



LEADERS OF LEAGUES WIN, EAST LEADS

Brooklyn, Only Eastern Nine to Lose, Beaten By Cards, 6 to 2

NEW YORK, May 19. (UP)—Eastern major league teams showed western clubs how baseball should be played again today when they won five of six games.

Brooklyn's funny Robins, who turn in sparkling fielding plays one day only to reverse the order the next to see who can make the most errors, was the lone representative of the Atlantic seaboard to lose. Boston, New York and Philadelphia in the National league and Philadelphia and New York in the American turned in victories for the east.

A'S TRIM TIGERS
The 5 to 9 victory of the Athletics over the Detroit Tigers stretched their winning streak to 11 consecutive games, enabling them to retain their two game margin over the second place New York Yankees. George Eastman let the Tigers down with two hits while the Athletics made the best of their nine hits off Hoyt.

New York kept pace with the leaders by handing Cleveland its 11th consecutive defeat, 5 to 6. The Yankees piled up an eight run lead off Brown and Schofield in the first four innings while Johnson, who relieved Ruffing in the second, held the Indians at bay.

The other two scheduled games in the American league, between Washington and Chicago and Boston and St. Louis were postponed because of rain.

CARDS BEAT ROBINS
St. Louis was the lone western team to win, defeating Brooklyn 6 to 2 to retain their National league leadership. The Cardinals, after being held to three hits in seven innings, knocked Phelps and Quinn from the mound in the eighth inning when they combined six hits with two errors for five runs. Hallahan and Derringer allowed 11 hits, but kept them well scattered. Brooklyn was charged with five errors.

The New York Giants kept pace with the Cardinals by defeating Cincinnati 5 to 3. The Giants knocked their old teammate, Larry Benton, from the mound in the sixth inning as Morrell, a rookie, kept the eight hits he allowed the Reds well scattered.

CUBS LOSE 9-5
Chicago continued its losing ways by dropping a 9 to 5 verdict to the Boston Braves. The Braves scored eight runs in the first inning when they knocked Guy Bush from the box and continued their assault on Fred Blake. Cantwell held the Cubs at bay until the late innings, when he was replaced by Cummings when Chicago threatened in the seventh.

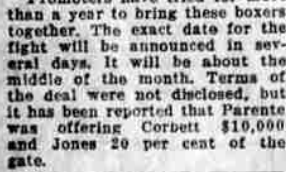
In the other game played the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3 to 2. Fine relief pitching by H. Elliott enabled the Phillies to win in the ninth inning, with the bases loaded and no one out, he took J. Elliott's place and forced pinch-hitter Brane to hit into a double play and retired the next batter on a fly. Philadelphia got to French for 13 hits, three of which were made by Bartell.

Young Corbett, Gorilla Jones Meet in June
OAKLAND, May 19. (UP)—Young Corbett III of Fresno, and "Gorilla" Jones, of Akron, O., leading contenders for world's welterweight championship, will meet here in June to decide the California welterweight championship. Louis Parente, local promoter, announced today.

Suey Welch, manager of Jones, agreed that Jones would cut his weight to 145½ pounds by 2 p. m. the day of the fight. Corbett will be asked to be under that weight, also, but he usually enters the ring at 148 pounds.

Promoters have tried for more than a year to bring these boxers together. The exact date for the fight will be announced in several days. It will be about the middle of the month. Terms of the deal were not disclosed, but it has been reported that Parente was offering Corbett \$10,000 and Jones 20 per cent of the gate.

Why must the left hand be in control of the backswing and the start of the downswing?

The left hand is the guiding factor of the swing. When the right overpowers the left, the clubhead can't be kept along the line of flight. It turns sharply inward toward the left, cutting across the ball and imparting a spin which sends the ball to the right of the fairway. Much of this spin is due to too little use of the left hand and arm.

Let the left hand and arm dominate the backswing and the start of the downswing. Don't let it be overpowered by the right.

TOMORROW—Should the right hand grip the club over or under the shaft?

FAVOR VOIGHT FOR TITLE IN BRITISH PLAY

Passes Third Test; Fourth and Fifth Rounds to Be Played Today

WESTWARD HO, Eng., May 19. (UP)—George Voigt of New York passed his third test in the British amateur golf championship today and became a 4-to-1 favorite to win the title.

Voigt's third round match was with J. R. Abercrombie of Royal Liverpool, and was won by the score of 2 and 1.

PUTTER GETS AWAY
It was Abercrombie who yesterday eliminated Douglas Fairbanks, the movie actor, 1 up. But where Abercrombie played well against Fairbanks, Voigt played spotty golf against Abercrombie.

Voigt's familiar golfing question mark, his putter, which worked neatly in his first two matches of Monday, got away from him today. Especially was Voigt inept with his putter on the second green, where he required three strokes to go down.

SHORTEST ODDS
Voigt also encountered trouble on the 11th hole. His drive was caught in some rushes. He played a provisional ball, but tried to back out his original. This effort was abortive, and Voigt picked up, conceding the hole.

Odds against Voigt at 4-to-1 were the shortest ever established at the end of the third round of the championship. Book-makers offered odds of 5-to-1 against Bobby Jones after he had completed his third round last year.

Voigt was the only overseas player remaining in the tournament tonight.

Americans eliminated today were J. T. (59) Maguire of Taft, Calif.; Paul Asbill, an American registered from Sunningdale; Douglas Grant, California; E. J. Hadden, Berkeley, Calif.; Joshua Crane, Brookline, Mass.; J. H. Forsman, Wampanoag, N. Y.; and C. L. (Chuck) Lewis, Hollywood, Calif.

Fourth and fifth rounds will be played tomorrow and they will reduce the field to eight.

Voigt will meet Bernard Darwin, golf writer. Roper is to play L. H. R. Hornsby. Weathered plays A. Macbeck. Lester Hartley plays R. Straker. Tolley plays S. Lunt.

PORTLAND LOSES 3 TO 1

Leaders of Coast League Beaten By Second Set Clubs Tuesday

SAN FRANCISCO, May 19. (UP)—Leaders of the Pacific Coast League met reverses tonight, three of them tumbling before the determined onslaught of ambitious clubs lower in the standings.

The Missions and San Francisco Seals went into third place, still tied, and were less than half a game behind the league-leading Hollywood Stars. Los Angeles held second place by a small mathematical margin.

The Seals trounced Hollywood, 10 to 1. Sam Gibson was on the mound for the Seals and Barbee's homer in the second inning was the only Hollywood hit that counted for a run.

Home runs by Burns and Clarke gave the Missions a 5 to 2 victory over Los Angeles. With the score tied, two-all, Clarke hit his home run in the first of the ninth inning.

Sacramento's 3 to 1 win over Portland sent the Beavers from third to fifth place. Chesterfield allowed the Beavers only five hits.

Two runs scored in the last of the sixth inning gave Oakland a 5 to 3 victory over Seattle.

BATTALINO IS HARTFORD HERO

Home Town Folks Back Champion Against LaBarba

HARTFORD, Conn., May 19. (UP)—Unlike the proverbial prophets, world's featherweight champion Christopher (Bat) Battalino enjoys more fame in his home town than elsewhere.

A visit to Battalino's training quarters in the dingy St. Nicholas gym here, where he is training for his championship battle with Fidel LaBarba at Madison Square Garden, New York Friday night, proved to New York sports writers that the "Bat" is a hero to his fellow citizens.

ODDS ON LABARBA
Battalino regarded generally as a sort of "cheese champ" easily is the most popular of Hartford's 160,000 citizens.

With New York gamblers offering 10 to 6 against the champion, Hartfordians are backing their favorite to the limit and already arrangements have been made for more than 1,000 fans to make the bus trip to New York for Friday's bout.

Battalino is a native of Hartford, having been born here 23 years ago.

Battalino made his first—and only—away from home title defense against Kid Chocolate at New York on a 1 to 3 underdog in the betting.

SHOWS GAMENESS
The hard-hitting battler surprised the boxing world by defeating the clever Cuban and enabling his supporters to win heavily. His willingness to meet LaBarba, regarded as the uncrowned king of the division, has further established Battalino's gameness and if he can turn in another upset he will take ranking with great champions of the past.

A thrashing of the Battling Nelson bout of fighter, Battalino was impressive in today's drill. He boxed six rounds and was punching impressively. Although he is the type of fighter who is easy to hit and will take two blows to land one, Battalino is unusually rugged and the fact that the bout is scheduled for 15 rounds is to his advantage.
