PUBLISHER DIES IN LAKE COUNTY

LAKEVIEW, Ore. — Funeral services for L. B. Charles, founder of the Lake County Tribune, were held Thursday at the Methodist church, the Lakeview I. O. O. F. lodge taking charge of the ritualistic services. Graveside services at Silver Lake were performed by the Paisley Masonic lodge. Mr. Charles' death was due to heart disease. Mr. Charles was born April 15, 1872, at Carthage, Indiana. At the age of 17 he and his mother moved to Sewberg, Ore., where he learned the printing and publishing business. In 1899, he and Mrs. Charles moved to Fort Rock where he homesteaded until 1917 when he established the Lake County Tribune at Fleetfoot in northern Lake county. In 1920, Mr. Charles purchased the Silver Lake Leader and moved to Silver Lake, combining the two papers. Five years ago the paper was moved to Lakeview where he and his son Glen have been engaged in the publishing. Mr. Charles taking charge of the commercial printing. He is survived by his wife, Ora, a daughter Mildred Angstead, a son Glen, a brother, L. W. Charles of Wilbur, Wash., and three half sisters who reside in Indiana.
