### New Quarter To Be Issued Soon

SALEM, Ore., May 22. (UP)—The state treasury received word that designs will be submitted at Washington soon for a new quarter, to be issued next year as part of the celebration of the 25th anniversary of George Washington's birth.

It will be the first U. S. coin of regular issue to bear the image of the "Father of His Country," officials said. Features of the first president were used on a few coins in 1793, but these never were approved by the government. Only one presidential coin to date was issued, the current one-cent Lincoln copper.

SHE ISN'T TOO OLD  
LONDON—Believed to be England's oldest woman, Mrs. Elizabeth Hasler of South Primrose Hill, Chesham, has just died. Mrs. Hasler was 105 and, at 102, became the nation's youngest flapper. She had her bobbed at that age. She is survived by eight children, 35 grandchildren, 59 great-grandchildren and 4 great-great-grandchildren—a total of 105.

### Student Not Expelled For Editing 'Forum'

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., May 22. (UP)—Exception was taken tonight by Robert E. Swain, acting president of Stanford university, to published reports that Gunnar Norberg had been expelled from the university because he was editor of the college forum, a magazine that was assertedly frowned upon by Swain.

Norberg, it was said, was ousted from the school when he published the magazine off the campus after being notified he could not classify it as an official student publication.

"Norberg was dismissed for one reason and one reason only—that was deficiency in scholarship," Swain said. "He had been placed on probation twice."

Swain remarked it was too bad to remove "the publicity of martyrdom," but such had been gained by "false statements to the press."

DETROIT, May 22. (UP)—"Napoleon Jack" Dorval, highly-touted heavyweight from Quincy, Mass., defeated Tony Galento, Orange, N. J., fighter by decision in an uninteresting ten-round bout here tonight.

An important feature of the film will be the showing of activity of the school boy patrol, said to have been exceptionally effective in reduction of number of accidents that occur near schools.

### Electrocuted By High Tension Wire

SEATTLE, May 22. (UP)—The body of Robert Hedman, who was electrocuted when a high tension wire fell across his body today, dangled from a city light pole here for several minutes before fellow workmen managed to lower him to the ground.

Firemen tried unsuccessfully to revive him. Nearly 4400 volts of electricity were forced through Hedman's body when the wire touched him.

### Oregon One of Seven States To Show Increase

SALEM, Ore., May 22. (UP)—Oregon was one of seven states to show an increase in national forest campers last year.

Other states showing a gain in all types of national forest recreation were Michigan, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, California and Arizona.

While campers and picnickers increased in number, guests of hotels and resorts showed slight loss.

Campers numbered 1,980,737 as against 1,902,961 for 1929. Most of the gain was in the national forests of the west. Estimates for picnickers showed 3,272,652 for 1930, against 3,056,456 for 1929, with increases both in east and west.

Total number of visitors traveling by automobile increased from 28,786,516 in 1929 to 29,541,607 last year. Hikers entering the forests also increased—from 202,272 to 220,553.

California leads with the largest number of national forest recreationists, more than 16,000,000 entering the forests last year.

Arizona was the banner state for gains, with a million and a quarter more visitors than in 1929, a gain of about 80 per cent.
