punches

NEW YORK, May 15. (UP)—Tommy Loughran, Philadelphia boxing master, easily defeated Victorio Campolo, Argentine giant, in a 16-round bout here tonight, opening the summer heavyweight season.

Loughran's victory was the most impressive of his long career and brought him an ovation from the 15,000 fans in Madison Square Garden.

WINS EASILY
Loughran, outweighted, 154 to 225 pounds, took eight of the 16 rounds and clearly was the master of the South American giant. Judges Tommy Shortell and Charles F. Mathison, and Referee Ted Gahan, agreed in the decision.

Campolo, rated as one of the foremost heavyweight contenders, was badly outclassed by the clever Philadelphia. He made a game effort and kept trying until the final bell but never had a chance of victory.

DISPLAYS SKILL
Loughran showed all the boxing skill which enabled him to retire undefeated as world's light heavyweight champion and in addition was punching harder than in previous New York appearances.

He won largely on boxing skill but also had the satisfaction of outpunching a man rated as one of the hardest hitters in the division. Tommy had the Argentine bleeding from the mouth as early as the first round, and when the final bell rang, Campolo was bleeding from the nose and ear.

STAGGERS GIANT
Loughran surprised with the ease with which he stepped inside Campolo's defense to put stiff rights and lefts to the face. Rated as a "featherduster" puncher, he actually staggered Campolo on several occasions, as well as forcing him to break ground in exchange of blows.

Campolo did the rushing throughout the bout, but only occasionally was he able to land his blows. At long distance he was no match at all for Loughran, and when they clinched Tommy outscored him three to one.

The Argentine took only two rounds, the first and eighth. **TOM'S STOCK GOES UP**

Tommy never was seriously damaged and finished the bout apparently as fresh as he started. Campolo, who looked hog-fat, was unable to keep up the fast pace and had tired badly at the finish.

The defeat effectively removes Campolo as a heavyweight title contender, while Loughran again is rated as one of the foremost aspirants. He had been promised a return match with Jack Sharkey in event he won.

Law Paclon, 122, Waterford, N. Y., and Pettie Hayes, 125, New York, fought to a draw in an interesting four-round preliminary. Abe Callahan Lipschitz, 187, of New York's East Side, knocked out Buddy Howard, 188, of New Haven, Conn., (4).

Steve Hamas, 192, Elizabeth, N. J., belted out Al Morro 195, California, in 1:16 of the second round.

Phil Moffatt Injures Ankle

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., May 16. (UP)—Phil Moffatt, star halfback of the Stanford football team, broke a small bone in his left ankle during practice scrimmage here today that may handicap him after the season starts this fall. Dr. E. F. Roth examined Moffatt and said the injury would take time to heal.

Title Changes Hands in Bout

BOSTON, May 15. (UP)—The New England welterweight title changed hands at Boston Garden tonight when Lou Brouillard, youthful Worcester boxer, scored a technical knockout over Al Middle of Lowell in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-round fight. Some 15,000 persons witnessed the bout.

He stands well up to the ball and plays it a little more off the right foot, with the left toe pointed out a little. The left arm is kept straight, hands are in close to the body, and slightly ahead of the clubhead.

PHILADELPHIA AND ST. LOUIS INCREASE LEADS

Athletics Beat Cleveland, Cards Gain While Idle by Loss

NEW YORK, May 15. (UP)—Philadelphia and St. Louis increased their leads in the American and National leagues, respectively, today. The Athletics defeated Cleveland 4 to 0 and the Cardinals, although idle, gained a half game when the second-place New York Giants dropped a 3 to 2 decision to Pittsburgh.

VETERAN WINS
Old Eddie Rummel, a veteran of many campaigns, allowed the Indians only nine scattered hits in turning in the Athletics' shutout victory. It marked Cleveland's sixth consecutive defeat at the hands of eastern teams. Although Philadelphia was held to nine hits by Brown and Harder, they combined four Cleveland errors with their blows to score the winning tallies.

Making his initial appearance this season, Old George Uhle allowed the New York Yankees but five hits as Detroit won, 2 to 0. The Yankees dropped to second place, a full game behind the Athletics. Doubles by Uhle and Alexander and a single by Owen gave the Tigers their two runs off Pennock in the sixth inning.

RED SOX WIN
The Chicago Red Sox, continuing their sloppy fielding, lost to the Boston Red Sox, 12 to 8. The White Sox committed eight errors in losing their seventh successive game. Sweeney and Webb, with three hits each led Boston's attack on Faber and McKain. Simmons and Watwood each hit safely three times to lead the Chicago batters.

An eighth inning rally, during which they knocked Walter Stewart from the box, brought Washington to a 5 to 0 decision over the lowly St. Louis Browns. The Browns scored four runs in the third off Marberry but could do little against his successor, Hadley.

Clarence Mitchell, the veteran southpaw spitballer, suffered his first defeat in 16 starts when the Giants lost to Pittsburgh, 3 to 2. In 10 innings Mitchell had won five consecutive games this year to add to the 10-game winning streak with which he closed the 1930 season. He would have scored a shutout in regulation time had it not been for sloppy fielding by his mates. Grant-ham's double and Traynor's single gave the Pirates the winning run.

BROOKLYN WINS
Strong relief pitching by Clyde Day, a rookie, allowed Brooklyn to defeat the Chicago Cubs, 6 to 4. The Cubs knocked Babe Phelps from the mound in the first inning but could do little against Day. The Robins sent Smith to the showers in the fourth when they combined Bensonette's homer, a triple, a double and two bases on balls for four runs.

Although Chuck Klein hit two home runs—his seventh and eighth of the season—the Philadelphia Phillies dropped both ends of a doubleheader to the Cincinnati Reds, 10 to 5 and 7 to 5. The Reds bombarded four Phillies pitchers for 15 hits in the first game while Red Lucas coasted to victory. In the second game Cincinnati continued its batting assault and got 14 hits off four other Philadelphia pitchers while Kolp and Benton held the Phils in check.

The game scheduled between Boston and St. Louis in the National league was postponed because of rain.

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60,000 TO SEE ANNUAL DERBY

Fifteen Thoroughbreds To Start; Twenty Grand Favored

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 15. (UP)—The spell of the Kentucky derby, America's most picturesque horse race, held this old southern city in its grip tonight.

For tomorrow the fifty-seventh running of the derby, first run in 1875, will take place before a throng expected to exceed 60,000.

And it will be run in fair weather and over a fast track for the first time in five years unless all predictions fail. There hasn't been a dry track and sunshine for a derby since 1926.

Fifteen thoroughbreds, out of an original field of 150 nominations, have been named for this mile and a quarter struggle for turf glory and a \$50,000 added purse.

The Green tree stable's entry of Twenty Grand, Surf Board and Anchors Aweigh, probably will go to the post favored at odds of 8-5. Twenty Grand will carry most of the crowd's money as Surf Board is in the race to set the early pace and Anchors Aweigh probably will be scratched unless the track is heavy.

Mate, owned by A. C. Hostwick, 20-year old New York millionaire, probably will be second choice at odds of five to two. When Mate and Twenty Grand met in the Preakness, Hostwick's colt won by a length and a half in a mile and three sixteenths.

Twenty Grand will be out to turn the tables on his Preakness conqueror and four out of every five horsemen down here believe that if the race is between these two horses, Mrs. Whitney's colt will triumph.

Of the 15 horses named, at least three—Up, Don Leon and one of the Green tree entries—probably will be scratched (reducing the field to 12, the

smallest since 1922. It is possible that a couple of others, the Moncol and Prince d'Amour, also will be scratched, which would reduce the starters to 10.
