PORTLAND, May 27. (UP)—Hogs estimated receipts 240 which includes two loads direct. Salable supply one load which arrived late and the usual supply of trucking. The market was fairly active with prices generally steady although some weakness was shown on good to choice light weight butchers. Top \$7.25 on choice 160 to 200 pounds; bulk 160 to 215 pounds \$7.25, with many offerings within this weight range at \$7. Those scaling 215 to 240 pounds scored \$6.7; 240 to 260 pounds mostly \$5.50@6; odd head packing sows \$4.75.

Feeder pigs scarce. Cattle: Estimated receipts 105, and calves, 10. Fresh offerings by rail supplied two loads of California grass steers which had received little interest at late hour; the drivers were mostly cows with a few heifers and calves; a few small lots 900 to 1200 pound native grass cows \$4; odd head of heifers \$7.25 to \$8.00 pounds made \$4.85; few up to \$5.25. Common cows bulked \$2.25@3.50. Few bulls of medium grade at \$2.50@4. Calves around \$20 pounds at \$1.50; weaners \$4.85.

Sheep: Estimated receipts 500. Generally steady. Best 65 to 75 pound lambs \$7.50, with fairly heavy sort, \$7; 60 to 65 pounds mostly \$5.50. Yearlings scaling \$4.50 to \$4.50; odd head 85 pound butchers \$3. Few ewes 120 to 130 pounds mostly \$2. The demand for low grade lambs is very narrow with apparently no ready outlet.

NEED NEW STUOLS

THE OLD box stove mounted on half bricks, with its rusty stovepipe that usurped the center of the room, is ruled out. A jacketed stove set in the end wall is recommended.
