Baer is a tough hombre. It is his boast that he has not been knocked off his feet in four years of fighting...

Now that's going pretty far in the way of a prediction, and there should be substantial reasons to back it up.

Baer's training camp activities have been almost toward the development of short punches. The camp is of the opinion that Schmeling will come walking in, and with this idea, the California boy is being taught a choppy style to be used against the ex-champion.

Somehow I can't see that kind of fight beating Schmeling. He is too much of a short hitter himself.

It is my guess that Baer will tire of matching short punches with the robot of the ring after a few rounds. Schmeling is too good at it.

This is a fight in which mental attitude is going to play a most important part. Camp attacks, including Anell Hoffman, manager of the Playboys of the Plains, and Mike Cantwell, his trainer, say that Baer has become a very serious-minded gent as the day of the fight draws near...

At times in the ring he has been as furious as the next round is likely to find him. He will not be able to laugh off Der Maxie. The determined descendant of the old Wends of the Black Forest thinks of only one thing in the ring and every move he makes is toward that end.

Baer has a four-year advantage in age. He is 24 and full of the fires of youth. Schmeling is 28. Baer also is a bigger boy than Schmeling, and on the night of the fight will outweigh him 15 to 20 pounds.

Against these factors Schmeling tosses into the balance his experience. Baer never has fought a Sharky, and while Stribling was on the way down when Schmeling met him two years ago, he was still a great boxer.

WILLS AGAIN TRIMS WHITE

Brown Decisions Fields; Monroe, Zimmerman In Draw

A cautious negro, hanging back and losing through the first five rounds of last night's main event at the Legion hall, rallied for one good right-hand punch to drop Herb White of Medford just in time to win by a knockout before the final bell.

White, knocked out in the third round of his appearance against Wills two weeks ago, carried the battle through the first rounds. He punched and elbowed the negro out of the lead and had him in difficulties in the fourth and fifth and scored a knockdown in the first. The end, following from a sharp blow behind White's ear, was a sudden and unexpected conclusion to a well-fought, carefully matched top bout.

Mack Lillard, promoter, changed the character of his program and offered three six-round bouts and a four-round preliminary. Elmer Brown, a dashing young man from St. Paul, decided Spider Fields of Medford in the semi-windup. Fields, troubled all the way by a vicious left, was smothered in the last moments of the sixth round. He was down for three from a left to the head and then again immediately felt the sting of Brown's left as he regained his feet. This time he was down for seven, and the bell ended the bout just as he arose.

Frankie Monroe, making his final appearance before leaving on a tour of the northwest, drew with Jerry Zimmerman in the feature bout. It was a contest of the boxer, Monroe against the puncher, Zimmerman. Both men were boxing at the nose when the end came. Monroe, returning from a main event at Medford, Wednesday, was exhausted by the time the fourth round rolled around, and found himself in trouble from Zimmerman's rushes.

Bill Johnson knocked out Bud Lamond of La Grande in the second round of the curtain-raiser.

Pat McFadden Scores Victory Over O'Dell on Merrill Card
