

GRAINS SHAKE OFF EARLIER DECLINES

CHICAGO, June 2. (AP)—Responsive to strength and activity of the New York stock market, grains rallied today from early declines. Advances, however, failed to hold well.

Rapid growth of the new spring wheat crop received increased attention, though largely offset by complaints of dry weather in Nebraska and South Dakota. Harvesting of winter wheat is expected to become general throughout Oklahoma in about ten days.

Wheat closed steady, unchanged to 1c lower compared with yesterday's finish: corn, 1c to 1c off; oats, 1c to 1c down, and provisions showing 12c to 23c gain.

LIVESTOCK SLOWER ON FRISCO MARKET

SO. SAN FRANCISCO, June 2. (UP)—Hogs: 400, including 125 direct. Moderately active, butchers about steady with Thursday, light lights losing yesterday's upturn; bulk good to choice 175-200 lb. California and Oregon butchers \$5.35-\$5.50, good 137 lb. light lights \$5.35; packing sows to \$3.75.

Cattle: 325, including 150 holdovers. General quality common-medium horned Arizona steers, Texas Brahmas, California grassers, early sales and most bids lower, approximately 25c-50c decline for week on medium grade and below; good fed light weight steers absent, grade estimating such quotable steady; cows and bulls share decline to extent of mostly 25c; load medium 1031 lb. horned Arizona hay fed steers \$5.25, two loads rough 942 lb. horned Texas Brahmas \$4, bulk on sale; most bulls and cows in first half.

Calves: 25, all holdovers. Few 400-500 lb. stockers \$3.75.

Sheep: 1250, including few holdovers. Very dull practically no early interest. Most bids on medium and good woolled; good to choice weight woolled \$3.50 down, or 25c or more lower, generally asking to \$6; two decks mixed shorn and woolled to feed lot.

DEMAND FOR EGGS QUOTED UNSTEADY

PORTLAND, June 2. (AP)—There was much mixture in local egg trading despite the absence of change in general quotations. Storage demand was slowing up to a considerable extent and this was creating some dullness in sales of current receipts.

Survey of the current receipt market suggests that buyers were far less anxious to bid up to extreme prices than formerly, and that producers trying to sell here have not been able to secure these quotations with ease.

Trading in the butter market continued to reflect steadiness, and even strength in spots. The greatest strength was in top score offerings, which continue in call for storage.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, June 2. (AP)—The stock market boomed today in the renewed fires of speculative and investment enthusiasm. Trading volume was at one of the fastest paces of the year, and gains of 1 to 5 or more points were scattered over a wide area. The close was strong. Total transactions approximated 7,000,000 shares.

The apparent hesitation of the previous session gave way to a rush for the lower-priced issues in early trading. These were soon joined by the leaders, and many shares moved up rapidly to new high prices for 1938. Specialties were given a whirl, with extreme gains of around 10 to 20 points, respectively, being recorded by Allied Chemical and Homestake Mining. The utilities, lagging somewhat in the recent movement, were at the forefront of the upswing.

Stocks up 2 to more than 6 points included Case, Western Union, Union Pacific, American Telephone, American & Foreign Power, Auburn Consolidated Gas, Dupont, Worthington Pump, International Telephone, Alaska Juneau and Public Service of New Jersey.
