BUDDY POPPY HONORS DEAD OF LATE WAR

Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary Will Sell Poppies

The Veterans of Foreign Wars and their auxiliary will endeavor to know what the purpose of the Buddy poppy sale to be held Saturday is.

"In the minds of all patriotic men and women the term 'Buddy poppy' should be synonymous with Memorial day, because with the Buddy poppies we seek to honor the dead by helping the living. Since every single Buddy poppy is made by a disabled veteran in some one of the many United States Veterans' hospitals. The poppies to be sold in Klamath Falls were made in the hospital at Portland." Mrs. H. D. Williamson, in charge of the sale, stated.

In 1923 the V. F. W. became the first veteran organization to conduct a nation-wide sale of poppies, and the sale has grown year by year until this year the V. F. W. expect the sale throughout the nation to reach at least six million poppies. Every cent of the proceeds goes for relief work. A part to the veterans who made the little red flowers, for the support of themselves and families, part for the hospitals and a part for the upkeep of the V. F. W. orphan home at Eaton Rapids, Mich.

Everyone who helps in the poppy sale is a volunteer worker. The official V. F. W. poppy may be identified by the little white slip, attached to each poppy, bearing the name "Buddy Poppy," and the insignia of the V. F. W., the cross of Malta.

"A group of Campfire Girls, as well as daughters and sisters and wives of the veterans will be on the streets all day Saturday, selling the little red flower, reminiscent of the fields of Flanders. So be sure to buy a poppy, to help the living and wear it on Memorial day to honor those who gave all they had, their lives, for our country," Mrs. Williamson asked.
