



### PETROLLE DECISIONED BY McLARNIN

**Abandons Role of Slugger, Fargo Fighter Badly Battered**

NEW YORK, May 27. (UP)—Abandoning his role of a slugger to turn in a mastery boxing exhibition, Jimmy McLarnin of Vancouver, B. C., tonight won a decisive victory over Billy Petrolle of Fargo, N. D. The victory advanced McLarnin's "reputation" by Petrolle in this same ring last November and was convincing enough to leave no doubt as to which was the better man.

The smiling coast Irishman had a lot of respect for his opponent and was content to win his decision through boxing skill, but when the fighters left the ring, Petrolle was badly battered and willing to admit that he had met his master.

**BOXING LESSON**

McLarnin made no attempt to slug with the rugged Petrolle, but he gave the "Fargo Express" as neat a boxing lesson as has been seen in Madison Square Garden in many a day. Jimmy looked like a smaller edition of Tommy Loughran, clever Philadelphia boxing master, and in addition had the ability to punch. He outboxed Petrolle by a wide margin, and when he did let fly with a real punch it was apparent that he had all of the dynamite which has marked his blows in earlier bouts.

Always popular with New York boxing fans, McLarnin was given an ovation worthy of a champion when he entered the ring. When the unanimous decision of Referee Arthur Donovan, and Judges Harold Barnes and Joe Aguello was announced the fans cheered their approval.

**CROWD LARGE**

The crowd was the largest which has witnessed a boxing show at the garden this season. 17,846 spectators paying \$52,377.35.

Jimmy's fine boxing justified the confidence of his supporters who made him a 11 to 5 betting favorite, despite his sound throbbing from Petrolle six months ago, and qualified him for a championship bout with welterweight title holder Jack Thompson.

**TENTH ROUND BEST**

After cutting up Petrolle about the face and slowing him down with jolting lefts in the early rounds, McLarnin opened up slightly and made a fight of it. He staggered Petrolle in the seventh, pounded him severely in the eighth and in the ninth and tenth it appeared that he might win by a knockout.

The tenth round was the best of the fight, with McLarnin going out to win by a knockout and Petrolle putting in a fine rally. The boys stood in mid-ring and traded wallops for the greater part of the session.

**TAKES NO BOXING**

Petrolle failed to win a single round of the fight, although he was the aggressor during all of the early rounds. He earned an even break in the first and again in the fourth.

In the preliminaries Joey Rehr, 133, Jamaica, N. Y., defeated Charley Miller, 134, Brooklyn (4); Eddie McKenna, 142, New York, defeated Lou Murrell, 138, New York, (4); Johnny Galto, 133, New York, defeated Joey Marcus, 132 1/2, Portland, Ore., (8); Eddie Han-144, of Portland, defeated Billy Light, 147, St. Paul, in the 10 round semi-final.

Why should crouching be avoided in the putting stance?

It is fundamentally important to have balance in the putting stance, as well as for the other swings in this game of golf. Good balance without tension is impossible to obtain in a crouched position, and tension, we all know, hinders a rhythmic swing.

There is nothing particularly comfortable about a crouching position over the ball. Furthermore, a crouch puts your grip far down on the handle of the club where it is impossible to swing it low and close to the ground in a smooth, pendulum swing. The crouch with low grip on the club is apt to make a quick lifting stroke with a choppy, downward blow resulting.

A grip near the end of the shaft and position nearly erect in the position advised by most experts.

### GIANTS LEAD, CUBS ADVANCE IN NATIONAL

**Phillies Hold Leadership For Athletics; Senators Win**

NEW YORK, May 27. (UP)—The New York Giants advanced to the National league lead today by defeating Boston 7 to 4 while St. Louis was being shut out by Pittsburgh, 4 to 0.

New York's margin of leadership now is one and one-half games.

A fourth inning attack, featured by Hogan's home run, enabled the Giants to score their third consecutive victory over the Braves. Berly, a rookie, started for the Giants, but gave way to Heving in the eighth.

**CARDINALS SHUT OUT**

Heine Meine, Pittsburgh right hander, shut out the Cardinals for the second time this season. He allowed only eight scattered hits while the Pirates bunched their 10 blows off Johnson and Lincey.

The Chicago Cubs advanced into third place by whipping Cincinnati, 8 to 4, while the Braves were losing to New York. Bush kept the 11 hits he allowed the Reds well scattered, but three errors by his mates kept him in trouble.

**PHILIES LEADING**

Brooklyn and Philadelphia in the National league were not scheduled.

Philadelphia retained its American league leadership margin of four and one-half games by defeating New York, 6 to 5. The Athletics combined three hits with a base on balls off Sberd for the tying and winning runs in the eighth inning. The Yankees had taken the lead in their half by scoring three runs on five hits off Earnshaw. Cochrane continued his heavy hitting with a home run, double and singles in four times at bat.

**SENATORS ADVANCE**

The Washington Senators advanced to second place, a half game ahead of New York by taking a double header from Boston, 11 to 3 and 4 to 3. The Senators combined 11 hits with five Red Sox errors as Brown coasted to victory in the first game. Four errors by their mates caused the downfall of Morris and Moore, Red Sox hurlers, in the second contest.

Chicago took both ends of a twin bill from Detroit, 5 to 4, and 10 to 1. A four run rally in the ninth during which they knocked Whitehill from the hill gave the White Sox victory in the first contest. Pat Caray held the Tigers to five scattered hits in the second encounter while Chicago bombarded Hoyt and Wyatt for 17 blows. The victory enabled the White Sox to take fifth place, a half a game ahead of Detroit.

Cleveland moved into the first division, defeating the St. Louis Browns, 5 to 4, by virtue of a ninth inning rally. Gray held the Indians to one run in eight innings, but faltered in the ninth as Cleveland scored four times.
