

WORLD CHAMBER FOR FREE PRESS

VIENNA, June 1. (UP)—A blow at the threat of monopolies in the press, dissemination or transmission of official news was delivered by the congress of the international chamber of commerce today.

The move came when the independent news agencies, leading the fight for freedom of the press, succeeded in having principles of vital importance to the press approved unanimously by the legal committee of the chamber.

Mystery Man Broke
The New York American says in a copyrighted article that Russell T. Sherwood, long-hunted "mystery man" of the James J. Walker case, has returned to deny that a now-famous safe deposit box which he rented ever held wealth belonging to Walker.

Grown gray, thin and nerve-racked since he vanished 21 months ago, Sherwood was found living with his wife in a fashionable suburb of New York. His exact whereabouts were not disclosed, but there were reports that he has been living in New Jersey, near Summit.

Sherwood, displaying emotion, denied he ever was Walker's fiscal agent. He disappeared, he said, because he feared investigator Samuel Seabury, then digging away at the inquiry which culminated in Walker's resignation as mayor, would pry into "my friend Jim's" private affairs.

Fainting Theory Scouted
A photograph taken by Officer D. E. Lawrence, sheriff's officers claimed, proved Mrs. Lamson, who was ill, had not fainted and crushed her skull in a fall while in the tub.

The photo shows the body in a reclining position, with the head and arms hanging over the rim of the tub near the faucets.

There was no blood under the head, but a pool of it was on the floor two feet away. Walls were splattered. There was little blood on the tub rim. None was on the faucets.

Authorities claimed the photo indicated she had been killed by a blow with a blunt instrument as she stood near the tub, that the body slumped to the floor, and that the killer later placed it in the tub.

Bloodstains Described
Bloodstains were found on floors throughout the house and at the front door. Police Chief Howard A. Zink of Palo Alto said. Blood left by footprints, he claimed, was in the living room, hall and bedroom. Some of the stains, he said, were dried while others were fresh.

"The pool of blood in the bathroom had congealed," the chief declared. "Mrs. Lamson apparently lay on her back on the floor for some time."

County authorities indicated the grand jury would be asked to consider the case. Former Congressman Arthur Free, attorney for Lamson, said he would prosecute on charges of false arrest if any officer filed charges against his client.

"The boy is entirely innocent," Free said. "He believes his wife was murdered, but I have conclusive evidence she fell and struck her head on a bathtub faucet."

**Accident Victim
Held Responsible**
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of the inquest was brought out by E. L. Cramblitt, resident of Lakeshore Drive, who told the jury that he saw the death car drive up and down the road in front of his home five or six times immediately before the accident. Cramblitt testified that Boesen was at the wheel of the automobile and that his companion, Al Johnson, appeared to be intoxicated, and unable to sit upright. Cramblitt declared that Boesen was driving very slowly, approximately 10 or 12 miles an hour, and that he was trying to hold Johnson in the seat.

Although Boesen was driving at a very slow rate of speed in front of the Cramblitt house, the death car was traveling very fast when the accident occurred about a mile down the road, according to testimony brought out by Officers Marion Barnes and Elton B. Jackson, of the state police, by Sheriff L. L. Low and Deputy Sheriff Dale Mattoon, who investigated the accident, and declared that the car started to skid 75 feet before striking across the road and striking a telephone pole, turning completely around and throwing the occupants out of the car.

Boy Testifies
Lester Smith, 14, of 2440 Oregon avenue, the only eye witness to the accident, testified that he saw the automobile slide around an S turn in the highway, and saw its occupants leave the car. The boy told the jury that he was walking out the lake road, and that he saw the death car pass him, going away from town and that it was traveling very fast. About two minutes later, he said, the car turned around, came back toward town, and struck the post.

Testimony of the physician in charge, Dr. E. D. Lamb, and of witnesses failed to show that Boesen was intoxicated, but

Johnson was declared by Dr. Lamb to be "badly intoxicated, abusive and noisy." He was given treatment for shock, a badly broken nose, a dislocated shoulder and for extreme intoxication.

Johnson is still a patient at Hillside hospital, but will be released within a few days, according to the physician.

Funeral services for Boesen will be held in Eugene, the family home.

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he tried to alight to clear the foothills and attempt to reach upper air. His ship sailed over one foothill, but failed to gain altitude quickly enough to clear the second foothill, crashing into the rip.

The plane was demolished. All except McHenry were riding in the cabin, where they were pinned. The pilot was in an open cockpit, reports said.

Crawling out of the wreckage, Lieutenant McHenry ran to a highway about 100 yards distant, and flagged down some motorists, who sped to a nearby civilian forestry camp, from where the report of the accident was telephoned to March field.

Ambulances were dispatched immediately from there. The dead were taken back to the field and the injured were brought to Ramona hospital here. Physicians, although unable to determine the exact extent of their injuries, believed they would survive. They were suffering from severe shock, and could not be questioned.

The accident happened, it was indicated, about 9:45 a. m. The plane had covered but a short distance of its flight when it struck the foothill.
