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BIG COOKING SCHOOL OPENS ON WEDNESDAY

Next week the News-Herald brings to the housewives of Klamath Falls its much heralded cooking school. This big, free cooking school will be held in the Pelican Theatre on June 7, 8, and 9, from 2 to 4 o'clock each afternoon.

Miss Heister Heath, the famed home economist who will conduct the school, writes that the classes will be conducted in an informal manner—nothing is to be of a technical nature.

Cooking Real Art
Miss Heath says that cooking is a real art and that if a housewife attacks her task with a spirit of dread, her work is bound to be poor—if she feels the thrill and intriguing capacity of cooking, her meals will be much better and she will get a great deal more enjoyment out of preparing them.

Women, to whom cooking seems an enjoyment and who get their meals in such a short time, are usually those who take time to plan out their menus and shop wisely for days ahead of time, according to Miss Heath, and she will tell the housewives of Klamath Falls just how they may do this—and thus find more joy and happiness in the kitchen.

Proper seasoning and flavoring is one point which Miss Heath particularly stresses. Here are a few pointers which she suggests:

"Try a dash of onion salt in the white sauce used with macaroni and cheese. Put a bay leaf in the veal stew, curry in the lamb.

Onion salt in the scalloped potatoes gives them a tricky flavor and paprika is the handy help of every housewife.

"Salad dressings call for spice without end. And consider the range of cinnamon rolls and hot breads, together with the savories of sauces what an inspiration is the spice box!"

"What a difference in the intrigue of a meal if the spaghetti has a bit of garlic salt and a sprinkle of clove stirred in with its other seasonings."

NATIONAL GUARDS LEAVE ON JUNE 12

Sixty men and three officers of the local national guard unit are making plans to leave June 12 for the annual two weeks training camp at Fort Stevens.

Two baggage cars will be loaded with troop equipment from Klamath Falls on June 11. The troop will leave the following day in two special coaches.

The camp this year will be the first the troops have attended since the new training regulations have been adopted. The old system of four man squads has been eliminated and replaced by a marching line of three men abreast in single file columns. The new training regulations are much more simplified, according to Captain D. E. Van Vactor. He believes it possible to train a troop in two weeks' time.

In addition to Captain Van Vactor, other officers who will attend Fort Stevens camp from Klamath Falls are: First Lieutenant T. N. Case and Second Lieutenant Dewey Powell.

The local unit has received outstanding honors at the summer camp for several years. In 1931 it placed third of all troops in the entire United States for record firing on a 10 inch rifle. The troop will remain at Fort Stevens until June 27.

INDIANS DISCUSS CONTRACT PRICES

At an official Tribal Council meeting held at the Klamath Indian agency, Thursday, Indians voted to amend public law 435, which prevented the selling of timber stumpage below contract prices.

The amendment now provides that no contracts will be modified without the consent of the Indians who now have the authority to sell the reservation stumpage below contract prices.

Lumber interests were represented but no answer given as to how much the companies would be willing to pay Indians for stumpage, according to Superintendent Wade Crawford.

"Timber interests are about two million dollars in arrears on contracts," Crawford said. "The companies also refused any statement concerning payment of the arrears."

The Tribal Council refused to accept the proposal of the Chiloquin Lumber company that the company's price contract on lumber be reduced from \$4.45 per thousand to \$4.00.
