



EAST'S CLUBS BEAT WEST'S IN CAMPAIGN

Browns Only Western Team to Win; Weather Halts Nationals

NEW YORK, May 21 (UP)—Major league teams closed their first intercontinental competition of 1931 today with the eastern clubs holding a decided edge over the west.

Eastern teams of the American league won 32 contests and lost 11, while in the National circuit representatives of the Atlantic seaboard took 20 out of 32 games.

ST. LOUIS WINS
The eastern aggregations won three and lost one today. Philadelphia, Washington and New York won and St. Louis was the lone western club to win.

Philadelphia hammered four Detroit pitchers for 15 hits as they won their thirteenth consecutive contest, 12 to 5. Home runs by Cochrane, Simmons and McNair featured the Athletics' batting attack. Rommel, who started for the Athletics, was knocked from the mound in the second inning, while Mahaffey, who succeeded him, gave way to Walsh in the seventh.

YANKEES KEEP PACE
The New York Yankees kept pace with the Athletics by defeating Cleveland, 7 to 6. It was the twelfth successive defeat for the Indians. Babe Ruth's fifth home run featured the Yankees' 13 hit attack on Hudlin and Miller. Ruth also got a triple and a double. The Indians got 13 hits off Pipgras, Gomez and Sherid but failed to come through in the pinches.

Holmes' Manush's batting gave the Washington Senators a 4 to 3 verdict over the Chicago White Sox. Manush hit a home run, triple and a single to account for all of Washington's runs. Hadley and Marberry held Chicago to five hits, one of which was a home run by Jeffries in the sixth inning. The Senators got seven hits off Thomas and McKinn.

NATIONALS STOPPED
Phil Collins allowed the Red Sox but four hits as St. Louis defeated Boston, 2 to 1. The Browns bunched most of their seven hits off Russell and MacFayden in the sixth and seventh innings.

All of the games scheduled for the National league were postponed because of rain.

Arizona-Texas Ball League In Difficulties

TUCSON, Ariz., May 21 (UP)—The Arizona-Texas league was confronted tonight with the threatened resignation of President Wilford Sullinger, and loss of all the umpires, if two clubs did not pay their dues.

The clubs Globe and Tucson have failed to send in their assessments, Sullinger said, and as a result the clubs may be deprived of services of umpires.

Both teams are farms for the Pacific Coast league, Globe for the San Francisco Seals and Tucson for the Missions. Al Floyd, president of the Globe club, said \$700 was expected from the Seals June 1, and that the dues would be paid for May as soon as possible.

Sullinger said he had written several times to the club presidents asking for the dues, but no money had been received.

"If I don't get the money, I can't pay the umpires, so I see no reason why they should be allowed to use them," Sullinger said.

The league president added that "some of the league teams are going to break up one of these mornings without a president or umpire."

TO GET A BALL INTO THE AIR IT IS NECESSARY TO HIT DOWN ON IT



How can a player get his ball into the air on pitch shots?

Few golfers realize the importance of the ball in the air on the pitch shot. Many have the idea that it is only the loft of the club that makes the ball climb.

If you rely solely on the loft of the club to send your ball high, the trajectory will be considerably lower than if you hit down on the ball, imparting a spin to it. Backspin does send a ball into the air, and the more spin to the club, the more backspin can be applied. Backspin also will retard the roll of the ball, sending it more closely to the place you pitch it.

Don't try to lift the ball into the air. You'll probably top it.

CANADA, U. S. BREAK EVEN

Opening Singles Matches In Davis Cup Play Divided

MONTREAL, May 21 (UP)—The United States and Canada broke even today in the two opening singles matches of their North American zone final round of Davis cup tennis play.

Frank Childs of New York accounted for the United States victory when he defeated Dr. Jack Wright, Canada's ranking No. 1 player, in straight sets, 5-6, 6-3, 6-4.

CANADIAN SLUMPS
Canada's victory was turned in by Marcel Rainville, who won a gruelling five set contest from Sidney Wood of New York, 4-6, 6-4, 6-3, 2-6, 6-4.

Shields had little difficulty with Wright. The Canadian star slumped badly after making a remarkable rally in the first set and was bewildered by Shields' bullet-like returns to the base line.

Wright's usually reliable backhand was not working, but even if it had been he could not have hoped to defeat the New York youngster. Shields mastered every stroke known to tennis and had Wright running all over the court.

CHANGED FACE WINS
Rainville's change of pace enabled him to win from Wood. He played a cautious game and waited for Wood to commit errors rather than drive the ball by the New Yorker. Wood made a brilliant rally after dropping two of the first three sets and tied the match at two all only to lose out in the last set when he netted his attempted returns of Rainville's volleys.

The doubles match will be played tomorrow with Shields and Wood forming the United States combination. Wright and Rainville will be paired against them.

LaBarba Quoted Favorite For Battalino Bout

NEW YORK, May 21 (UP)—Fidel LaBarba of California, was an 8 to 5 favorite today to defeat Bat Battalino, featherweight champion of the world, in their 16-round title fight in Madison Square Garden here tomorrow night.

LaBarba, former flyweight champion, finished his training today and was reported in top shape. The little Californian is not bothered by the weight and is not expected to work at all tomorrow.

Battalino, still a pound or so above the required weight of 126, engaged in quite a workout today at his home in Hartford, Conn. He will end his preparation with a light workout tomorrow morning and then motor to New York for the weighing-in ceremonies.

Burleigh Grimes Fined, Suspended

NEW YORK, May 21 (UP)—Burleigh Grimes, star pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals, was fined \$50 and suspended for three days by President John A. Heydler of the National league today for his umpire-baiting in yesterday's game with Brooklyn.

The game, which the Cardinals lost, was halted five times before Umpire Moran finally succeeded in getting Grimes to leave the players' bench.

Denmark Beats Polish Team

COPENHAGEN, May 21 (UP)—Denmark gained the upper hand over Poland today in the European quarter final Davis cup tennis play when that country won the doubles contest to take the lead, two matches to one.

The Denmark combination of Einar Ulrich and P. Hendriksen were forced to give five sets to defeat Ignace Tloczynski and Max Stolarow, Poland pair. The scores were 6-4, 6-8, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Al Brown Kayoes Baldock in 12th

LONDON, May 21 (UP)—Al Brown of Panama, recognized by many boxing commissions as the world's bantamweight champion, scored a technical knockout over Teddy Baldock of England, in the twelfth round of their scheduled 15-rounder at Olympia hall here tonight.

THREE TEAMS CONTINUE RACE

Hollywood, Los Angeles And Portland Stay In Front of Others

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21 (UP)—Hollywood, Los Angeles and Portland continued their successful campaign to stay in front of five other teams of the Pacific Coast league tonight.

Hollywood defeated the San Francisco Seals, 5 to 0, Los Angeles beat the Missions, 6 to 2, and Portland was victorious over Sacramento, 3 to 0.

The Seals jumped into an early lead, then Hollywood forged three runs ahead and the Seals tied the score in the last of the seventh. The Stars then showed the winning punch by making two runs in the first of the eighth.

Bacon's home run helped the Angels score five runs in the fifth inning and they stayed ahead.

Walter Malla, Portland pitcher, allowed Sacramento only four hits.

Oakland trounced Seattle, 6-1.

Liberate Over Million Game Fish In State

SALEM, May 21 (UP)—Seven Oregon counties liberated more than 1,000,000 game fish during the last fiscal year.

Of the 21,152,335 game fish liberated in all the state, 1,118,962 were set out in Coos county, 2,754,948 in Douglas, 1,154,700 in Hood River, 1,860,754 in Jackson, 1,860,754 in Klamath, 1,735,360 in Lane, and 1,212,300 in Wasco.

Baker county was apportioned 250,000, Benton 40,000, Clatsop 56,975, Deschutes 980,209, Linn 982,750, Marion 395,520, and Multnomah 70,000.

43 Per Cent of Population in Gainful Work

SALEM, May 21 (UP)—Forty-three per cent of Oregon's population is employed in gainful occupations.

Census figures received here show that of the 409,680 gainful workers, 528,359 are males and 81,321 females.

Agricultural workers number 250,000, including 49,917 farmers, and 30,824 farm laborers.

By industry groups the remainder of the gainful workers are distributed as follows:

Forestry and fishing, 21,353; mining, 2,444; manufacturing and mechanical industries, 99,431; including 25,101 in saw and planing mills, 20,703 in building, 8,140 in iron and steel; transportation, 44,470; including 16,643 on steam and street railroads; trade, 67,893; including banking and insurance; domestic and personal service, 37,029; and professional service, 345,175.
