GIANTS NEAR FIRST PLACE: A'S VICTORS

New York Shuts Out Reds While Cards Drop to Brooklyn 5-4

NEW YORK, May 20. (UP)—The New York Giants advanced to within a few percentage points of first place in the National League today when they shut out Cincinnati, 4 to 0, while the St. Louis Cardinals were losing to Brooklyn, 5 to 4.

St. Louis still holds the leadership with an average of .696 while the Giants, who have won two more and lost one more game have a mark of .692.

HOME RUNS BEAT CARDS

John Berly, Giant rookie, allowed the Reds to hit five hits. New York scored all of its runs in the sixth inning off Elias Johnson on singles by Leach and Lindstrom, a double by Marshall and a home run by Terry.

A single by Babe Herman, with men on first and second and one out in the ninth inning, enabled the Robins to nose out St. Louis. The Cardinals had tied the score in their half of the final inning when they knocked Luque from the mound. Hallahan, who won yesterday, was the losing pitcher. He had relieved Stout after the eighth inning.

ARLETT HITS HOMERS

Two home runs by Arlett, sensational rookie, featured Philadelphia's 11 to 7 victory over Pittsburgh. Arlett's homers were his eighth and ninth of the season to put him in the major league lead. The Pirates piled on a 7-run lead off Bolen in the first four innings but could do little against his successor, while Kremer, who started for Pittsburgh, weakened in the late innings and finally was removed in the seventh.

The Chicago Cubs came out of their slump to defeat Boston, 7 to 5 in the other National League game. The Cubs got to Frankhouse for four runs in the first and continued their assault on McAfee.

GROVE GETS SHUTOUT

Lesty Grove shut out Detroit, 3 to 0, as the Athletics stretched their winning streak to 12. Grove allowed the Tigers but three hits, one more than Earnshaw yielded yesterday. Home runs by Bing Miller and Jimmy Fox featured Philadelphia's nine hits off Geo. Uhla.

Sam Jones bettered Pat Caraway in a pitching duel as the Washington Senators defeated the Chicago White Sox, 3 to 0. Caraway allowed but three hits, but one of them was a home run by Spencer. An error enabled Washington to score his second run. Jones allowed six hits but Chicago never threatened until the ninth when they had men on first and third as Jones struck out pinch-hitter Simons for the final out.

BROWNS WIN

In the other American league game played, the St. Louis Browns won from the Boston Red Sox, 8 to 4. The Browns piled up a 7-run lead off Gaston and Moore in the first two innings. Two home runs by Pickering, rookie infielder, were included in the 10 hits the Red Sox made off Stewart.

The scheduled game between New York and Cleveland was postponed because of rain.

Eastman, who equaled the world record for the 440 last Saturday, will have Ike Habes in that event with him. Brown is going east to run the mile. Capt. Fodge Smith, Nisbet and Brugman are slated to go over the hurdles. DeGroot is the pole vaulter and Ray the javelin thrower.

Smith and Dyer, the only members of the team not in best condition, left for the east last night. The others will depart Saturday.

THIS IS THE ORTHODOX GRIP USED BY JONES, HORTON SMITH AND TOMMY ARMOUR.



Should the right hand grip the club over or under the shaft?

The club is gripped with the right hand over the shaft in the orthodox swing. This style of grip is used by such stars as Bobby Jones, Horton Smith and Tommy Armour.

It is a lot easier with this grip to hit past the left hand at the impact of clubhead and ball, where the necessary snap of the wrists is needed.

Those who insist on gripping with the right hand under the shaft enjoy only a limited amount of success.

GEORGE VOIGHT IS ELIMINATED

Roger Wethered, Cyril Tolley Eliminated From Fifth Round Play

WESTWARD HO, Eng., May 20 (UP)—George Voigt of New York, and Roger Wethered and Cyril Tolley, British aces, were eliminated today from the fifth round of the British amateur golf championship, and a field of eight "unknowns" was left to finish an already uninteresting title tournament.

Defeat of these three stars combined to supply the greatest upset in British golfing history. It was an occurrence so unexpected that a bookmaker who could even have dreamed it would happen would have been willing to lay enormous odds against it.

ONLY TWO VETS

Only two of the surviving eight players have ever before lasted until the quarter final round. And only one of them, Syd Roper, who beat Voigt, was familiar to golf enthusiasts overseas. It was Roper who last year gave Bobby Jones an earnest struggle by scoring 15 fours out of a possible 16.

Voigt was the only remaining overseas player when the fourth round was begun this morning. He won his fourth round match with Bernard Darwin, British golf writer, and was favored to beat Roper.

BREAK FOR BOOKIES

Voigt scored a par 27 to be 2 up on Roper at the turn. Roper was out in 29. But the American's game fell away from form in the last half of the journey. He scored 41 strokes coming home, and seven of them were on a miserably played 15th hole.

Voigt's defeat was a great break for the bookmakers who had yesterday established him favorite at 4 to 1.

DEFEAT SURPRISED

Wethered's defeat was even more surprising and scored as a more distinct upset. He had been playing consistently well and with meticulous carelessness, something unusual for him. The gallery was thus stunned no end when he lost the first three holes of his match with W. Tulloch. Tulloch was one up at the turn, and four up at the 12th. Wethered then won the 13th, 14th, 15th, and halved the remaining three holes to give Tulloch a victory by 1 up.

PICTURESQUE FIGURE

Tulloch lost his match with Capt. H. C. Tippett by 3 and 2. His own erratic and wild play cost Tolley his life in the tournament.

Possibly the most picturesque figure among the eight survivors is Dr. J. D. McCormack who eliminated R. Straker in the mid-west. Dr. McCormack is a 40-year old war veteran. He was badly wounded in the war and plays with the aid of steel and leather braces.

The quarter-final and semi-final rounds will be played tomorrow.

ARTEUL, France, May 20. (UP)—George Lott and John Van Ryn, United States stars, advanced to the fourth round of the doubles competition of the French hand court championships today when they defeated the French team of Antoine Gentien and Georges Glasser, 6-1, 6-3, 11-13, 6-3.

Lott, paired with Miss Helen Jacobs of California, also moved into the fourth round of the mixed doubles championship. Lott and Miss Jacobs defeated Madame Vauseard and P. Albarran, both of France, 7-5, 6-2.

Elizabeth Ryan, British-American star, and Jean Borotra, of France, won two matches today to advance into the fourth round of the mixed doubles. In their second round match they defeated Senorita Valerio and Del Bono of Italy, 6-3, 6-2, while in the third round they eliminated Mme. Serpieri of Italy and Ian Collins of England, 6-1, 6-2.

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, May 20. (UP)—Poland and Denmark broke even in the two opening singles matches of their European quarter-final Davis cup tennis play today.

Build Fence at Fair Grounds Before Races
