Word was received here late Sunday evening, announcing the death of Mrs. W. T. Shive, 70, at Monrovia, Calif.

She is survived by her husband, pioneer business man of Klamath Falls, and six children, three of whom are residents of this city. Oscar Shives, assistant cashier of the American National bank, left early Monday morning to attend funeral services. Another son, Alex, is confined at the Klamath Valley hospital seriously ill, and his sister, Mrs. Flora Hayden is remaining here because of her brother's illness.

Other children are Mrs. Roxy Temple of San Diego; Mrs. Dorothea Chapman of San Francisco and Mrs. Madge Goldberg of Stockton. Mrs. Temple and Mrs. Chapman were at the home of their mother at the time of her death.

Mrs. Shive and her husband came west to Jacksonville, Ore., in 1885. Shortly after they moved to Klamath Falls where both became prominent in business and civic affairs. Mrs. Shive was active in fraternal circles and was a member of the local Eastern Star lodge.

Funeral arrangements had not been made Monday.
