At times in the ring he has been as furfous as a ravenous wolf but the next round is likely to find him grinning and clowling. He will not be able to laugh off Der Maxie. The determined descendent of the old Wends of the Black Forest thinks of only one thing in the ring and every move he makes is toward that end. He is deadly in his purposefulness and perseverance.
