The investigation is now being carried on and a check cruise is being made of the timber owned by eyerhauser Timber Co., Shell-Hixon Lumber company, Freemont Land company, Day Brothers Lumber Co., Long-Bell Lumber Co., Gilchrist Timber Co., and alker-Hovey Lumber Co.

### CONTRACTS BEING GIVEN FOR CAMPS

Information from an authoritative source revealed Thursday a large portion of supply contracts for civilian conservation camps have been awarded.

Many of Klamath's merchants have been attempting to get information concerning the placing of bids and awarding of contracts for supplies which will be used in camps in the near vicinity of the Klamath Falls. Army officers at Medford headquarters for this district, informed C. R. Williams, county commissioner and R. E. Bradbury, relief director that officers directly in charge of each camp would be given authority to purchase the necessary groceries and food supplies.

According to the information received Thursday, Swift and company has been given the contract for supplying four commodities: beef, pork, poultry and butter. Cook's Produce company of Medford was given the contract for lard, shortening, cheese and smoked meats. Grocery supply contracts were distributed to several well known wholesale dealers and the contract for supplying eggs to the Pacific Cooperative association.

Few bids were submitted on various supplies because of the large orders which it was believed, only large companies would be able to handle.

Although about 29 camps will be constructed in the Medford headquarters district, approximately nine will be directly serviced from Medford, according to information. Branch companies of those awarded contracts, stationed in Klamath Falls are expected to service four camps.

### Oiling Work Will Start On Highway

MACDOEL, Calif. — Tiebert and Son of Sacramento will start June 5, to fulfill their contract to oil the Klamath Falls-Weed highway from Weed to the state line. It is estimated the work will be finished by June 20.
