Relief Bills Must Be Presented June 5

Bills outstanding against the governor's relief committee must be presented in the local office by June 5, according to information received from the state headquarters.

After June 5, all financing will be taken over by the government which has advanced funds to each state for cleaning up the outstanding debts. Oregon received around \$300,000 in the advance fund, a portion of which will be used in Klamath county, according to information from the local office.

No change of policy or administration has yet been announced or received here.

Showers Hovering Over Klamath Falls
