The Willamette river was also rising steadily and had passed the 20-foot stage today. Because of damage being done to the lower levels of docks and structures along the river by the backwash from passing ships, all navigators were being urged by Harbormaster Karl Frohn today to run their vessels under slow bell in the Portland harbor. Some docks were already suffering damage from the high water, and merchandise was being moved to upper floors. The weather bureau predicted daily rises of from 6 to 9 inches through Wednesday.

On the basis of his increases in pay for service connected disabilities, it was the intention of the president not to ask for new taxes to meet this relaxation in the economy program.

The regulations provided for an average reduction in service connected cases of approximately 13 per cent.

Limits Established.

No service connected disability will be reduced more than 25 per cent, the limit voted by the senate.

The modified regulations apply both to World War veterans and to Spanish War veterans with direct connected disabilities and to peace time veterans who have incurred disabilities while on an expeditionary force in line of duty.

FORESTRY CORPS FILL TWO CAMPS

ALTURAS, Calif.—With the arrival here Monday of 315 men of the president emergency corps from the bay region of the state two camps in the Modoc National forest, Crane Creek at Sugar Hill and Lone Bell near Glass Mt., are fully manned.

Both these locations, which include buildings owned by the Crane Creek Lumber company and the Lone Bell Lumber company respectively, had almost a complete camp already established which was turned over to the army and forest service for use of the men of the conservation corps. Capt. Chas. Welckman has command of the Crane Creek camp and apt. L. Mikel of the Lone Bell.

Ballot Robbery in Jackson County to Be Aired in Court

ROOSEVELT BACKS CARL C. DONAUGH

PORTLAND, June 6 (AP)—Nomination today by President Roosevelt of Carl C. Donaugh of Portland as United States attorney for Oregon, was the first definite step so far taken by the new administration in filling major appointive offices in Oregon.

Donaugh, state chairman of the democratic party, found considerable opposition to his candidacy, many democrats contending that he was working diligently to win this position and was not devoting sufficient time to line up other patronage jobs in the state.

George Neuner, incumbent United States attorney, is expected to step down as soon as Donaugh's nomination is confirmed.

All these cities except Oakland showed May increases over April, with virtually all the others joining. May gains over April included Los Angeles; Boise, Idaho; Eugene, Ore.; and Bellingham, Everett, Seattle, Spokane, Tacoma and Yakima, Wash.

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in connection with their income tax payments.

Their authority to do so was challenged; but they voted to seek more power to get the data wanted, if more power is needed.

Two hours argument prefaced the vote before the morning session started.

Memory Fails

Once the hearing got under way, Pecora apparently was trying to show that the Van Sweringen brothers acquired their vast holdings almost entirely on borrowed money or cash obtained through sale of securities in their various holding companies.

The witness, however, pleaded a failure of memory about details of the origin of funds with which the C. & O. Auderie roads were purchased.

He agreed some \$5,000,000 had been borrowed by the Van Sweringen organization, from the Guaranty Trust company of New York, and used.

Millions Involved

He said he could not tell where the \$11,200,000 for the purchase of Erie stock came from.

Asked about purchase of the Erie stock, the operator said "we started buying in November, 1923, and it covered a 15-month period to January, 1925."

"How many shares of Erie stock did you buy?"

"Our holdings at the finish were 287,000 shares of common, 24,700 of first preferred and 52,600 of second preferred."

"I don't recall but that they were."

to the board of the county have been circulated, although two vacancies will occur this year. Candidates will be allowed to file for election to this board until the evening of June 10, according to county school officials.

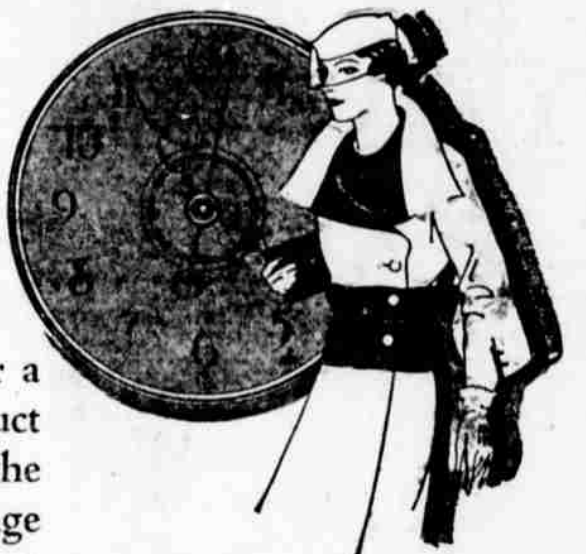
Girls Earn Money For Summer Camp
