WETS CAPTURE INDIANA VOTE OVER 2 TO 1

INDIANAPOLIS, June 7. (AP)—Indiana, hope of prohibitionists to stop a steady march of states toward repeal of the eighteenth amendment, today had joined the wet parade.

In a special election Tuesday it became the tenth consecutive state to decide that prohibition has no part in the federal constitution and should be removed through ratification of the twenty-first amendment.

Two to One Victory.
The popular state-wide vote on the question was two to one in favor of repeal. The unofficial tabulation was 501,239 to 277,694 in 3,174 of the state's 3,691 precincts.

Of the 329 delegates named in yesterday's election to the convention that will meet here June 24 formally to register the will of the people, 250 will be pledged to vote for the new amendment.

The anti-repealists will have 79 delegates.

Rural Regions Surprised.
Surprising strength came from a number of rural counties—heretofore looked upon as strongholds of the dry forces—to boost the vote the repealists had been given in the large cities.

Oregon's Quota Nearly Complete

PORTLAND, June 7. (AP)—Oregon's quota of 2,000 will be in the 62 civilian conservation corps camps within a day or so, according to C. J. Buck, regional forester in charge of the north Pacific district. Washington's quota of 3,250 already has been taken care of and the men are now in the 50 camps in that state.

In the final allotment of civilian camps, Oregon's quota was reduced to 62 and Washington's to 50.
